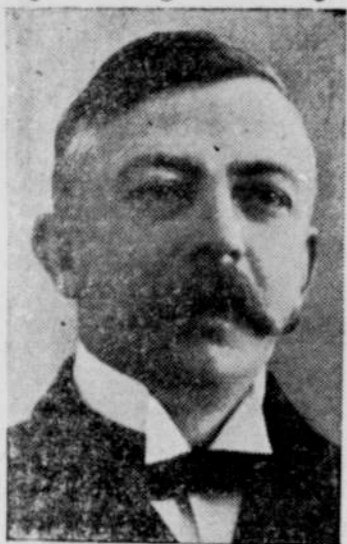

**Make it Unanimous.**

Just now there appears to be little doubt but that it is Senator Cake of Oregon. Once the campaign started it was speedily seen that the oft-heralded personal popularity of George the Governor was not so almighty stout as it once was. Various things that some folks have known about our chief executive have come to light, and a lot of folks are today doubtful if George was such a whale of a man after all.

The nearer Oregon makes it unanimous for Cake the better for Oregon. There are a few places where party politics still count; they don't usually in city, county and district affairs; but they do in national affairs, especially in the upper house of Congress, where the majority party gets what it wants and the minority sits tight and waits. Ore-

gon wants a lot of things from Congress; it can never get them through a democratic Senator.

Between the men personally the issue is not drawn; it is not a personal campaign; if it was Mr. Cake would not be on the defensive.

It is also remembered that Cake was one of the Republicans who had the nerve to stand on a Statement No. 1 platform when it looked as though that meant defeat; he stood for the popular election of the United States Senator whether it profited him or not; Chamberlain has stood for it because it was his sole chance of ever landing the place.

The vast difference between being good because you hope it will pay, and because it is right, represents the difference between the stand of Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Cake.

**The Hembree Case.**

Ab Hembree, a degenerate scion of a family honored in the early history of Yamhill County, has again been found guilty of murder. His victim in this instance was his daughter, and the charge upon which he has been convicted is murder in the first degree. His former trial was for the murder of his wife, the two crimes having been committed at the same time in the poor home of the family on a ranch in the wilds of Tillamook County. The finding of the jury in the first trial was a "compromise" verdict, the accused being convicted of manslaughter and given an indeterminate sentence. He was committed to the penitentiary and afterwards was paroled by Governor Chamberlain. His arrest for the murder of his daughter followed, and his conviction resulted.

The case has attracted wide attention and the leniency shown the accused has caused deep and widespread indignation among people who know Hembree best. Why, if guilty as charged, of the murder of his wife—a most atrocious killing—he should have been adjudged guilty of manslaughter and given a sentence that permitted his parole, is inexplicable to the well-balanced mind. If guilty, he should have been hanged twice, if that were possible. Certainly in that event his lawful execution is long overdue. If not guilty, he is and has long been entitled to his freedom. That change of venue from Tillamook County to Polk County did not benefit him is not strange in view of the evidence against him, some of which revealed the most abhorrent motive for the murder of his daughter. Pardon or parole, given such a creature, is a grave abuse of executive clemency, and is inexplicable upon any ground of simple justice, true mercy or common decency.—Oregonian.

**BE LOYAL TO TILLAMOOK COUNTY.**

**Action of the Yamhill County Political Tricksters Denounced by the Yamhill Co. Press.**

**A. G. BEALS ENDORSED BY PROMINENT CITIZENS OF TILLAMOOK COUNTY FOR JOINT REPRESENTATIVE.**

The people have a direct primary law, doing away with the convention method of nominating candidates for all state and county offices.

Mr. A. G. Beals, the regular Republican nominee, in securing his nomination, strictly complied with that law.

He presented his claims to the voters of the district, having confidence that the record made by him in the last session of the legislature would be approved.

If any fault was to be found with Mr. Beals, either as a candidate or with his legislative record, the field was open to any other Republican who desired to become a candidate if he thought Mr. Beals was not worthy of the position. But it appears that a few politicians, representing a few precincts of Yamhill County, without consulting Tillamook County, took it upon themselves, to constitute or form a self appointed body, or machine, and named Sam Laughlin in opposition to Mr. Beals.

We believe that Mr. Beals course in submitting his candidacy to the people under the direct primary law was the only proper course, and that Laughlin and his supporters by taking the course they have, have surpassed the old machine or ring method, enforced before the adoption of the Direct Primary Law, thus trampling under foot this law which placed in the hands of the people the direct right to make their own nominations.

Tillamook has no independent representation in the legislature, but is joint with Yamhill County.

For the last twenty-five years, without an exception, Tillamook County has been conceded the Joint Representative by Yamhill County, except when she had representation in the senate, in which case Yamhill County was very cheerfully conceded the joint representative.

If the voters of this district defeat Mr. Beals at the June election, Tillamook County will be without Representation in the house or senate, and as many local questions of vital importance are constantly arising, which a non-resident of the County could not properly pass upon, Tillamook County should be allowed to have a Representative from among her own residents.

Mr. Beals introduced and secured the passage through the House of many important measures, among which was the Beals' timber bill, which would have saved the people of Tillamook and Yamhill Counties over sixty thousand dollars. This bill was defeated in the Senate by a powerful lobby representing the timber and railroad interests. It was discussed in the columns of the Oregonian and other leading newspapers throughout the state, and was considered one of the most meritorious and important measures before the legislature.

The pledge taken by Mr. Beals before the primaries to support the Republican voters' choice for U.S. Senator meets with our approval and eliminates any chance of corrupt practices in the election of a U.S. Senator. We have known Mr. Beals for many years; he is a man whose character is without a blemish; he is a man of ability; if he is returned to the legislature, he will not attend as a representative of any special interest, and will look after the interests of the people as a whole.

He cannot be considered as in any way representing corporation or banking interest, having no connection with any bank or corporation whatever. Mr. Beals is a farmer, and all legislation affecting the farming interests of this state will receive his most careful attention.

We take this means of endorsing the candidacy of Mr. Beals and ask the favorable consideration of all voters of this District, who are interested in the people having proper and fair representation in the legislature by a man nominated by the people and not by a ring who has violated the Primary Law, and the rights of the people of Tillamook County.

In commenting on the ring that nominated Sam Laughlin, the North Yamhill banker, in opposition to A. G. Beals, the McMinnville News Reporter among other things has this to say:

The mugwump McMinnville convention named two more McMinnville men for the legislature, then ignored Tillamook County, which had no voters present, and to which the representative has been conceded, it placed another slated Yamhill man in the field for the place. It is true that one or two politicians had written from that county endorsing Sam Laughlin, but is that the people?

In calling attention to the Laughlin ring and lack of representation at the mugwump meeting that named Laughlin for Joint Representative, the Newberg Graphic states as follows:

At the fusion convention held at McMinnville last Saturday, the only nominations made were Sam Laughlin for Joint Representative and J. G. Eckman and M. F. Corrigan for Representatives. Senator Colwell and John Larkin were there to represent Newberg Democrats, while one other lone citizen from Newberg who voted the Republican ticket at odd times when in good humor was present and took part in the cut and dried proceedings.
