Moses McCrum, who was bound over to the circuit court last week for assault upon his wife while camped at Garibaldi, furnished bail, Sheriff Crenshaw demanding \$200 additional to the bail fixed by the justice.

The lumber schooner Gotana, which sailed in over the bar, brought in the dynamo and other material for the new electric light company, and it is expected that it will not be long now before the plant will be in operation.

A suit was filed in the circuit court by W. A. Williams against Andrew Casper to recover \$91.45 for goods and merchandise and for money due upon a promissory note executed by defendant to E. K. Scovell.

In the J. S. Stephens vs. Thos. W. Ross case, in which the former claims \$5,350 for malpractice, the defendant in his answer to the complaint moves to require the plaintiff to make the complaint more definite and certain.

Fred C. Skomp informs us that the altitude of the pass, going up the north fork of the Trask river is only 1,550 ft., and if this is the case surely this will make a desirable route for one of the electric lines headed for Tillamook.

The passengers who left here Tuesday on the Sue H. Elmore were D. B. Chovan, Miss Van Patten, C. S. Jackson, Herbert Ashton and company, D. Williams, E. C. Varner, E. D. Barrett, F. E. Bess and wife, B. Imdorf, L. Hogland, O. Olsen and A. Kimmmerer.

In the suit brought by Dr. T. W. Ross against W. J. Stephens, for \$175 for medical services to his father, Stephens claims that he did not engage the doctor. The case will be tried on Monday before Justice Sappington and a jury.

Mr. Lewis Russell, president of the Portland Automobile Club, with about a dozen automobiles will visit Tillamook City next week, when it would be a good idea for the county officials to meet with the officers of the automobile club with a view of coming to some understanding in regard to the improvement of the roads in this county.

Julius Erickson was arrested on a complaint sworn to by Dan Hickey for trespassing upon his place at Nehalem. It seems that W. H. Sales rented the place, but had moved off. He gave Julius Erickson charge of the place. Hickey rented the place to other parties, claiming that Erickson was not right on the premises. The case is set for this afternoon.

A divorce suit was filed in the circuit court by Joseph L. Johnson against his wife, Cecil S. Johnson. These parties were married at Vancouver, Wash., on March 17, 1907, and then moved to Tillamook, and after a month's married life Mrs. Johnson deserted her husband, that being the grounds set forth in the complaint praying that the marriage contract be dissolved.

Mr. C. S. Jackson, of the Oregon Journal, and sons, F. and P. Jackson, came in from Portland on Monday. They pumped their way over the Coast range, coming in by way of the Wilson river on bicycles. Having hit the high places on the mountains, Mr. Jackson decided to go out on the steamer, which left here on Tuesday, to undergo the experience of hitting the high places on the Pacific ocean.

All of those who took the examination for county papers last week passed and received teachers' certificates. viz.: 1st grade, Ellen Bewley, Clara Eichinger, Verne Seston and Joseph Moffett; 2nd grade, Daisy Allender and Paul Hanson; 3rd grade, Ruth Gray and Katie Sheets. Amelia Miles Robinson, of Washington County, and Irma Madill, of Marion County, who took the examination in other counties, sent their papers in and were also granted certificates.

Word was received in this city on Wednesday that Frank Reynolds died in the Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland that morning from blood poisoning. He was a nephew of C. E. Reynolds and left here about six years ago, working in Portland a few years and then went to work in a logging camp in Washington. It seems that he injured his hand and blood poisoning setting in he was taken to the hospital in Portland, where he died. He was 47 years and leaves a wife and two boys. Miss Cosy Clark left for Portland this morning to attend the funeral.

W. Wheeler Dies Suddenly.
Word was received in this city Wednesday that Will Wheeler had died suddenly in Portland the previous evening. He was taken to that city about two weeks since, going out on the tug Geo. R. Vosberg. He appeared to be getting along nicely and his doctor allowed him to be up. In moving around too soon it is thought that a clot of blood from the injured parts went to the heart, causing sudden death. Wheeler was injured at Nehalem while assisting in loading large logs on a barge. He was caught at the

hips between two logs, which caused serious injuries. Deceased was a brother of C. H. Wheeler, of the Wheeler Lumber Company, and was well known and greatly respected in the county. He was for some time engaged as cheese maker in this county, but in recent years made his home in Portland.

