How the Democrats Harp on Statement No. 1.

The democrats are endeavoring to raise a rumpus over Statement No. 1, for the avowed purpose of causing factional strife in the republican party. That is their object, for they do not want to discuss the principles of their own party or that of the republican party. But they keep on harping, harping, harping, about the people's choice for U.S. senator. If they will go back a few years, to the election of 1902, they will find that T. T. Geer was a candidate on the republican ticket for U.S. senator, and C. E. S. Wood on the democratic ticket. Geer received 656 votes and Wood 325 votes in Tillamook, and in the State Geer was the people's choice for U.S. senator, but the state legislature did not elect him, neither did the democrats at that time kick up a fuss about the people's choice. So why kick up so much fuss about it now? or Statement No. 1 is only a trivial matter when it comes to a matter of party principles or whether Oregon is to send a republican or a democrat to the United States senate. We are asked to publish the following letter from a republican who desires to express his sentiment:

[TO EDITOR OF TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.]
As a number of the Democratic newspapers throughout the state, and especially the Portland Journal, are making a big ado about Statement No. 1, and intimating that all who do not see fit to endorse the same belong to the so-called machine rule gang, it would seem as though a few words in their defence would be appropriate at this time.

Politicians, as the term is used in these latter days, are made up quite frequently of two classes: Those who are in office and want to stay there, and those who are out but would like to get in. As a consequence politicians of the Democratic and other parties are scanning the horizon for some scheme that will catch the vote of the common citizen.

Chief among these schemes is that shrewd politician, Governor Chamberlain, whose ambition is to hold down a seat in the U.S. Senate, and who understands, as well as any of them the necessity of catching a great number of Republican votes before he can land his fish. Statement No. 1 is the slogan.

Is there no good reason why Republicans ought not to endorse Statement No. 1?

All are aware that this same oily politician has worked the rank and file of the Republican party for a number of years to such an extent as to place him in the most exalted position in the State of Oregon. An avowed Democrat, yet he has succeeded in making them believe that he has been a martyr for his country; that he has already grown thin and poor through his desperate efforts in their behalf, and that should they see fit to send him to the U.S. Senate there is no telling what he might do with himself, or accomplish for the people.

In the last campaign, when he was a candidate for Governor, it was astonishing to behold the number of us common people who were addressed at his very dear friends and tenderly appealed to rally to his support in his efforts to put his great foot upon the corruption in our land; but it still goes on, notwithstanding he sits upon his throne.

Every man who claims to belong to a party ought to recognize party principles, otherwise he is not a true representative of such party. All parties have their platform, and any candidate who accepts a nomination from a party, thereby adopts such platform as his. The Republican party has its platform; but the Governor in his letter acknowledging himself a candidate for the office of U.S. Senator practically says to the Democrats: "My friends, you nominate me; but, as there are not enough of you to elect me, it will become necessary for me to tickle a great number of republican voters; I must be a half-way republican and talk soft-soap to them. I will tell them that when I get the office, I will lay aside party and party principles and work only for the whole people of the State of Oregon. This they will understand to mean that I will be as much or more a Republican than a Democrat; but do not worry my dear Democratic friends, or think I have gone back on you, for if I can succeed in making those fool Republicans think that it will be to their interest for me to go to the Senate, I will surely remember you and give you to eat of the fat of the land, for there are many good positions of honor and that will bring wealth to you and at which I know you are looking with longing eyes, and when I get there you shall have them."

The facts are that no true Republican can afford to vote to send a man to represent them at Washington who does not endorse to the fullest extent the principles of the Republican party in which he believes, for the reason that the Democrat for whom he votes holds views diametrically opposite to those of the voter, and for the further reason that the party in power is the one who controls legislation, and the Republican party being now in power, our Democratic representative would sit in the halls of legislation like a knot on a log, with no power or influence, and the State of Oregon would be left in the

same condition as though it had no Senator.
To endorse Statement No. 1 means that every Republican who aspires to sit in the legislature must pledge himself to vote for a man whom he knows holds views which he believes to be destructive to the Government, and that he shall say to all staunch Republicans: "You, supposed you elected a Republican; but if there are enough renegade Republicans at the coming election who will vote for a Democrat, when it comes time to do my duty as a legislator I shall turn renegade and vote for the Democrat also."
