The governor of the state can grant pardon to a criminal, but a sinner seeks pardon through the church.

Thus the abuse of the sexual functions is a sin, if viewed from the light of the church. A crime if judged by the state.

States differ. A man who is a criminal might obtain pardon in one state, or under one governor and not another. So churches differ in dealing with sin.

Under the old Jewish church there was some sacrifice to offer for sin. Christ and his followers advocated repentance for sin.

The state does not always meet out the same punishment for the same crime. Judges and jurors differ in opinion.

A sinner is self confessed before his church. While a criminal must be proved guilty before the state.

It is honorable to go to confession before the church and receive forgiveness, but a disgrace to be convicted by the state.

Men who have no church have no alternate of church and state, but must be treated as criminals.

The Catholic church has regular formulas of dealing with sin and none of its members have an excuse for not living in communion with God. The Protestant churches are incompetent to deal with sin.

The independent church differs from the Catholic church. One is visible, the other invisible. Christ is recognized as the head of the Catholic church, and the Spirit the head of the independent church. For a agrees with form, but the Spirit is without form, therefore, no need of formal worship.

The same Spirit that convicts a man of sin, comforts him when he has forsaken the wrong path and honestly strives for God and the right.
