HIGHWAYMAN ROBS TILLAMOOK STAGE.

Passengers Held Up and Plundered.

NORTH YAMHILL, Or., July 2.—Stepping from the brush and leveling a double-barrel shotgun at the head of the driver, a lone highwayman held up the North Yamhill-Tillamook stage, four miles west of this city, shortly before 11 o'clock this morning.

He took a trifle over \$20 in change from the three passengers and the driver, cut open the mail pouch and took three of the four registered packages, leaving behind the one containing a box of shoes. The robber wore a white mask to hide his face. He was not in the least nervous and appeared to be experienced in the holdup game.

Frank Perkins was driving the stage. His three passengers were Mrs. Beatrice Stranz, of Centralia; Ernest Raymond, of Centralia, and J. B. Cartwright, of Portland.

Girl Shrieks, but Doesn't Faint.

The mail sack was recovered a few yards from the scene of the holdup, together with the robber's coat and shirt. Bloodhounds have been called from the State Penitentiary at Salem to assist Sheriff Corrigan in the chase.

Mrs. Stranz and the driver were alone in the stage while ascending a steep grade, Cartwright and Raymond walking behind, when the highwayman appeared suddenly from a clump of bushes and ordered the driver to halt. Perkins was inclined to start his team forward on the run, but the robber explained in no uncertain terms that he would shoot to kill unless his order was obeyed at once.

The young woman shrieked, but she didn't faint, and when told to throw her purse from the seat flung it defiantly at the foot of the robber, who by this time had covered the two men walking behind the stage.

Boy Scoops \$20 Into Hat.

Young Raymond, who is a half-brother of Mrs. Stranz, was ordered to empty the contents of his pockets on the ground and to go through the pockets of his companion, while the latter held his hands skyward. Raymond was then ordered to get the driver's money.

The purses and loose money were thrown on the ground beside the robber, and the mail sacks dumped from the stage. Raymond accidentally let his hat fall, and as he stooped to pick it from the road he managed to get a \$20 gold piece of his own from the ground into the hat and safely onto his head. Cartwright is also \$20 ahead of the robber, Raymond having purposely overlooked a fat wallet in one of his companion's inside pockets.

Scene of Holdup Six Years Ago.

The holdup occurred about three and a half miles west of this city at the same point where the same stage was robbed six years ago. That robber was never captured. After the holdup, Driver Perkins continued on his trip toward Tillamook, until he met the incoming stage, when he transferred and came back to North Yamhill to report the robbery and to assist in a hunt for the bandit.

V. Z. Runnels, local agent for the stage company, says a posse will be organized when the bloodhounds arrive from Salem and unless the robber escaped on a horse there is a good chance to overtake him.

CENTRALIA, Wash., July.—Mrs. Beatrice Stranz, who was a passenger on the Tillamook stage when it was held up near North Yamhill today, is the wife of Frederick Stranz, of this city. With her brother, Ernest Raymond, she left here Monday night to visit her mother, Mrs. Audy Osborne.

No Tobacco for Boys.

In the Canadian parliament a member protesting against the passage of an anti-cigarette bill declared that at the age of 15 he was earning his own living and smoked thus contributing to the revenue of the country. The unique plea in favor of allowing boys to smoke did not, however, appeal with any force even to those who have been making a great noise about the increasing expenses of the dominion.

The new Canadian law aims at restraining young persons from the use of tobacco in any form. The age limit has been made 18 years, and there is a stringent provision for a fine on any one who sells or gives tobacco to a boy, whether for his own use or not. An unsuccessful effort was made to amend the bill so that it would absolutely prohibit the importation, manufacture or sale of cigarettes.

CHURCH WILL BUILD.

United Brethren Decide to Erect Tabernacle at Tillamook.

The fifty fifth annual Oregon Conference of the United Brethren Church opened its session Friday, July 3rd, in the First Church at Portland with Bishop W. M. Bell, D. D., of Berkeley, Cal., presiding.

Rev. W. W. Rosebraugh, pastor of the First United Brethren Church at Tillamook, was elected conference secretary, Dr. W. R. Funk, of Dayton, O., of the denomination, was made an advisory member, Dr. C. E. Cline was given the same honor and spoke briefly.

Dr. F. W. Jones, presiding elder, submitted his report for the year. Among his recommendations was that the conference campground in Tillamook County be once more used by the Oregon Conference for its campmeetings and conventions. He said that in years gone by the old campmeetings held on these grounds had been effective. His idea was to enlarge the old method and erect a permanent tabernacle, in which all conferences and similar gatherings should be held. The recommendation was considered the most important coming before the conference. Dr. Jones also declared that the Oregon Conference needed an old time campmeeting to wake it up.

Bishop Castle, a noted pioneer bishop, spoke with great force in favor of the recommendations, and fairly carried the conference with his address, as he depicted the old time campmeetings. After the conference had discussed the measure thoroughly, the recommendation of the presiding elder was adopted unanimously. The motion carried with it the appointment of a committee of five by the presiding bishop to handle the project. This action means the erection of a permanent tabernacle for campmeetings, conventions and lectures on the tract owned by the conference in Tillamook, for which money will have to be provided.
