Interesting Scraps.

A Boston physician has an exaggerated idea of prosperity. He recommends that each adult eat a dozen raw eggs daily. 'Are the Republicans proud of their victory?' asks Mr. Bryan's paper. They are mighty well content, but unable to say surprised. It is quite evident that Senator Tillman and President Roosevelt would never be able to work harmoniously on the same newspaper. Messina suffers are beginning to appear among the tramps, but if they tell a glib story the natural inference is that they are not genuine. Col. Bryan says he has been defeated three times on principle. And this notwithstanding the fact that he has three times changed his principles. Fixing the size of the calamity in Italy is still difficult, but it is known to be large enough to call for a generous relief movement all over the world. Senator Tillman is more accustomed to attack than defend, and may be surprised to find that it takes longer to mend fences than to break them down. It must be admitted that Col. Bryan is a very remarkable man. The presidential bee has been buzzing in his ear for twelve long years, and yet he claims to be in a happy frame of mind. Except for the imperial aegis of the constitution, and the outstretched arm of President Roosevelt, Attorney General Bonaparte would have much to fear from the trouble breeders in the Senate. Senator Teller, who is about to retire from the Senate, has finally acknowledged the superiority of the gold over the silver standard. It is safe to say that he will never lead another bolt in a national convention. Six of the night riders in West Tennessee have been found guilty of murder in the first degree and two of murder in the second degree. When the punishment fits the crime the night riding will end. The final corrected summary of the Socialist vote in America at the November election shows that the Associated Press summary placed the total far too high. Instead of being 448,000, that total is now found to be just 423,969 votes. This is a gain of about 22,000 over the preceding presidential election. At the same time the Socialist leaders are encouraged by the fact that their party membership has more than doubled; and that their propaganda is more widespread and aggressive than ever before. They are now striving to gather in a large proportion of the Bryan following. President Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, has notified the unions affiliated to an account of the application of the Sherman antitrust law to the unions by the decision of the Supreme Court in the Lowme hat boycotting case and the imposition of a fine of three times the supposed damages, he has decided, by advice of counsel, to discontinue the 'We Don't Patronize' list in future numbers of the Federationist, or until Congress could be induced to amend the Sherman law, so as not to apply to labor unions. The answer of the president of the numerous appeals for executive pardon in the case of Mr. Gompers and his associates was made in a formal statement to the press. It says that he can not interfere while the matter is yet before the courts, and is a civil suit between private parties. Hence it was asserted that the opinion of the president on the merits of the case could be of little consequence. When final decision is made in the case then the president could consider whether the terms of imprisonment are excessive or improper. It is pointed out, however, that if the defendants see fit to abandon their appeal the matter will then of course be brought to the attention of the executive, and they have the right to appeal, and if unsuccessful then to ask for pardon or commutation. Several members of Congress who recently returned from a visit to the

Panama Canal state that, though they went there with the idea that a sealed connection between the two oceans would be best, they were convinced by their investigations that the contemplated great dam and locks are preferable and that the work involves no great risk. It can be taken for granted Col. Goethals and the government engineers associated with him are acting only after full consideration. They avoid hazardous chances. Their plans are rigidly in accordance with the science with which they are familiar as any who are highly trained in it and who have long practiced it in important works. Francis J. Heney, the famous proponent of the San Francisco grafters, during brief stops in New York and Philadelphia, talked to some purpose about the progress of his work. It was to the effect that political bosses like the now convicted Abe Kuef are but the agents and tools of the 'respectable business men,' and that there would be none of the former if there were none of the latter. Harriman, he said, was the real boss of San Francisco, the corruptionist, and 'he played the part because he wished to exploit the California public for the purpose of achieving his own selfish ends.' Heney then asserted that we Americans have no great cause to be proud of the progress in political reform we have made in 150 years. He believed that in some western states a radical departure would be made which would eliminate corruption. That the final and enduring solution of the labor question lies in the principle of profit sharing is the belief expressed by Andrew Carnegie in World's Work. From his own experience he tells how he took from time to time over forty partners from the employees of the Carnegie Steel Company. Not one contributed a cent, but all signed notes to be paid for from profits of the business, and they were selected upon merit after long service. These superintendents sat in conference with the Board of Managers, and at the same time sprang up the custom of giving bonuses to men in lower positions who had done good work. To this system Carnegie ascribes the success of the Steel Trust. He dislikes, however, the plan of the trust in so far as it makes the investment of the workers at their risk. To create the needed feeling of mutuality, 'every corporation could well afford to sell shares to its workmen, giving preference in repayment at cost as a first charge in case of disaster. He is convinced that the big combination or corporation has no chance in competition with the partnership which embraces the principal officials.
