She will be put on the run between this city and bay points. On Sunday she took a party down and went out over the bar for deep sea fishing.

W. E. Stanley came near being shot on Saturday. He was outside his barn and a few scattering shots fell at his feet, and soon after a small bullet passed directly over his head and imbedded itself in the barn. Mr. Stanley was unable to ascertain who the parties were, but it shows again the reckless manner in which fire arms are being used, endangering people's lives.

Rev. D. H. Hare preached his farewell sermon at the Presbyterian church on Sunday evening, and left on Tuesday for Moscow, Idaho, where he will become the pastor of the Presbyterian church in that city. Mr. Hare made many friends while residing here, who regret that he had to resign principally on account of Mrs. Hare's poor health, and to seek a dryer climate, which he succeeded in doing while on a summer's vacation.

Towing a barge stacked high with immense cedar logs, the tug Geo. R. Vosburg left Nehalem Monday for Astoria. The timbers were taken to the Portland Lumber Company's mill. It is the biggest shipment of logs that has been seen here on a barge recently. Some of the logs will measure five feet in diameter. They were piled about five high over an ocean going barge more than 200 feet long and 50 feet wide. The logs will be converted into shingles.

While helping to move the county road building machinery (the engine and rock crusher) out to Beaver, Tom Harrison was taken sick and brought back to town last Tuesday by one of the crew with whom he was working. He is now at the Larson Hotel suffering from rheumatism. Before starting on the Beaver trip Harrison was laid up for ten days with some trouble but feeling much better, he undertook this work and the result proved he was still physically unfit for work.

It seems that Curry wrote a letter and used one of the hotel envelopes, which located him in this county, and Sheriff Crenshaw traced him to the logging camp, where he was arrested and then locked up in the county jail. The deputy sheriff of Wheeler county is on his way in to take him out.

J. H. Beach was bound over on Saturday to the circuit court by Justice Sappington on a charge of larceny by embezzlement, the bail being placed at \$500 by the justice, which was furnished and Beach was released. Beach was the cheese maker for the Pleasant Valley Cheese Association, and some of the patrons failing to obtain money for the cheese, have been trying to hold Beach on a criminal charge, which they succeeded in doing on Saturday, this being the second time that Beach was before the justice on a similar offence.

It was eminently proper that the meeting of the Oregon Good Roads Association should be held in Tillamook, for in that isolated county can be found a few of the best wagon roads in any where in the state. The lack of other means of transportation undoubtedly induced the residents to exercise more care in road construction than they would have otherwise devoted to the task, and now that the railroad seems an assured fact, these fine roads will greatly add to the inducements which Tillamook County can offer settlers. There is still a vast amount of road-building to be done in Tillamook County, but the numerous gravelbedded streams and comparatively easy grades, together with a general disposition on the part of the people for road improvement, will enable the work yet to be done to be carried forward rapidly.—Oregonian.

Suit for Attorney's Fees.

A suit was filed in the circuit court on Tuesday by E. F. Cowing and E. H. Cowing, partners under the firm name and style of Cowing & Cowing, against Claude Thayer, for \$2960. In their complaint plaintiff sets out that during all the times hereinafter mentioned the plaintiffs were partners under the firm name and style of Cowing & Cowing and were engaged in the general practice of the law and particularly in such practice before the Department of the Interior and its subordinate branches.

That during the year 1900 the defendant represented to the plaintiffs that he had an interest jointly with each of 51 contestees in certain contests then pending before the Oregon City Land Office and wherein Chas. E. Hayes was in each of said cases contestant and divers and sundry parties were contestees and said defendant thereupon employed the plaintiffs as attorneys and contracted for their professional services in defending the contests and each and all of them in the names of the contestees.

That in pursuance of such employment the plaintiff during the years 1900, 1901, 1902, 1903, and 1904 performed services for the defendant in defending the contests and in preparing and engrossing various instruments in writing and in counseling and advising the defendant and the various contestees and in attending to and about the business appertaining to the defense of the contests.

