The home team will debate again with the Astoria high school in that city, when the question is: "Resolved, that it is not practicable for municipalities to own and operate their public utilities."

Congressman Hawley introduced a bill yesterday in the house at Washington asking for an appropriation of \$10,000 to improve the bay and slough and \$5,000 for maintenance, and for an appropriation to have the bar surveyed and to ascertain the cost of a 15ft. channel and one of 20ft. on the bar.

Dr. Henry Morris leaves for McMinnville today on account of the death of his grandfather, H. D. Daniels, one of the early pioneers of Oregon, who was engaged in the flour milling business at Lafayette some years ago. Dr. Morris will be away from his office for several days, as the funeral does not take place until Sunday.

The Shakespeare Club met on Friday at the home of Mrs. Homer Mason, when the ladies of the club enjoyed another pleasant afternoon together. The decorations on this occasion was holly, which presented a pretty appearance and was particularly appropriate at this season of the year. Mrs. Mason served dainty refreshments, which were enjoyed by all present.

Mrs. Anna Ebbesen has sworn out a complaint in the justice court for the arrest of Frank Taylor. It appears that he was working for Mrs. Ebbesen last October, and suggested going to Yamhill county to buy feed. He had one horse and Mrs. Ebbesen obligingly loaned him another horse, a wagon, a double set of harness, a tent, a sack of feed, and \$4 in cash. For two months Mrs. Ebbesen has been looking for him to return, and failing to do so, she came to the conclusion that she had been victimized, so came to town and swore out a complaint against Taylor. It seems that on his way out he sold the tent to one of the Kellow's and wanted to sell the team and outfit to Alex. Watt.

While Dr. Boals was driving from Bay City, accompanied by Rev. T. Robinson, on Wednesday afternoon, the buggy wheel struck a log which had been felled and tripped and was partly in the road. The sudden jolt swerved the buggy partly round and Dr. Boals was thrown out, and the doubletree breaking, the team dashed off, dragging the doctor some distance, but he managed to escape any serious injury, although his clothes indicated that something unusual had happened. Mr. Robinson viewed the accident from the buggy, for he clinging to the seat, and was not hurt. The team came to town and Mr. Harris hitched them up to another buggy to ascertain what had happened, and it was not long after that he returned with the gentlemen who had been left on the road with a horseless buggy.

Fred R. Beals, the enterprising real estate dealer, has bought the Elmore ranch, which contains 193 acres of tide land, paying \$16 660 for the place, with no rights reserved. Clark Hadley was negotiating to buy the place some few months ago, which fell through as he claimed there was only a little over 140 acres of land. Mr. Beals since had the land surveyed and the place was found to contain a trifle over 193 acres. This buy shows Mr. Beals' faith in Tillamook land, and as the tide land will become more valuable than the bottom lands in a few years, it is safe to predict that when the Elmore ranch changes hands again it will fetch over \$50 000 when it is properly dyked and cut up into 20 acre tracts. Mr. Beals is certainly a splendid rustler and has done more to boost and move land than anyone in the county.

### The Argo Arrives.

The new transportation company's steamer Argo arrived in the bay this morning between eight and nine o'clock on her maiden trip from Portland with freight for this city. She was delayed at Astoria one day on account of the weather, but it is the intention of the owners to run her on a five days schedule in the future. Most all of the merchants are ordering their freight shipped by her, and she had two loads ahead before she reached Portland last Sunday. The Argo will dock at the lumber company's dock in this city, and she will reach here this afternoon or tomorrow morning.

### B. Imdorf Shot Himself.

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—While a terrific storm was raging, on December 1, there was a burial at sea from the liner Finland, which arrived today from Antwerp. Benedict Imdorf, 60 years old, of Tillamook, Or., a second cabin passenger, had committed suicide by shooting himself in the head as he lay in his berth, about 4 o'clock, on the morning of November 30. He died a few hours later, never regaining consciousness. The body, wrapped in canvass, was consigned to the deep after the reading of the burial services by the captain.
