The mail this year is unusually heavy across the mountains and the stage was loaded several mornings this week with mail sacks, keeping Postmaster Severance and his assistants busy sorting it. The outgoing mail is equally heavy. Owing to the heavy mail across the mountains at this season of the year, which is taking a number of horses to pack, the stage line is unable to pack express or other packages which may be sent that way. Your recent vote on the Port of Tillamook enlargement will be a great aid."

The passengers who went out on the Sue H. Elmore today were: Anna, Julia and Maggie Tone, Joe Johnson, A. H. and G. Zuhley, F. Fitzpatrick, Mrs. E. H. Whitney and Child Mrs. W. H. Cooper, Mr. Bowly and wife, and Paul Gunburt. On Sunday night R. L. Wade's hardware store was broken into and the cash register robbed of the small change. Besides the loss of the money, a number of boxes of shells were taken. The robbers entered the store through a window on the east side of the building. F. S. Whitehouse has returned to the city from Portland, where he had gone as a witness in the fire insurance case, which came up in the U.S. court. The fire insurance company withdrew all its objections with the exception of that of the watchman clause in the policy, and they wanted Judge Wolverton's ruling on that point. Sheriff Cretshaw sold all of the Tyler stock and furniture, which was under attachment, and the sale realized three times more than some of the creditors expected, as Mitchell, Lewis & Stayer were willing that it should be lumped off for \$500. The sheriff thought he could do better than that for the creditors, so refused to let it go that way, and as a result he realized \$1,574.90 by the auction sale. A jury trial, before County Judge Goodspeed, to see whether Lloyd and Claude Woods, ages 14 and 11 years respectively, had been neglected by their step-father, George Robinson, and mother, Mattie Robinson. The complaint was sworn to by S. C. Woods, uncle to the boys. It was proven that the step father had done very little to provide clothing and food for the boys, yet the jury brought in a verdict that they were not dependent children. We are sorry to announce the death of Mrs. Anna Tone, which took place on the 11th instant at Seattle, Wash., and the remains were brought in on the Elmore this week and buried in the Catholic cemetery, Father LeMiller conducting the religious service. Deceased's maiden name was Miss Anna Smith and was born at Guelph, Ont., in 1835 and came to Oregon in 1880. She had a family of fourteen children, ten of whom are now living. Deceased was a woman who was greatly respected and beloved by all who knew her and a loving and tender mother. The bereaved relatives have the sympathy of the entire community.

ARGO HAD ROYAL RECEPTION.
Citizens Turned and Cheer the New Boat. The arrival of the Argo in this city on Thursday last, on her maiden trip, was given a rousing welcome as she passed along the water front, and the crowds on docks, notwithstanding that it was cold and dark, turned out and gave a lusty cheer. She had crossed in that morning and unloaded part of her cargo at Bay City and it was after seven o'clock when she tied up at the lumber company's dock. There had been a good deal of speculation whether she could come up on a 5.8 foot tide, some predicting that she could not. Much to the surprise of most everybody the Argo, even in the darkness came up the slough without the least trouble, gracefully turning the sharp points in the slough without touching the banks, and when she arrived here it was 1 1/2 hours of being full tide. Another surprise awaited the crowd as the Argo tied up. The announcement was made that she would unload right away and that she would leave again the next morning at six o'clock, which was a most unusual thing to do in this neck of the woods. Quite a number of persons in town and out of town next day went down to the dock to see the new freighter which is to put a stop to the monopoly in the transportation service, but she had left soon after it was light and expected to reach Portland at eleven o'clock that night. As the Argo made such a short stay on her first trip, arriving here after seven o'clock in the evening and leaving again next morning as soon as it was light, there was little outgoing freight on her first trip. There was a thick fog when the Argo went up the Willamette river, and she went ashore near the beacon light, opposite the Gillham Landing. A dense fog hung over at the time and the pilot lost his way. The Argo lay on the mud until high water and then worked herself off. She reached her dock in Portland on Saturday afternoon at 1:30. The Argo arrived on Tuesday and discharged part of her cargo at Bay City. She came to this city the next morning and unloaded the remainder of her cargo and left again this morning. She had some outgoing freight, including several consignments of cheese, all from the co-operative factories.
