

Editorial Snap Shots.

We hope no one will get the outside attraction fever or the outside hand fever for the Fourth's attractions.

Often we hear people say that a newspaper don't amount to anything. Just let the editor give them a little friendly roast and see how soon they change their tune. Then it is a most serious matter.

Suppose the United States Supreme Court knocks out Oregon's new fangled, crazy initiative and referendum law, and there appears to be some likelihood that it will, what a great big muss it will clean up.

Republicans who thought so little of republican principles and flopped over to Statement No. 1ism will soon be ashamed of themselves, the same as those who flopped to populism, 16 to 1ism, A.P.A. 1ism some years ago are today.

The "drys" in the local option election last week polled 538 to 499 two years ago, and the "wets" 470 votes to 384 in the previous election. It is safe to say that a large proportion of those who voted "wet" have little interest in the county.

Not one of the counties which went "dry" two years ago have gone "wet," and with 15 more counties added to the "dry" territory in Oregon, is a good indication that the people are not going to tolerate saloons any longer if they can prevent it.

Another fool bit of legislation which was enacted by the people last week was the measure to call another election on officials to discharge them. Let's have one right off and call it on the governor, or better still, force an election to see whether Fulton or Chamberlain is the choice of the people for U.S. Senator.

We wonder whether the republican legislators who say they are going to vote for Governor Chamberlain have ever stopped to consider that they are digging their own political graves? As sure as anything they will be knifed, and badly so, for forsaking republican principles and taking up with Statement No. 1ism.

If the United States Supreme Court declares the initiative and referendum to be unconstitutional all the "dry" counties and precincts in Oregon will immediately become "wet," and the Anti-Saloon Leagues will see a big rush of saloon men into the "dry" territory and doing business before the "drys" can head them off.

It is to be hoped that the next state legislature will do something to stop the practice of sweating in voters on election day. Plenty of time and opportunities are given to register, and those who fail to do so should not be allowed to vote. The practice of rounding up a lot of voters and have them vote for certain candidates is getting too rotten.

Tillamook is the only county in the state which gave woman suffrage a majority vote. We do not know whether in any of the previous elections any of the counties succeeded in getting on the right side of the suffrage question, but as Tillamook county set a good example for all other counties to follow, we suppose it will be in order to say that Tillamook county has fired the first gun in crossing the line for woman suffrage.

We would suggest a great big republican convention in Portland previous to the meeting of the state legislature for the purpose of reading out of the party any republican legislator who intends voting for a democrat for U.S. senator. As the republicans in Oregon need to be disciplined, this would be a good way to start in, or, better still, put the recall law in effect on them before they have an opportunity to cast their vote to send a democrat to the U.S. senate.

Republicans in Tillamook county were greatly surprised when Mr. W. K. Barrett flopped over to Statement No. 1ism after receiving the nomination for Joint Senator, but like so many other republicans who did not see through the trick to defeat the republican party, he fell a prey to the passing clamor of the politicians who wanted to dictate as to who he should vote for in the senatorial contest. All we need say is that if Mr. Barrett ever casts his vote for Chamberlain for U.S. Senator he will be misrepresenting his constituents. Mr. Barrett obtained his nomination with the understanding that he would vote for a republican for U.S. senator, and he should have stayed with it. Staunch republicans are getting tired of this flopping flip-flop business which they are going to resent.

If the Tillamook "blind pigs" ran up against the strong arm of the law occasionally, and were dealt with in the same manner as they are in other places, we are inclined to think that they would all soon have the "blind staggers." So as to keep our readers posted, we take this from our Eugene exchange:

Joe Jacobs, who was convicted of selling intoxicating liquors contrary to law, appeared before Justice Bryson to receive his sentence. The judge took occasion to give the defendant a little good advice and tell him some things. He said: "You have openly and voluntarily violated the laws of the state of Oregon, not once, but repeatedly. You have gone further. You have sold liquors at your

home in the presence of your innocent little children. The court does not say you have perjured yourself, but you have done enough, after having been repeatedly warned, to give you the limit of the law. You are, therefore, required to pay into this court the sum of \$500 and you will be confined in the county jail for a period of thirty days. You are now in the custody of the constable."

