 she was awarded the first, and she feels
 justly proud in obtaining it in competi-

 for a box of apples grown on his place
 on the Nestucca. It is the King variety
 and they are amongst the finest we have
 seen grown in the county, some of them
 being 12 inches in circumference. We
 have had them photographed to show
 that Tillamook county can grow as fine
 apples as any part of the state.
 G. B. Johnson came in on the steamer
 last week from Astoria. He left Tillamook
 ten years ago to accept a position with
 the Astoria & Columbia River Rail-
 road, and is now the general agent look-
 ing up freight for that company. Mr.
 Johnson came to this county with Thos.
 Coates, and was the publisher of the
 times, which suspended in 1898 for the
 want of patronage.
 Eva Wolfe was spirited away from the
 city last week, presumably to defent the
 prosecution of the W. C. Wolfe rape case,
 as she is the State's principal witness
 against her father, and, we understand,
 that an effort is being made to locate her
 and bring her back. Deputy District At-
 torney Cooper has put her sister, Hazel,
 under examination. Thayer & Nolan are
 attorneys for Wolfe and the Wolfe prop-
 erty at Sandlake has been transferred to
 Claude Thayer.
 The hoodlams broke into M. F. Leach's
 chicken coop at the back of the store and
 stole four chickens on Monday night, and
 next day the feathers and eight chicken
 feet were found near the old creamery in
 the west end of town. Mr. Leach was
 on the tracks of the thieves and found

 A contract was signed on Wednesday
 for the machinery for the Tillamook
 Lumber Manufacturing Company's new
 saw mill, which is to be built on the site
 formerly owned by the Tillamook Lum-
 ber Company. A. L. Bratton, of the
 Portland Machinery Company, in com-
 petition with two other firms, obtained
 the contract, amounting to over \$10,000
 for new machinery. In addition to the
 regular saw mill, it will also contain a
 pony mill, which will save a great deal of
 clear lumber which would go into saw-
 dust if cut with the large tooth saws.
 Plans are now being drawn for the
 building, and as soon as they are sent in
 work will be started.

ANOTHER TILLAMOOK CONSPIRACY.
The State's Witness in the W. C. Wolfe Rape Case is Spirited Away.
 When it became known on Monday
 that Eva Wolfe, the State's witness in
 the W. C. Wolfe case, the latter being
 charged with rape upon his daughter,
 the citizens began to figure out who was
 at the bottom of another Tillamook con-
 spiracy in tampering with the State's
 witnesses, and which, no doubt, will be
 thoroughly investigated by the grand
 jury next month, for District Attorney
 John H. McNary should leave nothing
 unturned or spare any expense in bring-
 ing the culprits to justice. This kind of
 justice has been going on in Tillamook
 too long, for no sooner is a person accus-
 ed of a crime in this county, no matter
 how shocking or revolting, there are
 those who try to defeat the prosecuting
 attorney. The aim and object of this
 new conspiracy is to defeat justice and
 allow Wolfe, the socialist who raped his
 own daughter, to go free. We wonder
 how long the people of Tillamook are
 going to stand that kind of business, for
 this is one of the very things which
 make people resort to lynch law. If
 Wolfe was innocent there would be no
 need of spiriting away the principal
 witness.
Another "Green" Tillamooker.
 Joseph Baumgarten, a young Swiss
 dairyman from Tillamook, came to
 town yesterday and had been here a very
 brief time when he met J. B. Crane and
 A. W. Hepburn. He is now bemoaning
 the loss of \$34 which, he claims, was
 secured from him by his two companions
 by means of an old bunco trick. Crane
 and Hepburn were arrested yesterday
 by detective Howell on a warrant charg-
 ing larceny, sworn to by the young man
 from Tillamook. Baumgarten says he
 was walking along Alder street when
 Hepburn approached him and introduced
 himself as a farmer from San Francisco.
 He invited the dairyman to accompany
 him to his room in a nearby lodging
 house. To this Baumgarten readily
 agreed and on entering the room he
 was introduced to Crane who is said to
 have represented himself to be the
 Northwest agent of the American Watch
 Company. A game was introduced in
 which each of the players was supposed
 to purchase a chance. Baumgarten pur-
 chased and started to go after losing
 the first dollar. But he was persuaded
 to remain and his entire sum was soon
 lost. He realized, he said, that he had
 been swindled, but the others escaped,
 and he reported the affair to the police.
