GRAND JURY REPORT

Which Highly Commend Clerk Lamb and Sheriff Crenshaw.

The grand jury, after making an examination of the court house, submitted the following report to Judge Galloway: To the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Tillamook. To the Hon. William Galloway, Judge of the above named court: We, the undersigned members of the Grand Jury, appointed at the regular April term of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Tillamook, beg leave to report to you that we have completed our duties as prescribed by the laws of the State of Oregon, and that we have made a careful examination of the public prison within said county, and that we find them to be in exceptionally good condition; that we have also examined into the condition and management of the offices pertaining to the courts of justice within same, especially the offices of the sheriff and county clerk, to be in first class condition and under the management of men of unusual carefulness, skill, ability and integrity.

A MARKET DAY.

To be Held One Day Each Month in Tillamook City.

What promises to be an interesting event each month is the movement now under consideration for a market day in Tillamook City, which appears to be successful in some of the cities in the Western States, and exceeding popular in the East. A number of the business met at the city hall on Monday evening to discuss the matter, and it was decided to hold the first market day in this city on Saturday, June 13. The idea is to give those who have stock, farm implements, etc., an opportunity to sell it at private or public sale, or want to trade, to bring it to the city when there is a crowd here. The same to apply to farm produce as well, such as chicken, garden truck, fruit, etc. In fact, it is to be a market for all kinds of trading, and each business house will give real bargains on certain lines. To make the day attractive and enjoyable, the Tillamook Concert Band will play during the day and the business men will engage the auctioneer to auction off anything which is to be sold in that way.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Hembree Case to be Tried at Dallas--The Jury Disagree in Davis Case.

The April term of the Circuit Court convened on Monday, with Judge Wm. Galloway on the bench, and with a long docket containing 87 cases. A grand jury was drawn as follows: Goran Munson, I S Phillips, Gust Nelson, Frank Wheeler, C. L. Alley, Frank Dye and J. J. Hollett. After giving the jury the usual instructions, the judge appointed Frank Wheeler foreman.

James Wilson and James Bodyfelt, who were indicted by the grand jury, both charge with giving liquor to minors, pleaded guilty and were fined \$50 each.

R. Catterlin, one of the boys who broke into Eugene Jenkins' store, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary, but was paroled similar to the other boys.

C. E. Davis, who is accused of carnally knowing his daughter, Bertha Davis, a girl 17 years of age, was placed on trial on Wednesday, the case taking the entire day, and as the jury was out all night and unable to agree, it was discharged by the judge the next morning. The case will not be tried again at this term of the circuit court, the bail being placed at \$1,000.

The grand jury returned a "no bill" against Mike Haag and Tom Mahoney, the two boys who broke into M. Casey's house and stole a gold watch, which was returned to him.

Laurel Stock, the young man who broke into the school house at Hebo, and stole a gun, was allowed to go, with instructions to return to his father's home at Ashland.

Change of Venue Granted.

Attorneys McCain and Vinton, who are representing A. J. Hembree, who is charged with the murder of his wife at Sandlake, made a motion for a change of venue, claiming that the defendant was unable to obtain a fair trial in this county. Articles published in the Headlight, with the fact that a number of the citizens had signed a protest against Governor Chamberlain paroling Hembree for the murder of his daughter, were made special points to show that the people of this county had made up their minds in the case and that Hembree could not get a fair trial.

District Attorney McNary, who was ready to try the case at this term of the circuit court, did not oppose the change of venue very strongly, as there would be great difficulty in obtaining a jury in this county, and Judge Galloway, after going over the matter, thought it would be less expense to the county to try it in another county, and on the showing made by Hembree's attorneys, granted a change of venue to Polk county, after declining to send the case to Yamhill county. The circuit court in Polk county will convene at Dallas in two weeks, when Hembree will be tried before Judge Burnett.