Last Monday was the Headlight's 21st birthday. During that time it has gone through various vicissitudes and met with strong opposition at times. It still survived, the pioneer newspaper of this county, to reach its majority. It has been loyal and true to the interests of Tillamook county, outspoken and fearless, and for that reason it has always had a large number of staunch friends as well as bitter enemies who have come under the limelight of the Press. It had its duty to perform, and although sometimes most unpleasant, the Headlight has not been sparing in criticism of what have been going on. Alone and for several years it waged war on the gambling joints and low dive saloons in this city and for the enforcement of law, and it succeeded in creating such a sentiment against them that the people took the matter into their own hands and closed them out. We simply mention this to prove that the Headlight has been and still is an important factor in molding public opinion. The Headlight has no apologies to make for the stand it has taken. It enters upon its 21st year with the assurance that the people of the county are going to stay with it in the future as they have in the past, for it is the newspaper they have relied upon for county news and to look after their interests and the interests of the county. It is no bed of roses to run a successful newspaper in Tillamook with so many "special interests" and business interests at variance, permeated to some extent with the old rule or ruin spirit which predominated here for so many years, with the whole community split up into social and political cliques ready to knife one another on the least provocation. The Headlight has survived through all this, and it will not be long before a better condition of affairs takes the place of the old rule or ruin regime, which has been going to pieces since the saloons were closed.

The editorial in our contemporary in defence of Mayor Johnson can only be compared to an attorney's argument who has no case, but who has to make some kind of showing in court to crawl out of it. We will not take the space nor the time to puncture the inspired editorial, for that would be a most easy task, but just for the fun of it we will show how easy it is to do so. The editorial says: "Now, as a matter of fact, this detective sent here to round up the law breakers was not sent by the District Attorney, neither did the taxpayers foot the bill at all. They had nothing to do with it at all for the man was hired on a salary by the Anti-Saloon League from a Portland detective agency." This looks awfully plausible and given as facts. Now for the actual facts and to come to the point without wasting words: In the March term of the county court a bill was filed by the District Attorney, which the court had to allow, to pay for this detective work, and published in the court's proceedings in the Headlight on March 5th, thus:

John H. McNary, district attorney, procuring evidence \$237.12 That ought to be sufficient proof to convince anyone as to who paid the bill, Mayor Johnson had no right to run out of town the State's witness, any more than he would the government officials who come here to detect the violation of law, and it is a duty the newspapers owe the public to expose such autocratic methods. As we stated last week we do not want to keep harping about such matters and dragging people's names into a controversy of this character, for it is an unpleasant duty for newspapers to have to do so. We want to welcome and class Mayor Johnson amongst those who are in favor of the enforcement of law, for that is where he rightly belongs.

WAITING ON THE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Citizens Have Subscribed Enough Money to Carry out their Agreement.

Nearly eighteen thousand dollars was raised on the subscription out of \$18,500 to be raised as a donation to the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company up to yesterday, and what is lacking of the full amount is guaranteed by a number of prominent businessmen. This money was raised on the condition that the railroad company shall have full control and ready for operation not less than ten miles of the road leading from Tillamook City northward not later than February 1st, 1909; that the railroad company will take upon itself the burden of obtaining whatever rights of way which have not been secured; that the railroad company is to have the road completed and in operation between Tillamook City and Hillsboro not later than June, 1910; and that, if petitioned to do so, the railroad, provided a right of way is obtained, will build a spur to the water front in this city.

The citizens having agreed to subscribe to the amount of the former subscription, and this now being practically raised, it is now up to the railway company to carry out its part of the agreement.

Mr. Thos. Coates, who has been active in getting the people to subscribe, left on the steamer for Portland with the subscription list, and word is expected from there at any time now when work will start up again.
