

Editorial Snap Shots.

Were you ever annoyed by the democratic monomaniac who is buggy on politics?

Sheriffs in "dry" counties should have a new nick name and should be known as blind pig chasers.

We wonder what the cow punchers will think of the city council in allowing Old Bossy to run at large.

When the new electric light company begins scowling slab wood to this city, why wouldn't it be a profitable business also to start a slab wood yard? But we hope they won't become slab wood kings.

Why not submit the initiative and referendum to the voters of Tillamook and allow them to decide as to the innocence or guilt of Hembree, the Sandlake murderer, if every thing is to be submitted to the people?

With a steamer running direct from Portland to Tillamook it would bring thousands of home seekers to the county the next few years, increasing the travel so much that hotel accommodation would have to be provided.

Surely the Mayor and the Councilmen know that it is the proper thing to pass an ordinance to keep minors out of the pool rooms, and they ought to know as well that the people demand it. But it may be the "special interests" object.

Gee! The old time Tillamook girls and boys are getting gay with another old time dance and "We won't go home till morning" spirit permeating the atmosphere. If they get too gay, the snap shot man will have to ring the curfew bell on them.

Statement No. 1 appears to be a bone of contention just now in the newspapers of the State. Just for a little political grand stand play some of the politicians are awfully concerned, but the voters are not troubling themselves whether candidates subscribe to it or not.

Office seekers are scarce this year in the republican party, which may account for democratic bosses being somewhat at a loss to know how to fix the "slate" for the primary election. No one can complain that they had no show to get on the primary election ticket. All that they have to do is to groom themselves and trot out into the limelight.

A new line of steamers between Portland and Tillamook, and a new public warehouse and dock without a toll gate would be a godsend to Tillamook City. And why not? This city has been under the control and in the grip of the special interests too long, and it is time that the business men, the dairymen and people demanded a new deal, for the county has been bottled up by the special interests and it is time to cast the yoke off and open the county up.

The gambling craze has again struck some of our citizens who have been mixed up with gambling before in this city. How foolish it is and what a bad example. What would the people think of the snap shot man if he spent all night in one of the old houses across the slough gambling with three others? It is exactly as Judge Burnett says, if business men of this city show such a bad example, it is not surprising that young men will want to do the same or go one better.

Judge Burnett took occasion, in addressing the Young Men's Christian Association at Salem, to refer to the lawless faction in Tillamook City, pointing out that the young men who were arrested and sentenced for burglary were only going their elders one better. We want the law-abiding citizens and parents who have children to raise to think over the situation, and also ask whether it is not time, for the sake of the young men and the reputation of the city, to go after the lawbreakers with a view to rid the city of them. Other cities have done so and have collected hundreds of dollars in fines as well.

We have all heard more or less about the young men who foolishly committed crime in this city, yet with the environments and the bad example set by others it was not surprising, and if the same conditions prevail other young men will fall into their footsteps. There is one thing we have observed about young men in this city. There are quite a number of young men who have been identified for several years with the Catholic church in this city who are industrious, gentlemanly, lawabiding and a credit to the community in which they reside. We seldom flatter anyone with compliments, but we wish to compliment these young men for their moral conduct.

The Headlight has been publishing a lot of valuable information about dairymen in Tillamook county last year which makes splendid advertising matter to use to good effect. Somehow it is hard to get the prominent citizens together and to stick together in an effort to do something which will benefit the moral and industrial conditions of the city and county, for the reason, we suppose,

that the spirit of rule or ruin is not dead in this city. We see it exerting itself again, now that an election is approaching, in the effort of the bootlegger's brigade to make the county wet and to do up the county officials who had the backbone to do their duty.

It costs 28 1/2c a box to get Tillamook cheese to Portland, and there were about 40,000 boxes shipped last year from this city. The 28 1/2c is made up in this way: 1c. per box goes to B. C. Lamb for allowing it to pass over the dock; 12 1/2c. per box is charged by the transportation company to carry it from this city to Astoria; and 15c. per box is charged to carry it from Astoria to Portland. With a free public wharf and dock in this city and a community interest line of boats between Portland and Tillamook, the home products ought to be landed in Portland at less than one half what it is now costing. Half a cent a pound for cheese shipped from Tillamook City to Portland is too big a "graft" upon the dairymen's product.

TIPS FROM THEIR ELDERS.

Judge Burnett Points Moral From Tillamook Boys' Escapade.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 16.—That the four Tillamook boys who were recently convicted of stealing goods from a store learned their lesson in crime from the men who violate the liquor law was one of the assertions made by Circuit Judge George H. Burnett this afternoon at the Young Men's Christian Association Judge Burnett's subject was "Law Observance." The trend of his address was that not so much depends upon the laws that are written in the statute books as upon the spirit of obedience manifested by the citizens. Judge Burnett referred to the Tillamook cases by way of illustration, saying that men had been doing an extensive business in smuggling liquor into the "dry" county of Tillamook and selling it in direct violation of the local option law. The boys, he said, went their elders one better by engaging in theft.

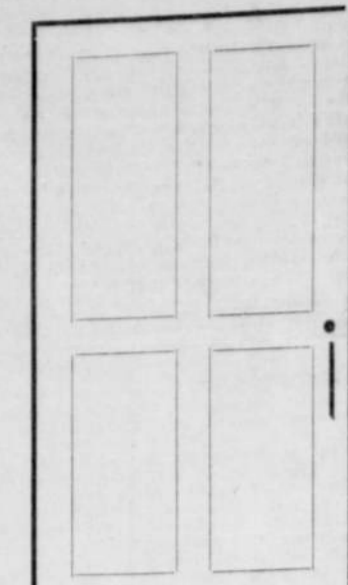
