

Commissioners' Court.

The Board of County Commissioners, composed of County Judge Goodspeed and Commissioners Bodyfelt and Alley, did not get through with the March term until Saturday morning, the following additional business was transacted:

In the matter of the petition of Geo. Loerpabel and others for a county road, the viewers' report was read and the matter continued for further hearing until the next regular term.

In the matter of the petition of S. M. Batterson and others for a county road, F. L. Sappington, John Hickey and C. L. Alley were appointed a board of road viewers.

In the matter of the petition of J. W. Hellenbrand and others for a county road, it was ordered that Frank Worthington, Everett and the surveyor be ordered to make a re-survey.

In the matter of petition of E. H. Chaney for collection of taxes, it was ordered that the petitioner be asked to present his tax receipts, and the matter was continued.

In the matter of the petition of the Mutual Telephone Company for a franchise to build telegraph and telephone lines along county roads, it appeared to the court that the petition was not sufficiently definite, it was ordered that the matter be continued and made more definite as to specifications.

In the matter of the petition of the petition of the Bay City Land Company for a settlement of taxes, this was continued.

In the matter of the petition of Peter Jenck for a county road, owing to the sickness of C. H. Waymire, one of the members of the county board of road viewers being absent on account of sickness, a legal survey could not be had, it was ordered that the matter be continued until the next term of the court and Frank Worthington was appointed to fill Mr. Waymire's place.

In the matter of the petition of John Bumgarner for a county road, it was ordered that Fred Sappington, I. H. Moore and Elmer Hall be appointed the county board of viewers.

In the matter of the petition of C. Lutman and others for a county road, F. L. Sappington, F. R. Steinhauer and C. L. Doughney were appointed the board of viewers.

In the matter of the petition of Fred Skomp and others for a county road, F. L. Sappington, F. M. Trout and Carl Wallin were appointed road viewers.

The official bonds of Fred Zaddach, John Hickey, Cyrus Randall, H. M. Farmer and Frank Owens, supervisors, and J. H. Dunstan, justice, were approved.

The Clerk was ordered to advertise for bids for the board and care of Geo. Myers.

In the matter of purchasing plank for road, an offer was made by A. J. Burdick and R. Lamb to furnish 120,000 feet of lumber at \$6.00 per thousand feet, which was accepted.

In the matter of a deed for a gateway, executed by Herman Tohl and William Schollmeyer, it was ordered that the same be accepted.

In the matter of purchasing a rock crusher for Tillamook County, Commissioner Alley had entered into a contract to purchase one five ton second hand road roller for \$400; one Aurora Stone Crusher, for \$1,790; and one 16-horse power compound wood-burning Russell traction engine, for \$1,250, and it was ordered that the contract be ratified.

In the matter of the Lindorf road, the viewers report was ordered continued.

In the matter of the construction of a bridge across Trask river, either at the present Hunt site or the Thayer bridge, the Clerk was instructed to advertise for bids.

In the matter of the bid of W. D. Wood for the construction of a bridge across the Trask river at the Johnson place, this was accepted and a contract entered into.

In the matter of the petition of R. C. Magarrell and others to vacate the unincorporated town of Ocean Park, the court granted the petition.

Henry Clews, the New York banker and broker, addressed the Pittsburg chapter of the American Banking Institute, said that a general reduction of wages in all the grate railway and other industries had become absolutely necessary because still at the high figures to which they were pushed during the long period of prosperity. He said the labor unions should at once reduce their wage scales "and not wait until they are forced to yield." He pointed out that half a loaf is better than none, and urged that the workmen owed this cheerful acceptance of the cut as a duty to society at large. Mr. Clews defended stock speculation on the exchanges, saying that "it is no more gambling than speculating in real estate or ordinary merchandise." He deplored the recent attacks on Wall street, the financial center of the country, by both Roosevelt and Bryan.

Range Lights to be Established.

Congressman Hawley has sent us the following letter:

Referring to your letter dated September 17, 1907, addressed to the Secretary of War, referred to this Department for proper action thereon, transmitting a letter from Mr. C. Thayer, Secretary of the Commission of the Port of Tillamook, requesting the establishment of range lights on the Columbia River Bar, Oregon, and that a light be placed upon the mainland. I have the honor to state that the Light House Board, at its session on February 3, 1908, decided that white range lights be established at the eastern end of Sand Island, and that a white post light recently established at the eastern end of Sand Island, for the benefit of fishermen, be discontinued when the range lights are established, and that a white post lantern light be established on the western end of Flavel Wharf to mark the turning point for vessels entering the crescent shaped channel leading to Astoria.

It further decided that a gas buoy be established 400 feet to the westward of the present buoy No. 8, Clatsop Spit, provided that the experimental unlighted gas buoy, now on trial at that point to see if it will watch properly on the strong tidal currents, withstands the test successfully.
