TIMBER LANDS TO BE CRUISED.

Contract is Let to J. C. Clement at 7c. per Acre.

The Board of County Commissioners, composed of County Judge H. F. Goodspeed and Commissioners H. V. Alley and Geo. W. Bodyfelt, was in session for over a week, having met for the purpose of opening bids for cruising the timber lands of this county. There were five bids submitted, that of Chas. J. Clement being the lowest. As he was not in the city at the time he was phoned for to come in, the court being anxious that he should do the cruising, for the next lowest bidder was over \$13,000 more for doing the work. Mr. Clement was awarded the contract and has filed his bond, and as this is a matter of considerable importance to the taxpayers and timber owners, we give below the contract in full. His bid was for 7c. per acre, the next lowest bid being 10c.

The Contract.

This agreement, made and entered into by and between the County of Tillamook, in the State of Oregon, party of the first part herein, and Charles J. Clement, of Portland, Oregon, party of the second part herein, Witnesseth:

That, whereas, a large portion of the lands in Tillamook County, Oregon, are heavily timbered, and under the present methods of assessment, the county assessor of said county is unable to make a lawful or equitable assessment of such timbered lands;

Now, therefore, in order to assist the said county assessor in obtaining the necessary information to enable him to perform his duty according to law in making assessments of such timbered lands, and in consideration of the benefits to accrue to said county by a proper cruise of such lands, the said County of Tillamook, does hereby agree to employ the party of the second part to cruise all the lands in said Tillamook County, and the said party of the second part, in consideration of the sums of money to be paid to them for the labor involved in making such cruise, hereby agree to make a cruise, estimates and reports of all the lands in Tillamook County, Oregon, under the following terms and conditions, to-wit:

The party of the second part shall receive the sum of seven (7) cents per acre for each and every acre cruised, reported and accepted as hereinafter mentioned and which shall contain no less than the amount of timber herein required.

When the parties of the second part shall begin to cruise the lands in any township, the cruise of such township and all townships in said county lying east or west of such township shall be completed, together with the proper reports of such cruise made, the reports accepted and the work paid for before pay shall be drawn on any lands in any other tier of townships; that is to say, if a cruise is begun in any township in two north, all of the work in the township in said county in two north shall be completed, accepted and paid for before payment will be made for lands in one north, three north, or any other tier of townships in said county.

The contractors shall, upon the completion of the cruise of all of the lands in each township, make complete and accurate reports of such cruise, showing in detail, on separate sheets for each section, the quantity of merchantable timber in feet (board measure) on each forty-acre sub-division or fractional lot as shown by the United States Government plats of the public surveys; making separate statements of each variety, such as Red Fir, Yellow Fir, Cedar, Larch, Spruce and Hemlock. Cedar poles and piling shall be estimated in lineal feet. Reports shall be made on forms substantially in accordance with the forms hereto attached, said reports to be subscribed and sworn to by the person making such cruise and filed with the County Clerk of Tillamook County, Oregon. The reports designated as "Field Notes" shall give a general report of the character of soil, logging conditions, and general topography, indicating on plats all points where streams and ravines are intersected on the lines followed by cruisers. The acreage in each tract shall be determined by the plats of the various townships issued by the officers of the United States Government.

The cruise of each legal subdivision of forty acres, or fractional lot, shall be in the manner that is known among cruisers as "double running," that is to say, that in making such cruise the cruiser shall pass through each legal subdivision of forty acres, or fractional lot, twice on separate lines and on such lines as shall give him the best opportunity to determine, first, the amount and kinds of timber thereon; secondly, the kind of soil, the direction and courses of streams and their intersections with subdivision lines, and the topography.

Within ten days after the filing of the reports for each township, the county court on behalf of the county shall proceed to have the same inspected. Upon

the completion of such inspection, the inspector shall forthwith file a sworn report thereof with the aforesaid county clerk.

If the inspectors report shall agree within ten per cent of the cruisers report on any legal subdivision so inspected, the report of such cruisers on such legal subdivision shall be deemed to be correct. And the party of the first part hereby agrees that within five days after the filing of such inspectors report on any of said lands amounting to no less than thirty six (36) sections, to cause the same to be examined by some person or persons on behalf of the county who shall report the result of such examination to the county court of said county at its first meeting after the completion of such examination.

If the said cruiser's report shall show that the amount of timber in the cruise made by the inspector was within ten per cent of the amount thereof in the report of the cruise made by the party of the second part, the county court aforesaid shall accept such cruise and pay for the same at such term of said Court by warrants drawn against the General Fund of Tillamook County, Oregon.

In case the report of the inspector shall vary more than ten per cent from the report of the cruisers, the party of the second part shall be notified by the county clerk aforesaid to rectify such work at once, and shall thereupon re-examine and report on such work as shall vary more than ten per cent from the report of the inspector.

The party of the first part shall procure as inspector, or inspectors, cruisers of unquestionable ability and integrity, who shall use the forms as hereto annexed in inspecting.

All work under this contract shall be completed and reports thereof filed as hereinbefore mentioned by the first day of September, 1908.

Each cruiser and compass-man shall, before entering upon any work connected with such cruise, subscribe to an oath administered to him by some duly authorized officer, to perform his duty hereunder according to the best of his ability, such oath to be filed with the county clerk aforesaid with the reports aforesaid.

Each cruiser shall keep accurate daily field notes of all lands cruised by him, in substantially the form hereto attached marked, "Field Notes."

All lands cruising less than 100,000 feet, board measure, of saw timber, or 10,000 lineal feet of piling and cedar poles, or such portion of both saw-timber and piling, as to make the whole amount of timber on each forty-acre subdivision amount to less than 100,000 feet, board measure, shall not be paid for by the party of the first part.

In making such estimate ten feet board measure shall be deemed equivalent to one lineal foot of piling or cedar poles.

Section corners, wherever found, are to be marked by the cruisers with the letter "T." The cruisers shall in all cases find corners as fixed by the public surveys as a base for commencing the cruise of any section. If the corners cannot be found, that fact shall be indicated in the reports and the beginning point indicated from the nearest established corner.

Burnt areas shall be indicated on the reports and field notes as, "Burned Over" when the burn is so extensive as to leave less than the minimum amount on a legal forty-acre subdivision.

In case the party of the second part shall, on checking up the work of their cruisers, believe that the cruise of any of the lands made by the inspector or inspectors appointed by the part of the first part is incorrect, they shall have the privilege of appointing a cruiser to accompany such inspector or inspectors, and said cruiser and inspector shall re-examine such lands; and if on such re-examination the said cruiser and inspector shall still be unable to agree in their estimates, then said cruiser and inspector shall agree upon some other competent cruiser, who shall thereupon make a cruise of such lands, and the estimate made by said last mentioned cruiser shall be deemed to be correct.

A bond from some reliable guaranty or surety company, in the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars, shall be furnished by the party of the second part and filed with the said county clerk, said bond to be conditioned upon the faithful performance of this contract upon the part of the party of the second part, which bond shall be subject to the approval of the said county court, it being hereby understood and agreed that this contract shall not be deemed to be in effect until properly signed by the parties hereto and said bonds approved by the said county court.

It is further understood and agreed by and between the parties hereto, that if the county court of Tillamook County, Oregon, should be prevented from carrying out this contract by the filing of any suits or actions in the courts of this state, that the party of the second part shall be entitled to compensation only for that portion of the work performed and completed hereunder according to the terms of this contract and accepted
