

HILL BEHIND LINE?

Northern Pacific Reported to Own United—Construction is Rushed.

With large construction forces rushing the work between the city limits on the northwest and Linton, the United Railways is making a strong showing. In fact, there is no railroad project near town that is showing more activity at the present time, not excepting the North Bank road, than the United. Chief Engineer Lloyd Wickersham has orders to hurry the work as fast as possible, and he is making the dirt fly to accomplish as much construction as possible before the heavy rains of the winter put a stop to grading operations. Before the rains set in, it is expected to have the line in operation as far as Linton.

The liberal expenditure of money by the promoters of the United Railways leads to the general belief that the Northern Pacific is behind the project and that this road is to be the opening wedge in an Oregon division of the Hill system. Late events have seemed to strengthen this belief. Private individuals interested in such a project would naturally hesitate about digging into their pockets for continued expenditures of money for construction purposes without some return. This feature of the investment does not appear to bother the men behind the United Railways, and work has gone on uninterruptedly for many months with but very little comparative return.

The front-street line is paying a revenue into the company, for a considerable amount of switching of freight cars is done each night, but the sum realized would not by any means pay the interest on the big investment so far made by the company. Private investors usually become discouraged under these circumstances and the inference, supported by a number of significant circumstances, is that the Hill interests own the control of the United project and are putting money into the scheme without stint.

Extensive terminals that will be of use not only to the United Railways, but to the present Hill lines as well, have been secured about Guilds Lake. These terminals are now being filled and brought up to the required level for the building of terminal tracks and freight sheds. At the same point a convenient connection could easily be made with the Hill tracks, so that traffic brought from the Tillamook country and from other Oregon points south of Portland could readily be delivered to the transcontinental Hill roads.

The United Railways route to the Tillamook country and south through the Willamette Valley offers an easy avenue for the Hill roads to open up the whole western half of the state. For obvious reasons, better terms can be made with property owners for rights of way and innumerable advantages gained by operating under the name of the United Railways than in coming out boldly as the Hill lines. It is believed that within a reasonable time, however, the interest of the St. Paul magnate in the United Railways project will be made known.

The Farm Automobile.

The attention of the farming community generally has been turning more and more to the consideration of the availability of the automobile for various farm activities, since the pleasure vehicle has been so much in evidence on the rural highways. It requires no special mechanical training to realize that the appropriate readjustment of the enormous power-factor, now chiefly used for high speed, would adopt it to both the lightest and heaviest farm requirements.

Manufactures of automobiles are also turning their attention to a field which to many of them appears to be exceedingly promising, and experts are studying the needs of both the small and large farmer, to the end that the needs of the farm owner, and his profit, may be made to synchronize with the profit of the mobile implement manufacturer. In a recent number of the Automobile, Victor Longhead tells of progress made in the direction of harnessing the energy used in the flying chariots, and placing it at the disposition of the vast army of producers who have so long relied upon animal power.

The use of steam power on the great grain fields of California is familiar to all visitors to the coast. Mr. Longhead points out that previously these farm engines have been ponderous steam affairs, ranging up to twenty-one tons in weight, and of such dimensions as 24 feet in over all length, 15 feet in width and a height of 20 feet. The largest driving wheels 8 feet in diameter, geared to engines of 110 horse power. They draw gang plows turning thirty six 10 inch furrows at once, and furnish power for heading, threshing and sicking 60-foot swaths from a wheat field. When used as tractors for the transportation of produce, grain and ore, loads aggregating seventy-five tons are hauled on two or three trailers, and thirty-five tons can be freighted up a 15 per cent grade.

In exploiting the farm with internal combustion engines, to replace the steam-driven machines, the demand is found to be for five or six ton machines of smaller size and greater compactness than the steam tractors. It is desirable that they be adapted to plowing orchard ground, and be constructed with reference to operation in close quarters and under the branches of trees. The model thus far developed is only 5 1/2 feet high, 13 feet long and less than 8 feet wide. Up to this time this model has been operated with ordinary two and four cylinder four cycle engines, such as are used in the heavy truck type of automobiles tractors in vogue in England. It is the opinion of the automobile writer that future practice will lead to the use of lighter and more powerful internal combustion engines, more nearly conforming to the advanced type of automobile engines, with from thirty to fifty horse power and weight ranging from five to seven tons. This proposition seems reasonable, both from mechanical and economical points of view, as sixty horse power engines are now commonly used in high speed touring cars.

Great as will be the advantage to the American farmer of the utilization of the internal combustion engine in farming operations, on a small as well as large scale, it will scarcely be greater than that of the manufacturing interests. Incidentally it will add to the general industrial activity by the profitable employment of artisans in constructing the farm automobile.

In many ways the people of the country would be benefited by inducing men who have a practical experience in the managing of great industrial, financial and commercial enterprises to become candidates for public office. They know economic questions better than do the politicians. Their trade connections give them a larger concern in such issues, and furnish them with a greater inducement for studying them thoroughly. Moreover, business men in office are less likely than are the nominees of the politicians to be stamped by demagogues, or to be frightened by the crack of the boss' whip. They would be far less likely to be influenced by the wiles of the hoodler. More than the average man they are conservative. The personal stake which they have in the stability of industry and finance has compelled them to get some acquaintance with the various political panaceas which agitators, from time to time, have urged, and with the different nostrums which ignorant, timid or careless legislators have, at one time and another, enacted.—American Industries for September.
