The Nehalem Horse Company's stallion Planer will be at Easter's barn Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays; at Fred Zaddach's, on the Nehalem, Tuesdays afternoons and Wednesday mornings; and at the Whitney Co.'s ranch, half a mile west of the W. N. Vaughn place, Fridays and Sundays.
The Anti-Saloon League, which has been carrying on an active campaign in all parts of the county, predict a large majority for local option on Monday, as it is ascertained that the farmers are greatly opposed to saloons, especially the kind of saloons which were allowed to run in Tillamook City for so many years.
Chas. V. Galloway stumped the county this week for Governor Chamberlain, but as the people of this county are disgusted with the governor on account of his abuse of the pardoning power, and especially in paroling Hembree, he did not succeed in creating any enthusiasm. Like most other democrats Galloway is touched with the Statement No. 1 fever, or to put it more truthfully, any old thing to defeat the republican party.
Mr. Frank Nordberg, Woo's, Ore., who requested a fish hatchery, received the following letter in reply: "My Dear Sir: Answering your favor of May 12th, beg to say that I expect to go to Tillamook shortly, at which time I shall give myself the pleasure of looking you up, and at the same time will go over the grounds thoroughly relative to establishing a hatchery in your section. The annual meeting of the Tillamook Development League was held on Monday evening at the city, there being a good attendance of business men. The officers elected for the ensuing year were H. T. Botts, president; E. T. Haltom, vice-president; Carl Haberlach, secretary; M. F. Leach, treasurer. Erwin Harrison, Alex. McNair and P. W. Todd were elected on the executive committee. A matter of considerable importance to

Tillamook City was brought up by Carl Haberlach, who proposes to enlarge the territory embraced in the Port of Tillamook Commission and to levy a small tax to straighten Hoquarton slough and to give eight feet of water at low tide. This would allow any vessel to come to this city that could cross the bar. The proposition was well received, and Carl Haberlach, F. R. Beals and P. W. Todd were elected a committee to take the matter in hand.
A banquet was tendered Mr. Geo. L. Davis, chief engineer of the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company, by the business men of this city on Thursday night, which was a most successful affair, when some excellent speeches were made in regard to the railroad by Mayor S. S. Johnson, H. T. Botts, John O. Bozorth and others, all complimenting Mr. Davis on his work, and in reply Mr. Davis made a fine talk, creating considerable enthusiasm for the success of the railroad.
Anti-Saloon Meeting.
There was a large congregation at the U. B. church on Sunday evening to hear Mr. Knodell, secretary of the Anti-Saloon League, who is a fine talker and gave a splendid address, using good logic throughout. One reason he gave for the wide-spread opposition to the saloon was that the churches of all denominations were arrayed against it. The Press of the country was carrying on a warfare against the saloon, the fraternal orders were against it and they had expelled saloon keepers from their lodge rooms, all the institutions of learning were against it, and the home, that most sacred institution, was uncompromisingly opposed to saloons. He then proved that it was the votes of the church people, the votes of the fraternal orders, the votes of the young men who had been taught the effect of alcoholism upon the human system in educational institutions, and the voice of the Press, which were bringing about such a strong sentiment against the saloon business. Mr. Knodell was taken violently sick on Sunday night, and on Monday it was thought he had been poisoned, for he had violent pains in his stomach. He was unable to fill his appointments at Beaver and Cloverdale. It seems that in coming over the Wilson road the buggy upset in the river, and being wet and cold when he arrived here, it was afterwards thought that this might have had some thing to do with his sickness.
