It was on motion of District Attorney McNary at Dallas, Oregon, that further hearing of arguments in the matter of a new trial for A. J. Hembre, recently convicted of murder in the first degree, was continued to July 9 to give the district attorney opportunity to meet the questions raised by Judge Pipes for the defense. Judge Pipes, in his argument for a new trial raises three questions: First, that Washington county should have been selected by Judge Galloway for the trial of the case, that being the nearest county to Tillamook, the county from which the change of venue was asked; second, that the defendant had been given no opportunity to enter a plea to the indictment in Tillamook county; third, that the verdict of the jury was not according to the evidence given in the trial of the case.

**Death of Grover Cleveland.**  
Grover Cleveland, twice president of the United States, died last week at his home, "Westlands." Heart failure, combined with pulmonary thrombosis and oedema, was the immediate cause of death. Mr. Cleveland lapsed into unconsciousness and he remained in that condition until the end. Death was peaceful. Just before he died Mr. Cleveland sought to say something, but his words were inaudible.  
Mrs. Cleveland was the only member of his family with him when he died.
