Elmore to Run to Portland.

Samuel Elmore, of Astoria, has decided to operate his steamer Sue H. Elmore between Portland and Tillamook direct, sailing from each end of the route once each week. The new change will go into effect immediately and the Elmore will take her first cargo from Portland. This change will give shippers of Portland a much better opportunity to transact business with merchants of the Tillamook country.

For a number of years the only connection Tillamook had with the outside world was by stage or the steamer Sue H. Elmore, which operated out of Astoria. All freight from Portland was hauled from Portland to Astoria either over the line of the Astoria railroad or by a sloop. This necessitated a double transfer and the charges were excessive on all necessities. During the heavy weather which prevailed during November and December the Elmore failed to make a trip to Tillamook for several weeks. Food supplies ran short and a profitable cargo was offered to a vessel which would take a cargo into the bay.

The Portland end of the business of the steamer Sue H. Elmore will be handled by William Baker, on the Oak street dock. Mr. Baker announced that the vessel will sail for Tillamook once each week and that there will be no interruptions in the service. The business between the two points has been increasing steadily for several years and the demands of the trade on the bay are such that a weekly service is absolutely necessary.—Oregonian.

An Explanation.

[TO EDITOR OF TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT]

Tillamook, Ore., March 5, 1908.

In regard to the communication of Supt. W. W. Wiley (published on another page) will state I made a mistake in repeating what was told me without making an investigation as to its truthfulness, and that every time such statements were made by me I always qualified the statement that I personally did not believe that the Superintendent received any "graft" in the way mentioned. In looking over the Mass. of the examination handed in by my daughter, in the presence of Supt. Wiley, I wish to state that we together found a mistake in the grading of the History paper in which my daughter received a grade of 77 percent instead of the 68 per cent as first reported by the Examining Board. At the time mentioned the records showed that my daughter lacked but 19 credits of having the required average, and in Supt. Wiley's communication it is stated that 49 per cent were lacking. This error occurred by recording a sixty grade as a ninety. As I have told many people since examining the Mass. that my daughter lacked but 19 credits, I make this statement to show that as the records
