Beals' bill. There was nothing in the bill which provided for the amount to which timber should be assessed, that being left to the discretion of the assessors, as with other property. The Beals' bill having been defeated, the only other alternative was to have timber cruised, which the different counties have done or are contemplating doing, after which it will be up to the assessors or the board of equalization to decide the amount to which timber will be assessed. Now as to the burden of our correspondent's letter—that of taxation on timber lands, is a different phase of the question, and he is out of order in trying to butt in when the matter under consideration was not taxation, but to ascertain the amount of timber on the land to avoid the assessor assessing a claim, with one million feet of timber the same as one with ten million feet. If the timber barons complain about taxes, so ought the settler, for every improvement he makes is taxed every year. His improved land, his fences, barn, implements, stock, furniture, house and stock are all assessed, the only exemptions being his wife and family, and it is surprising that some smart assessor has not placed a valuation upon them.
