



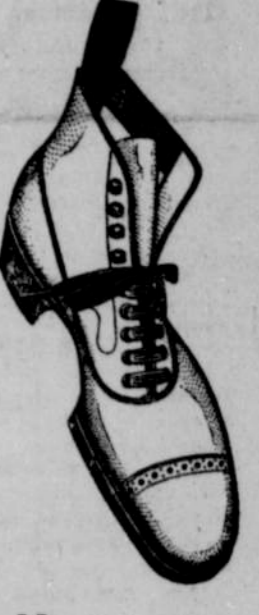

Assessor A. M. Hare will not have the assessment roll completed before the end of the week, but it is definitely known that the valuation of taxable property in Tillamook County will be about \$12,375,000, for the 1908 roll, which is about four million dollars more than it was last year. The Board of Equalization will meet on Monday to take up the assessment roll.
