The gasoline schooner Anvil is being equipped in San Francisco for service between Portland and Tillamook. She will be ready to leave the California city Sunday and will enter on the coastwise run before the first of the month. The Anvil has fine passenger accommodations and can handle 300 tons of freight. She was built for service around Nome, but was not a success on account of the difficulty in securing fuel.

Mr. W. N. Barrett, of Hillsboro, Oregon, is a candidate on the republican ticket, for joint senator for this district, composed of Lincoln, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill counties. He is a native of Washington county, and has always resided there. He is a graduate of Pacific University, and has been practicing law in Washington county for over 23 years, served two consecutive terms as district attorney for the Fifth Judicial District, and was a member of the last legislature, being chairman of the House judiciary committee. He is a life long republican, is familiar with legislative duties and well acquainted over the State. If nominated and elected, he will ably and efficiently represent the interests of the entire district.

A telephone message was received on Tuesday saying that parties in Portland had been successful again in "knocking" the proposition to purchase the Anvil and place her on the run between Portland and Tillamook. That afternoon a meeting of business men was called, and a delegation was up from Bay City. It developed into indignation, several of the merchants declaring that they would quit trading with certain Portland wholesale houses who had "knocked" the proposition. Next day, however, Mr. Geo. Edmunds received another telephone message saying that again enough money had been raised, that a company had been formed, and that it was a sure thing this time.

The Tillamook Lumbering Company, a corporation, and Tillamook County Bank, a corporation, plaintiff, vs. the Liverpool & London & Globe Insurance Company, a corporation, defendant, is a suit filed in the circuit court, in which the lumber company sues the fire insurance company for \$5000, the amount of the insurance on the saw mill, which was destroyed by fire last fall. The fire insurance company has refused to pay the insurance money because it was stipulated in the policy that a watchman should be employed when the saw mill was not in operation, and as the mill was in operation but it was on a Sunday that it burned down, the fire insurance company is using that clause of the contract to get out of paying the insurance money, which the mill company is now sewing for.

Suing one another appears to be the most important business in Tillamook city. Wonder who it is that is sick 'em then on?

Wasn't that a lot of rotten, silly, rank Connor Club deggerel. Take another drink, boys, to the health of the poetical monstrosity.

The Newberg Graphic refers to Dallas as the "great billy goat center of the West Side." Steady, Bro. Woodward, for there's no telling what the billy goats would do to you if they caught you in a vacant lot.

The Ross bank officials have succeeded in getting a change of venue for their trial, because the Portland newspapers published the facts. It was very gratifying to know that the case is to be tried at Salem, for when it is through with the defendants will be that much nearer the penitentiary.

We have always contended that it is a mean, contemptible individual who will attack another in a newspaper and has not the courage or manhood to sign his name. Quite a few individuals in this city have done a good deal of mud slinging in that way, but it is only cowards who resort to that kind of business.

The City Council has an ordinance to compel people to keep up their cows and chicken.