That said services so performed for defendant were and are reasonably worth the sum of \$2960.

Commissioners' Court.

The Board of County Commissioners did not get through their business until Wednesday, owing to the delays in going over the county. The Board will meet again on the 29th, having adjourned until that time.

In the matter of the claim of Mrs. Martha Moon, for damages, the County Clerk was instructed to have a deed prepared for a strip of land 40 feet wide, and upon the same being filed he is to draw a warrant of \$50.

Claim of W. W. Wiley for \$10 was continued.

Claim No. 59, viewer's report for \$13 was disallowed.

Claim No. 2, viewer's report for \$18 was continued.

Claim of Eugene Atkinson for \$2.25 was continued.

In the matter of the claim for damages of Henry Dunstan for county road through his place where the present county road is located, the County Clerk was ordered to draw a warrant for the sum of \$20 when a deed for right of way is executed.

In the matter of a letter of communication of Fred Scamp it was ordered that the same be continued for the term and that the County Court will take same under advisement, to be taken up at some future time.

In the matter of the petition of Chas. Johnson and Lizzie Johnson for a county road, the viewers' report was rejected and another board of viewers appointed, viz. Otto Schrader, J. J. McGinnis and C. C. Jensen to view, cut and locate a county road.

In the matter of the petition of S. M. Batterson for a county road, the board of viewers having failed to report, it was decided to appoint another set of viewers to locate a road.

The bid of Alfred O'olson to construct three miles of road around Nearney mountain, for \$5,400, was accepted, and Commissioner Alley was instructed to close up the contract, which calls for the completion of the work by October 1909.

In the matter of the claim of W. N. Bays for damages on Blaine road, the County Clerk was instructed to draw a warrant for \$50 on payment of same upon filing a deed of right of way.

In the matter of the petition of John Theiler for a county road the same was dismissed.

In the matter of the petition of M. A. Cady for county road, the same was continued.

In the matter of cancelling of county warrants, which have been duly advertised, the County Clerk was ordered to cancel the same.

In the matter of damages for Mrs. N. Smith on Blaine road, it was ordered that the County Clerk draw a warrant for \$100 for a strip of land as soon as same is filed.

SHOCKING CRIME.

W. C. Wolfe, the Socialist, is Accused of Rape upon Daughter.

Considerable surprise and indignation were aroused on Friday afternoon when it became known that Sheriff Crenshaw had arrested W. C. Wolfe on a most serious offence, that of attempted rape upon his daughter, Eva Wolfe, in his own home that afternoon. When taken to the court house Wolfe assumed a defiant, angry mood, by taking a knife from his pocket, which the sheriff took from him, and when in the sheriff's office, in charge of Deputy Sheriff Aschim, while the sheriff was hunting up witnesses and procuring evidence, Wolfe undertook to leave the office, remarking that the deputy sheriff could not keep him there, Aschim told Wolfe that he was left in his charge and he was going to keep him there, and forthwith drew his revolver, which caused Wolfe into submission.

Deputy District Attorney Cooper having examined a number of witnesses, a complaint was made out charging Wolfe with rape upon his daughter. He was taken before Justice Sappington, but the sheriff took precautions to put Wolfe in irons. After the complaint had been read the justice asked him if he wanted to consult an attorney. He answered in the negative, and said that he would waive examination, whereupon he was bound over to the circuit court, Justice Sappington placing the bail at \$2,000. The Deputy District Attorney objected to the smallness of the bail, and next day it was raised to \$5,000, and Wolfe being unable to raise this is locked up in the county jail.

The case, as far as we can learn, looks very black against Wolfe.

Wolfe is a socialist and one of the leaders of that party for several years. He raised a red flag during the Fourth of July celebration in this city, for which he was arrested and fined \$50, and this case is to come on again at the circuit court on a writ of review.
