Tillamook will hold an election next Monday to vote on the question of enlarging the territory of the Port of Tillamook, which is organized on similar lines to the Port of Portland. The territory originally included in the Port of Tillamook was somewhat restricted, and as adjoining districts would participate in any benefits resulting from the work of the Port of Tillamook, it will be made to include Hoquarton, Tillamook, Fairview and South Prairie precincts in the district. Tillamook is going to her efforts to secure an adequate outlet by the sea. At a meeting of the city council Monday the license for the moving picture show was reduced from \$20 a month to \$20 a quarter and a petition was presented from the fifth ward for an additional arc light, which was granted. The only other business was allowing bills.
 F. P. Baumgartner has effected arrangements with Samuel Elmore, of Astoria, whereby he will assume control of the business of the steamer Sue H. Elmore, now operating between Astoria and Tillamook Bay. Mr. Baumgartner announces that the steamer will hereafter make regular trips to Portland and all business from this port to Tillamook will be handled from this end and without a transfer at Astoria.—Oregonian.
 Men interested in the dairy industry from all sections of the state are planning to attend the 17th annual convention of the Oregon State Dairy Association, which will be held in Salem on Thursday and Friday, December 10 and 11. Among the leading dairymen of the state who probably will attend the Salem meeting are: State Dairy and Food Commissioner J. W. Bailey, T. S. Townsend, A. H. Lee and Walter Rey, of Portland; T. R. Frakes, of Scappoose, and William Schulmerick, of Hillsboro. Mr. Bailey will read a paper on "Dairy Legislation."
 Fred C. Skomp has been experimenting with certain ores found on the Trask by subjecting them to analysis, samples of which he brought to town. He is under the impression that it is metallic salts, and his version of it is that it is "Thought to be a double metallic salt, one of them supposed to be a constituent of the sun, transmitted to the earth through rays of light coming in contact with elements capable of absorbing light. Is precipitated and segregated by the meteoric waters percolating the vascular earth, believed to be an important pillar in the tower of commerce."
 Mr. L. H. Branstetter, one of the parties who bought the Argo, which will make her first run from Portland to Tillamook on Monday next, after which she will make a trip every five days if the business justifies it, came in on Tuesday to look after the business in this city, and will remain here until the new boat arrives next week. The Argo would have been put on about twelve months ago, but in answer to a letter Mr. Branstetter received from this city at that time he was informed that arrangements had been made for the Argo to be put on the run. Mr. Branstetter is much pleased with the manner he has been received by the business men and the large amount of business promised the new boat without any solicitation whatever. Freight rates from Portland will be \$5 a ton and if the boat is well patronized Mr. Branstetter says that the rate will be reduced to, probably, \$3 a ton. Another thing that is of interest, the vessel will be kept on the run as long as the people will patronize her and she cannot be bought off.

Tillamook, Hoquarton, Fairview and South Prairie Annexed.
 Considerable interest was taken in the election on Monday to annex Tillamook, Hoquarton, Fairview and South Prairie precincts to the Port of Tillamook, when a special election was held and a vote taken. The object in view is to give the center of the county a deep water harbor, something which is greatly needed and which will be of great benefit to the surrounding country. Opposition was strongest in Fairview and South Prairie precincts, where, probably, the situation was not properly understood. The vote stood as follows:
