War Upon Betting.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—District Attorney Everett J. Brown, of Alameda County, wherein is located the Emeryville race track, inaugurated a statewide campaign today for the abolition of racing in California. Mr. Brown has studied the law on the question and says the present statutes are so framed as to protect gambling. Clubs will be organized during the week and preparations made to force the issue in the next Legislature.

"I suppose that, as a politician, so-called, I am rushing in where angels fear to tread," said Mr. Brown, "but the situation demands immediate attention. Unless the public is aroused, candidates for the Legislature this Fall are apt to pass by this momentous question. With the public eye focused upon them, nomination for legislative positions are not so likely to overlook the case.

"It simply means that the state must enact a sweeping law which shall prohibit all poolselling and gambling on horse races at all times and all places in the state. As our laws stand, I assert that they protect racetrack gambling and designedly so. I have examined the law at the instance of persons who are much interested in shutting down racetrack gambling. It is patent that there is no law at present on the statute books which can thus be invoked.

"There is not a doubt in my mind that seven-eighths of the people in California are opposed to racetrack gambling, and there is also no question in my mind that the time has come for action.

"The matter has appealed to me forcibly and I purpose next week in my address on the subject to 'go to the bat' and tell some plain truths on this subject and a few correlated ones."

A recent shipment from Seattle was 1500 live chickens ordered for a point 2200 miles away in Northern Alaska. Eggs are golden in that region, and, in fact, eggs are eggs anywhere. The indelible hen is one of the greatest industrial triumphs.

By a new arrangement with Italy a parcel can be mailed to that country from any Post Office in the United States for 12 cents a pound up to 11 pounds. Between any two Post Offices in the United States the charge would be 16 cents a pound, with a weight limit of 4 pounds. This must be where the reduction absurdum steps in to remove the subject from the domain of reason.

In an interview at his London office, Sig. Marconi told of two new and important improvements to his wireless system, on which he has been working, and which are nearly ready for general application in the trans Atlantic service. One is a duplex arrangement whereby messages may be sent both ways at once without confusion, and the other is a device for enabling a ship in a fog to determine the exact location in distance and direction of another ship or of the wireless station on shore. The latter improvement is hailed with great satisfaction by the coast liners and the traffic in the St. Lawrence River, where fog hinders navigation and causes many collisions.
