 tory for Tillamook City is being talked
 up, for we are informed that a party at
 Forest Grove is willing to take half the
 stock provided the dairymen will take

the other half, or controlling interest in
 the same. There is no better location in

 densed milk factory, where, if necessary,
 over 100,000 pounds of milk can be ob-
 tained daily in this vicinity.
 Mr. and Mrs. H. Schollmeyer are in the
 city from Nehalem, the former attending
 court as a jurymen and the latter visit-
 ing friends in this vicinity. Mrs. Schol-
 lmeyer came to the county about twenty
 years ago and has never been out of the

 has accommodation for 30 passengers

 an agreement whereby they will handle
 the business between them, being now
 well equipped for pleasure excursions
 and the towing of log rafts. Mr. Thomp-
 son resided in Tillamook some years ago,
 and we wish the new company success.

 Notice is hereby given,—That on the 7th day of December, 1908, at the City Hall, in Tillamook City, for Tillamook precinct, at the Court House in Tillamook City, for Hoquarton precinct; at the Grange Hall in Fairview precinct for Fairview precinct, and at the South Prairie School House in South Prairie precinct, for South Prairie precinct, all in the County of Tillamook, Oregon, a special election will be held for the purpose of voting upon the question of including in, annexing to and making a part of the Port of Tillamook, a municipal corporation in Tillamook County, Oregon, the following described territory to-wit: All of the territory included within the present voting precincts of Tillamook County, Oregon, known as Tillamook precinct, Hoquarton precinct, Fairview precinct and South Prairie precinct, outside of the portions thereof now included within the present territories of said Port of Tillamook.
