Commissioners' Court.
The Board of County Commissioners did not adjourn until Wednesday, and in addition to the bills allowed and published in our last issue, the following business was transacted. The Board spent several days in the south part of county looking over roads and proposed improvements.
The bid of Gessner & Wolfe for painting the court house fence was accepted, and the other bids rejected.
In the matter of the petition of Wm. Ryan and others for a county road on the north side of Wilson river, Otto Schrader, William Hughey and M. C. Froehridge were appointed a board of county road viewers.
The amount of 80c. was ordered to be refunded to J. M. McMillan on taxes.
Property belonging to Louis Olsen having been wrongfully assessed, \$6.55 was ordered refunded.
In the matter of cancelling county warrants issued prior to July, 1901, the clerk was instructed to advertise the same.
In the matter of the bridge across the Trask river, it was ordered that the steel bridge to be built across that river be located at the present site, at what is known as the Hunt place.
In the matter of the petition of F. J. Ayers and others for a county road, the same not being in due form, was dismissed.
It was ordered that the bid of Mrs. Emma Stuart to board and care for Geo. Myers for the sum of \$20 per month be accepted.
In the matter of the application of Frank Lusk for a road of public assessment it was ordered that Fred Sappington, J. J. McGinnis and C. C. Jensen be appointed to locate a road.
In the matter of the petition of W. J. Stephens and others for an election to be held in Tillamook County to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited as a whole, it was ordered the same to be placed upon the ballot.
In the matter of the petition of Charles Johnson and Lizzie Johnson for road of public assessment, F. L. Sappington, O. P. Mattson and Joe Wilson was appointed board of county road viewers.

In the matter of the petition for the establishment of four county high schools the same was ordered placed upon the ballot to be voted upon in June.
In the matter of the petition of Charles Lutman and others for a county road, the road supervisor was ordered to open said roads.
In the matter of the cancellation of taxes upon certain property, it was ordered that upon J. W. Hellenbrand paying the costs and principals, the sale be cancelled.
