Wiley has been offered and has accepted the position of principal of the Newberg school, which has about 800 pupils and it is safe to predict that Newberg will get a thorough good principle in Mr. Wiley, for he takes a lively and active interest in school work. His friends will be sorry to see him leave Tillamook, but it will bring him in closer touch with the educators of the State.

Verlin Brown and Roy Saling were arrested and taken before Justice Dunstan charged with shooting a two year old colt belonging to A. M. Ginn on Sunday, and the justice thinking the evidence sufficient, bound them over to the circuit court, placing them under \$500 bond. Saling was able to furnish bond, and as Brown was unable to do so, he was brought to the city on Wednesday and locked up in the county jail. It seems that Mr. Ginn has been annoyed by boys shooting his stock, and a week before they shot and killed a fine heifer. The colt they killed on Sunday was worth \$100.

Mr. P. S. Brumby, representing the Blodgett Co., came in on Monday to make arrangements for fire wardens for the summer months. He informs us that he was one of the timber men who went to Salem and fought the Beals' bill to compel the timber owners to furnish a cruise of their timber. The reason that he did so was because the Blodgett timber had just been closely cruised so as to make an equitable family division of the property, and as the lands of other timber owners had only been roughly estimated or not at all years ago, he did not think it was fair to his company, although some of the timber owners, who had not made a close cruise of their timber, did not oppose the Beals' bill. As to the cruise being made of the timber by the county, Mr. Brumby says the timber men does not object to that if a careful cruise is made, but he is of the opinion that the county court should have given the cruisers two years to do the work. Mr. Brumby does not like the agitation which is going on in some counties to increase the taxation on timber, which it

is now impossible to place on the market, and which will have to pay taxes for a number of years yet before it can be manufactured.

The attorneys in the Hembree case were addressing the jury to-day (Thursday).

The city had a deserted looking appearance on Wednesday, as nearly all of the business houses were closed, and a large majority of the citizens had at an early hour in the morning made a bee line for points of advantage on the Coast to see the Atlantic Fleet pass, on its way to Tacoma. Every vehicle and boat was brought into service and a large number rode shank's pony to the Cape Meares, there being a general exodus. When the fleet did come into sight the ships were about, variously estimated, twelve to fifteen miles off shore, consequently they were too far off to get a good view of them, which was somewhat of a disappointment to the people of Tillamook county, who had turned out of bed at an early hour and made strenuous efforts to get there, for those who climbed the hill to the light station reduced their weight in doing so.

"DRYS" GET BUSY.

The Anti-Saloon League to Carry on Aggressive Campaign.

The Tillamook Anti-Saloon League, which was organized in 1904, and did active work the fall of that year for local option, but since that time has remained somewhat inactive, got together the first of the week, and from now on will carry on an aggressive campaign in every precinct of the county. The league has the backing of a number of prominent citizens as well as some of the leading merchants. It seems that the Anti-Saloon League will not only fight to keep the county "dry," but will oppose candidates who are known to belong to the saloon faction. The Headlight is reliably informed that plans have already been made to carry on a vigorous fight against those who have been violating the local option law, for it is proposed, if possible, to wipe this out, and the league will lend its aid in this. Quite a number of anti-saloon advocates have been selected to go into every precinct in the county, and from now on will make a determined fight to carry the county with a larger vote than was cast at the first local option. The Anti-Saloon League is planning a big anti-saloon rally in this city next week. At the first local option election in this county, in 1904, the vote was: For prohibition, 588; against, 391; being a majority of 197. The Anti-Saloon League was organized that year, and carried on a most successful campaign, but for the local option election two years ago did very little work, for it seemed to be the general opinion that public sentiment had not changed from the previous election. The result of the election in 1906 was: For, 499; against, 384; majority, 115. It will be seen by this that the "drys" were shy 88 votes on the second election, but the "wets" did not gain that number of votes, but polled seven votes less. With another active campaign for local option, with the business men and farming communities lined up against saloons, there is every indication, now that the citizens have become aroused because of the lawlessness of some of those who are advocating saloons, will cause a great number of men to vote against saloons again, especially as they are now assured that something is going to be done with the undesirable class of citizens who defy the will of the people.

Chamberlain Pardons 285 Criminals, 33 Murderers.

The people of Tillamook County were more than disgusted with Governor G. E. Chamberlain when he paroled A. J. Hembree, the Sandlake murderer, after spending twelve months in the state penitentiary for the murder of his daughter. But as a friend of the criminal class and turning murderers loose, Chamberlain has made a record which shows plainly that he has abused the pardoning power, and it is right that the people should know more about it. Here it is:

In his capacity of Governor, George E. Chamberlain has made free use of the pardoning power. Governor Chamberlain has granted 186 full pardons, commuted 90 sentences and remitted nine sentences, a total exertion of the pardoning power during Governor Chamberlain's term to date of 285 instances. Full pardon has been granted to 13 murderers, to six convicted of murder in the second degree and 14 convicted of manslaughter. Two men convicted of murder have had their sentences commuted. This is part of the official record of Governor Chamberlain who now seeks to be elected United States Senator for Oregon in the June election against H. M. Cake, and should the vote be close and the element that Governor Chamberlain has favored be inclined to show their gratitude, there are enough pardoned criminals in Oregon to throw the election in his favor. Go down into Portland's Bad Lands and you will find that George E. Chamberlain is hugely popular there.

Among the men pardoned were some who were convicted of horrible crimes, such as James L. Warren, who murdered the mate of a ship in Portland harbor a number of years ago. "Chick" Houghton's sentence was commuted, but afterwards this was rescinded. Houghton was convicted of larceny a few days ago. James White, who is in the sailor boarding house business, and who was convicted for brutal treatment to a seaman, was accorded a conditional pardon with out ever serving a day in prison for the crime for which he was convicted. Paddy Lynch, another sailor boarding house artist, had his sentence for kidnaping a sailor commuted.

It would be interesting to know how much of the taxpayer's money it took to prosecute these 285 cases of crime, yet the governor has seen fit to throw open the prison doors to them. The Hembree parole is a fair criterion of Chamberlain's abuse of the pardoning power.
