Port of Tillamook Meeting.
A meeting was held at the opera house on Saturday to explain the object for the enlargement of the Port of Tillamook. Mr. H. T. Botts, who has taken considerable interest in the matter, pointed out the special features of the act and the benefits which would be derived by the entire community by making Tillamook City a deep water port. Those present, especially the farmers, were in favor of the movement, and not one dissenting voice was heard after the situation had been explained. Another meeting was held at Fairview on Monday afternoon, which was attended by a delegation of business men from this city. Mr. Botts again explained the situation, but previously to that it was demonstrated that some of the farmers there had made up their minds to oppose it, and who offered poor arguments, while other farmers were satisfied that it was a good thing and signified their intention to vote for it. Web Maddux was the principal speaker for the opposition, and he butted in so many times and was on his feet so often that it did not give others an opportunity to express their sentiments, as he had taken up so much time in repeating over and over what he had already said. Messrs. Jas. Walton, Rollie W. Watson and Representative A. G. Beals made speeches in favor of a deep water harbor for the center of the county, and they all gave logical reasons for the position they took. Mr. W. M. Harrison, who is heartily in favor of the new Port of Tillamook, was called upon. He cited several instances of parties

coming to him wanting to locate factories near this city, but for the want of deep water facilities they located elsewhere. He believed that Tillamook City would become a manufacturing center, the same the cities on Gray's Harbor, as soon as deep water was obtained, and he pointed out to the farmers present that it would be greatly to their benefit to own farms near a city of 20,000 or 30,000 inhabitants and near the factories, where they would be able to sell all the products they could raise, and which would enhance the value of farm lands situated near a large city.
Snuffers Lose Cases.
