\$103,971.25 FOR TWO CHEESE FACTORIES.

Received 6,878,744 lbs. of Milk Last Year.

735,000 lbs. CHEESE AND 2,770 lbs. BUTTER.

The Tillamook Creamery and Three Rivers Creamery Annual Reports.

Another large cheese factory to make its annual report is the Tillamook Creamery, with 3,355,382 pounds of milk, being an increase of 160,776 pounds from the previous year. The Tillamook Creamery was one of the first factories erected in Tillamook, and for a number of years was the largest factory in the county, and it has probably manufactured more cheese than any other factory in the state. The last few years the Maple Leaf Creamery Association has become the banner factory for the largest amount of milk received annually. These two co-operative factories received last year 6,878,744 pounds of milk, made 735,000 pounds of cheese, 2,770 pounds of butter, receiving \$103,971.25 for the year's product, which is a wonderful showing for two out of a large number of cheese factories in Tillamook county.

To the Directors and Stockholders of The Tillamook Creamery, Tillamook, Ore.
 GENTLEMEN,—I herewith make report to you as Secretary of The Tillamook Creamery for the year 1907.

Amount of milk received by the factory for the year was 3,355,382 lbs., a gain over the year 1906 of 160,776 lbs. Of this amount 3,304,162 lbs. were manufactured into cheese, and 51,220 lbs. were manufactured into butter.

Estimating the amount of cheese on hand at 19,310 lbs., the entire output of cheese was 3,551,415 lbs. Amount of cheese sold 336,105 lbs. This cheese sold for \$47,395.55, or an average of 14.07 cents per lb. Estimating amount on hand at a value of 13c. per lb., the total value of cheese for the season would be \$49,805.85, or a little over 14 cents per lb.

Estimated value of butter fat made during the last half of December, \$876.64. Amount of butter made, 2,770 lbs. Price, 31.5c.

Value of entire product for the season, \$50,682.49.
 Amount of butter fat in milk, 139,822.62 lbs.
 Average test, .0384 per cent.
 Average yield, 10.76 lbs. of cheese per 100 lbs. of milk.

5,674 boxes of cheese manufactured. Patrons were paid butter fat as follows: January, 30.4 cents; February, 30½c.; March, 31½c.; April, 36c.; May, 35 7c.; June, 34.2c.; July, 34½c.; August, 35 2c.; September, 35.4c.; October, 33.5c.; estimate for November and December, 30c.

Average price for butter fat, estimating last two months, being for the 127,435 lbs. made into cheese, a little over 34½ cents per lb.

Estimate of amount that will be paid for December butter fat made into butter, 32½c. per lb.

Amount received by factory for making, \$6,176.90, being 1½ cents charged for making cheese during the months of January, February, March and April, and 1½c. charged for the balance of the year, and 3½ cents charged for making butter.

Expenses for the year, \$4,787.39, showing a gain of \$1,389.26.

Liabilities of the company are as follows: Due W. Michot, 92.76; due patrons for November and December, \$4,454.49; stock out, \$825.00, total \$5,372.25.

Resources: \$8,574.56, being \$900.14 amount in hands of treasurer; \$4,394.66 due company for cheese sold and in factory; \$388.85 due company for butter sold; \$490.91 supplies left over and 1908 expense account; factory, \$2,500.00; surplus, \$3,202.31.

During the year the company suffered a loss of fifty cases of cheese, \$43.89.

The factory has quite a quantity of cheese on hand, but almost one half of it will go out on this steamer. The market for cheese seems to be in fairly good shape, and I look for a fairly good market and demand the coming season.

To the Directors and Stockholders of the Three Rivers Creamery Association, Hebo, Ore.

GENTLEMEN,—I herewith present this, my report as Secretary and Salesman of Three Rivers Creamery Association for the year 1907.

Amount of milk delivered to your factory: April, 151,360 lbs.; May, 238,106 lbs.; June, 259,178 lbs.; July, 250,503 lbs.; August, 175,902 lbs.; September, 118,542 lbs.; October, 103,600 lbs.; November, 64,504 lbs. and December, 36,141 lbs.; a total for the nine months of 1,397,896 lbs.

Amount of butter fat in milk, 52,988.57 lbs.; average test, .0379 per cent.

Amount of cheese manufactured, estimating amount on hand, 149,163 lbs.; average yield, 10.67 lbs. of cheese per 100 lbs. of milk; amount sold and returned for, 126,029 lbs., for which we received \$17,668.03, or an average of 14.02 cents per lb. at Cloverdale.

Amounts of cheese on hand and sold for which we have no returns, 23,134, which will bring the total to between \$29,799.00 and \$31,999.00, and will reduce the average price per lb. of cheese. However, freight rate is higher from Cloverdale than for Tillamook, and 1 10 cents per lb. should be added to make prices of Tillamook basis.

Number of boxes of cheese manufactured, 2,438, all twins.

Amount received by association for making cheese, estimating cheese on hand, \$2,983.26. The association charged two cents per lb. for making cheese.

Expenses for the year were \$3,287.72, but from which should be deducted supplies on hand on January 1st, 1908, \$150.00.

Liabilities of the company are \$1,000, being 19 shares of the capital stock of the corporation, of the par value of \$100 each.

Assets, factory building value at \$1360.00; cash in hands of treasurer, \$754.77; supplies on hand, \$150.00; coming to factory for making, \$462.68, due for cheese sold, \$97.35. This does not include October to December cheese, for which money has not been received as yet.

The association manufactured twin cheese exclusively, and while the average price of cheese would be greater if triplets and Y.A.'s were made, I do not think patrons would receive more for their milk in the end, as shrinkage is greater with the smaller cheese. Respectfully submitted,
