**Notice to Timber Cruisers.**  
 Notice is hereby given that the County Court of Tillamook County Oregon, will receive sealed bids for the cruising of all the timber lands in Tillamook County. The County will not pay for the cruising of any lands on which there is less than one thousand feet of timber or ten thousand feet of piling on each subdivision, forty acres. The cruiser, however, will be required to go over and examine all timber lands in the county, even though there may be less timber than the amount above stated for each forty acre tract. Two separate bids are to be submitted, one for single running and one for double running. The court will require the one to whom the contract is awarded to file with the court a satisfactory bond in the sum of ten thousand dollars for the faithful performance of his contract. All bidders are required at the time of filing the bid to deposit with the court a certified check in the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars as a guarantee of good faith. The contractors to be required to have the work all completed and the reports of the cruise filed on or before September 1st, 1908. **COMMITTED SUICIDE.**  
**Despondency Caused H. E. Ross to Kill Himself.**  
 Word was received in this city Wednesday that H. E. Ross, who had been working for E. R. Beals in his real estate office, but had gone to Portland for medical treatment, had committed suicide during a fit of despondency. He had been in poor health for some time, and it is not long since that he was operated upon for appendicitis. He has a wife and child residing south of this city, who is a daughter of E. K. Scovell, of Nehalem. The remains will be brought to Tillamook for burial and will be accompanied by deceased's sister, who is a nurse in St. Vincent's Hospital.  
 The Oregonian gives the following particulars of the suicide:  
 Two men committed suicide in Portland Tuesday and their bodies were taken to the morgue at almost the same hour of the afternoon, between 3:30 and 4 o'clock. The first, H. E. Ross, 35 years old, head of a family and a man of means, whose home is in Tillamook, Ore., took his life because of bad health. He was suffering from stomach trouble. The second, about the same age but unidentified, had been enjoying excellent health but was short of money and despondent. He was plainly a man of refinement and education, but his solution of the economic game had failed and with the pawning of his cuff links, had come to the end of his string.  
 Both men died of poison. Ross killed himself at the Belmont House, at 204 1/2 Fourth street. The unknown man chose a spot in the Plaza block, directly across the street from the morgue, in Finley's undertaking establishment. Ross exhibited considerable ingenuity, contriving to bury his face in a bowl of absorbent cotton saturated with chloroform, while the unknown, unable to invest in such luxurious means of suicide spent his last few pennies for an ounce bottle of carbolic acid and drank it all. The unknown left no parting message and practically nothing to give any clew of his identity. Ross left a voluble explanation of his act, describing his act as cowardly and begging the forgiveness of his wife and little daughter.  
 Ross came here a few weeks ago from Tillamook City and went to the Portland Sanitarium. He left institution Sunday, intending to take the first boat home, as he says in his farewell message. But he got to brooding over his ailment, concluded that he might become a burden on his family, and killed himself.  
 His death must have occurred during the early hours of the morning, as he had been extinct some time when the body was found. The body was lying face downward, the face still buried in the fatal bowl of absorbent cotton. The letter lay near at hand. It was addressed to Mrs. H. E. Ross, Tillamook City, and read as follows:  
 My dear darling wife: When this reaches you I will be in eternity. Don't think that I do not love you that I take this step. I could not stand to come home and be a burden on you, when I could not help. I have not been able to get any help here. I thought I was getting better, but I was mistaken. And now, Theresa, my darling wife, don't worry too much over a man that has all but spoiled your life, not through my desire to hurt you. Don't think hard of me dear, and tell Pearl her papa loves her and mamma too much to be a drag for a few years and then have to leave after he had used up what property we had. May God bless you Theresa. You have been a good and faithful wife, much better than I deserved. So forgive me, my dear darling wife, for this cowardly deed. I have \$60 in the First National Bank of Portland and will send you the certificate of deposit and Mr. Harris will get you the money.  
 In the man's pocket were found 25 cents in silver and a receipt for \$12 from the Portland Sanitarium.
