Rollie W. Watson broke two springs of his automobile in this city, one when he came in on Tuesday and another as he was about to leave the next morning with a load for McMinnville, which caused the delay of the trip until Thursday. The cross walks were the cause of the accidents, and to prevent these accidents in future, it would be well for the street committee to order a few loads of gravel and have it placed where it is most needed.

Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Banfield came in on Tuesday from Portland in the auto to spend a few weeks with the editor. Mr. Banfield is in the fuel business in that city, handling most of the slab wood from the saw mills in Portland. He is decidedly of the opinion that if the road between Sheridan and Tillamook City was put in proper condition for automobile travel by next year, at least three thousand automobiles would come in from Portland next summer, leaving a large amount of money in the county.

Some interest was taken in three baseball games in this city on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday between Sheridan and Tillamook City, the home team winning only one game, the first, on Sunday, when the score was 9 to 4. Monday's game was in favor of Sheridan with a score of 8 to 3, so also was Tuesday's game with a score of 7 to 6, with ten innings. Several players received slight injuries, and at the last day's game there was considerable bickering in regard to the umpire's decisions.

J. H. Beach was arrested charged with larceny by embezzlement of \$105 18 from R. W. Robitch. He ran the Pleasant Valley store and cheese factory, and it seems that he had drawn a check on the Tillamook County Bank, but did not have sufficient funds in that institution to pay it. He had a preliminary hearing before Judge Sappington this (Thursday) morning, who dismissed the case on the ground that the prosecution had not proved that Beach had not deposited the money in the bank.

Mrs. T. P. Stockton, formerly of Eastern Oregon, has taken the management of the dining room of the Larsen House, and will run it in future. When the dining room was opened up again on Wednesday the tables had a nice clean appearance and the tables were decorated with choice flowers, presented to her by a number of friends in this city. Mrs. Stockton will endeavor to make the dining room of the Larsen House one of the best in the city, providing the best of food and she will strive to please her patrons.

A delightful shower of rain commenced falling on Wednesday, and later in the day it turned into a general downpour, much to the discomfort of the campers and visitors who come to Tillamook for summer vacations. There was quite a bit of oat hay down, but this will not be damaged much if the weather clears up, as in all probability it will in a day or so. One great blessing was that the rain extended to the mountains, thoroughly soaking the timber lands, which allay all fear of forest fires, at least, for a few weeks. The rain will delay the burning of logs and slashing where the land was cleared up this year. Today it is bright and fine.

Prof. J. D. Huston, who was selected as principal of the public school in this city, disappointed the school board by declining the position and sending back the contract. The board held a meeting and chose Prof. James Goldsworthy, of Prescott, Wis., to fill the vacancy, who accepted the position by telegram, in answer to one sent him by the board offering him the position. A contract has been sent him. Prof. Goldsworthy has splendid recommendations, and it was the board's intention to select him in the first place, but as there was some delay in the correspondence, the board did not deem it wise to wait, so selected Mr. Huston. As M. S. Huston was also

employed to teach, and having declined, this leaves another vacancy to be filled.

A check was forged, at Hood River, Ore., for \$116.00 upon a rancher at that place, and the name of Bert Nye was used as an endorsement. Nye came here on July 17th, and upon investigation was found that he did not endorse the check.

There is some mystery attending the whereabouts of Andrew Casker, who is the reuter on B. A. Todd's place at Nehalem, for he has disappeared and no trace of him can be found. He was in the city last week, coming down from Nehalem on horseback, leaving the animal at Harris' barn, and it still remains there. He is a native of Sweden and has been in the county eighteen months. He is a man about 40 years of age. No one can account for his disappearance, and it is doubtful whether he has committed suicide or skipped the country, as he was in debt, but left behind personal property which would more than pay what he was owing. It is said that he acted peculiar at times, and on that account some are inclined to think that he might have committed suicide.

Moses McCrum, of Arleta, a suburb of Portland, undertook to make things tropical at Garibaldi on Tuesday, and he landed up in the county jail for his smartness. He drove in with his wife and family and camped on the beach, and becoming quarrelsome, abused his wife and threatened to clear out the camp when armed with a loaded Winchester shotgun. Sheriff Creusshaw was notified, and he arrested McCrum, bringing him to this city and locked him up in the county jail. Next day Mrs. McCrum swore out a complaint, which charged him with assault and battery upon his wife, and Justice Sappington considering the evidence sufficient, bound him over to the circuit court in the sum of \$500. McCrum then wanted his wife to go on his bond, but she refused and was locked up. It seems that drink was the cause of McCrum's actions.

Tropical in the Justice Court.

At the preliminary hearing of the Beach case this morning before Judge Sappington quite an exciting incident took place. Attorney Johnson while addressing the court made the statement that it was a conspiracy on the part of The Tillamook County Bank, W. M. Harrison, Carl Haberlach and others. Mr. Harrison being outside, yelled out "Your a liar." Mr. Johnson rushed to the door, but was prevented from doing anything rash. Justice Sappington said he would not allow anything like that to go on in his court and Mr. Harrison apologized to the court for butting in.

DR. T. W. ROSS IS SUED.

J. S. Stephens wants \$5,350 Damages for Alleged Negligence.

A suit was filed in the circuit court on Friday by J. S. Stephens against Dr. T. W. Ross, who is wanting to be compensated to the amount of \$5350 for alleged negligence in attending to plaintiff's injuries, who was thrown out of a rig in the mountains and received serious injuries Jan. 1907, and Dr. Ross was called to attend to the injuries.

In his complaint plaintiff alleges that on the 1st January he sustained serious injuries to his right shoulder, by having his shoulder severely wrenched and the muscles and ligaments severely sprained and the bones injured and his shoulder dislocated and thrown out of place. He engaged defendant to attend to his injuries, and alleges that the doctor carelessly and negligently and in a grossly negligent and unskillful manner overlooked the dislocation of the shoulder, and failed to discover the same and failed to set the bones of the shoulder in their proper place, and for a great length of time after the injuries and the commencement of the treatment, for a period of about 39 days thereafter, defendant prescribed for the injury while the bones of plaintiff's shoulder were still dislocated and out of place, to be treated by swinging his arm, applying liniment and other applications to the shoulder and injury, vigorously rubbing the same, and by massage and other similar treatments, all of which greatly aggravated the injury, resulting in the stiffening of the shoulder and causing the same to be and remain permanently out of place, stiff and painful, and rendering the right arm and the hand thereof almost useless and causing the injury to become permanent. That by reason of which plaintiff was and is greatly injured in his health and constitution, and has suffered and does now suffer great pain and was greatly weakened in body, for which plaintiff wants \$5,000 damages. He also claims that he was in the insurance business and earned about \$100 per month, and that by reason of defendant's alleged negligence plaintiff was unable to use his arm in carrying on his business in any manner whatever for a period of more than three months after he should have recovered under careful and skillful treatment, thereby sustaining special damages in the sum of \$150; also for \$200 expended in procuring other treatment, making in all \$5,350 damages.

The Doctor Sues for Services.

Not having been paid for his professional services while attending to J. S. Stephens' injuries, Dr. Ross sued Wm. J. Stephens in the justice court for the sum of \$175.00. Stephens having engaged Ross to attend to his father's injuries, and has refused to pay or settle the bill.
