 We regret to announce the death of Mr. Thomas F. Williams, a respected citizen of Tillamook county, which occurred on Wednesday evening, his age being 77 years. He was born June 6, 1831, at Ponteporda, Wales, England, and left his native land when he was 23 years of age and went to Australia, and at the age of 32 married Isabella How, who had eight children, six boys and two girls. He moved to California and came to Tillamook March 11, 1878. He was married the second time in 1903 to Catherine Gibson. Deceased was a man who was well thought of and respected in the county. The children who are living are Jack, William, George, James and Joseph Williams and Mrs. Belle Handley, Mary and Thomas having died. The funeral will be held at the M. E. church on Friday afternoon at 1:30. \*  
 The rain storm caused two slide on Saturday night, which did some damage and caused a delay in the mail arriving in this city on Sunday. About eleven o'clock on Saturday night, on account of the heavy rainfall, which had accumulated in the mountains, it came down Panther creek with a rush, carrying with it trees and logs, swept away the bridge and some of the logs piling up on the opposite side of the Trask river. Finding the bridge out the next morning, the stage driver unhitched his team, and in trying to get round the side of the mountain so as to get the letter mail to this city, one of the horses became tangled in the breaching and rolled down the embankment to a few feet of falling over the rocks into the Trask river. The horse landed on her back, where she remained in that position until late in the afternoon, when she was pulled up with block and tackle by men who live in that vicinity. The other slide originated in the mountains and came down the canyon above J. J. Rupp's place, making a clear sweep until it came to Rupp's meadow. Here it carried away the goat house and killed 12 Angora goats and nearly demolished the barn, leaving hundreds of logs, trees and mud piled up in the meadow 12ft. to 14ft. high in some places, cutting off access to the barn. The debris also piled up on the county road and put a stop to travel at that point. Sid Anderson had a cow roll down the embankment into the Trask river during the storm and could not get it out until the water went down.

**THE NEW BOAT IS ASSURED.**

**Will be Running Between Tillamook and Portland in about Two Weeks.**

Word was received in this city Wednesday that the Anvil had been purchased and that she would be running between Portland and Tillamook within two weeks. More than enough money was subscribed in Portland, and parties have left that city to bring the vessel to Oregon. So as to give the Anvil plenty of outgoing freight a box factory will be started up, which will be a new industry to give employment to a number of men as a result of competition in the transportation service, with other industries in contemplation. The agent who will look after this end is expected in on Saturday or Sunday. From The Oregon Journal.

**Articles of incorporation of the Portland & Tillamook Bay Transportation Company will probably be filed with the Secretary of State tomorrow or Tuesday, the promoters of the new transportation line having succeeded so well in interesting capital that there remains only a few thousand dollars more of the stock to be subscribed.**

The capital stock will be \$50,000. Large blocks have been taken by merchants of Portland and points on Tillamook bay who are shippers, and others have decided to take stock on the strength of the investment appearing to be a good financial proposition.

The company has an option on the large and splendidly equipped gasoline boat Anvil built at San Francisco three years ago. She is now at Oakland, out of which port three or four craft of similar construction are engaged in the coastwise trade. Her dimensions are: length, 116 feet; beam, 24.5 feet, and depth, 16.5 feet. She has capacity for about 400 tons of freight and has 60 comfortable berths and permission to carry 300 day passengers. She carries a crew of 12. Being equipped with two engines capable of developing 250 horsepower, she reels off 10 knots an hour, which is equal to about 12 miles. With two engines and twin screws all danger of her being disabled is practically eliminated.

The Anvil has been tested in rough water upon several occasions and found an excellent sea boat. She made a trip to Nome Alaska, and has been plying out of San Francisco for some time.