RAILROAD OFFICIALS IN TILLAMOOK.

Prospects Look Bright for Work on P. R. & N. Road Being Resumed.

Mr. J. Kruttschmitt, chief of construction of the Harriman system, and his son, Mr. J. Kruttschmitt, jr., with Mr. W. W. Cotton, attorney for the same system, and Mr. E. E. Davis, president of the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co., and Engineer Geo. L. Davis, came in on Wednesday from Portland.

They came to Tillamook for the purpose of making an inspection of the work on the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co.'s railroad, which is under agreement to complete ten miles of the road, north of Tillamook City, by the end of next February. Mr. Kruttschmitt is out inspecting the Harriman system.

Mr. Lytle made the statement last night that he had sold the bonds of the P. R. & N. Co. to Mr. Harriman.

There appears to be every indication that work will be started up soon, or as soon as Mr. Kruttschmitt has gone over the ground and made his report.

The party went as far as Nehalem to day, and will leave to morrow, going out over the Wilson river road so as to give Mr. Kruttschmitt some idea of the magnitude of the timber resources of the country, there being something like forty billion feet of standing timber tributary to the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co.'s road.

Tillamook Stage Robber Arrested.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18.—Deputy Sheriff Buchanan, of Chico, arrived here today to take possession of Mat Jackson, the highwayman, whom he believes to be one of the men that robbed 15 workmen near Sterling City, Aug. 10. The detectives here say they are positive Jackson is the highwayman who held up a stage at Tillamook, Ore., securing \$1,000, some time ago. They believe he is one of the gang that has been robbing postoffices in this state and Oregon.

Mrs. C. W. Talmage is Dead.

We are sorry to announce the death of Mrs. Talmage, wife of Attorney C. W. Talmage, which took place in this city on Tuesday night, after a long and painful illness. The cause of death was pernicious anaemia. Deceased's maiden name was Susie Richardson, and she was born in Harrison County, Missouri, on the 11th May, 1862, and came West two years later, her parents first locating at Walla Walla, Wash., and then at McMinnville, Ore., where she was married to Mr. C. W. Talmage on Nov. 7, 1880. They came to Tillamook in 1901, where they have since resided. During her residence here Mrs. Talmage made many friends, who deplore her death, for she was greatly respected here and also at McMinnville, where she resided so many years. The sympathy of the community is with her husband in his bereavement. The remains were taken to McMinnville this morning for burial.

FREIGHT ON CHEESE LOWER Reduced to 24c. Per Case Between Tillamook and Portland.

Mr. Carl Haberlach, who is secretary and salesman for a dozen of the cheese factories in this county, has succeeded in getting the freight on cheese reduced to a fair rate, as the following letter will prove. It seems that the factories have been taxed 45c. per case of gross weight of 78 pounds, which is now reduced to 24c. For several months the dairy interests have been complaining, so much so that a number of dairymen have signified their willingness to put up large sums of money for a new boat.

Mr. Carl Haberlach, Tillamook, Ore.
Dear Sir,—Referring to the matter of rates on cheese from Tillamook to Portland and other points, subject of your letters of July 29th and August 1st.

The subject has been very carefully considered and it has been decided to cancel the current rates as shown in

tariff A. & C. R. No. 923 and effective August 27th on state shipments and September 27th on interstate shipments, substituting therefor a rate on cheese in packages, any quantity, 30c. per 100 lb., actual weight, from Garibaldi, Hobsonville, Bay City and Tillamook to Portland.

On the basis of this rate and the average weight named in yours of July 29th, adding an average of 10 lb. for the package, will result in a rate of about 21c. per case of "twins" and about 24c. per case of "triplets," and will, I am sure, after being given a fair trial prove more satisfactory to all concerned than any rate per case could possibly be.

It does not appeal to us as being fair that a box of cheese shall be transported for a fixed price regardless of the weight, it having been shown that the net weight of cheese varies to an extreme of approximately 30 per cent.

Ocean carriers often waive considerations of this character when the measurement of the freight is excessive in comparison with the weight, but there is little difference in the weight and measurement of cheese as shipped from Tillamook, particularly the heavier packages.

I suggest you arrange, beginning with August 27th, to show the exact gross weight of your shipments on shipping receipts and that you arrange to give this new rate a fair trial. If this is done I feel assured that you will agree with me that the new rate is a proper one.
