George Dod was committed on Wednesday to the county jail for five days for hunting without a license.  
Those who are wanting lumber should leave orders or can obtain prices, etc., by calling up the city office or Yellow Fir Mill.  
Bay City Board of Trade is to have a banquet Friday evening, to which a number of persons in this city have been invited.  
Henry Kunze is circulating a remonstrance against an increase of pay for the deputy clerk, deputy sheriff and deputy assessor.  
Work on the building for the new saw mill was resumed on Tuesday after being closed down for several weeks on account of bad weather.

It is reported that the foundrymen were in a fight Wednesday and Dr. Monk was called upon to make a casting for one of the men.  
County Clerk Holden will finish the tax roll by the end of the week and next week it will be turned over to Sheriff Crenshaw to collect taxes.  
The crew ordinance is again to be enforced and the whistle of the electric light plant will be blown every evening to notify the youngsters that they must be at home.  
J. A. Todd came in on Sunday from Salem on account of the sickness of his brother, County Treasurer P. W. Todd, who, we are glad to add, is on the road to recovery.  
The suit of Peter McIntosh against A. McNair, in which plaintiff sued defendant for money in the circuit court and it was decided in favor of McNair, has been reversed by the supreme court.  
The weather, after a long seige of rain and snow, broke fine on Tuesday with bright, warm weather but cold at night. The wind prevailed from the east and this morning it was blowing cold from that quarter.  
Rev. J. F. Dunlop, who left for Montana last week, will not be back in time to occupy the pulpit in the M.E. church next Sunday owing to floods in that state, and in his absence the Rev. D. L. Shrode will preach.  
Sheriff Crenshaw took Nick Durgjlyo, the Italian who attempted to commit suicide by cutting his throat some time ago, to Portland, where he was turned over to the asylum authorities, as he was declared insane.  
In the absence of a general rivers and harbors bill, emergency appropriations aggregating \$7,000,000 will probably be made for the work actually required during the next fiscal year, and in that case Tillamook Bay will get \$7,500.  
Ex-Mayor S. S. Johnson was arrested on Wednesday and locked up in the city jail on a charge of drunkenness and disorderly conduct. Marshal Kimball tried to take the ex mayor home, who became abusive, used foul language and started in to fight the city marshal.  
A special meeting of the school district was held on Saturday for the purpose of establishing the high school in this city, which was only a formal matter and had

been overlooked. It was carried unanimously. It is not necessary for some of the teachers to put in the time taking an examination now that it passed.  
Justice Sappington bound Clarence Atterbury over to the grand jury on Friday on a charge of larceny by embezzlement. W. E. Catterlin filed the complaint against Atterbury, both of whom are in the real estate business, and it was over the commission in a real estate deal which is the source of the trouble.  
The Ladies' Guild of the Presbyterian church will meet with Mrs. Gus Kunze next Wednesday. A full attendance is requested, as there is special work. The Guild makes a specialty of aprons, and anyone desiring aprons from the guild can leave their orders with Mrs. Sarchet or Mrs. Baker.  
The steamer Argo reached her dock in this city on Monday. She brought in a full cargo, and after unloading at Bay City, she had 110 tons for this city. She left on Tuesday and took out 521 cases of cheese. The Argo, while outside, had new bulkheads put in and in about two weeks it is expected that she will be fitted up for passengers.  
The Good Roads Committee, which was elected last Summer, will have a meeting on Friday for the purpose of boosting the good roads movement and seeing what can be done to put the roads in good shape for the summer travel, especially between this city and Delph. It is expected that more people will visit Tillamook county this year than any previous summer, and with the roads put in shape the auto travel will come this way.  
We understand that a strong lobby is congregated at Salem to defeat the Beals Timber Cruising bill, said to be one of the strongest ever gathered there to defeat a measure. Notwithstanding that Mr. Beals has consented to amend the one objectionable feature raised against it, that of compelling owners of timber to file a cruise of their timber within 90 days of the passage of the bill, it begins to look if the Senate will kill the bill again.  
Suit has been filed in the circuit court by C. G. Van Patten against Thomas J. Harris, Jr., Lillie A. Harris and Justice G. W. Sappington, to enjoin them from interfering with plaintiff on the farm in his possession. The plaintiff claims that

he contracted to buy the place while the defendant claims that he only agreed to lease it. Much to the surprise of Van Patten, and while he was away, Harris took possession, and when Van Patten returned there were some indications of trouble between the parties.  
The Tillamook High School debating team, composed of Misses Eliza Dawson, Helen Bibby and Nellie Hannenkrat, accompanied by Mrs. H. T. Botts left for Astoria, where they debated last night with the Astoria High School team in the first of the interscholastic debating contests in the Columbia district. The Astoria team is composed of Miss Mary Kelley, Axel Sigurdson and Lawrence Dineen. The question for debate was "Municipal Ownership." As Tillamook High School has no elocution teacher, the team is placed at some disadvantage with High Schools where they have a teacher for that branch. A telephone message to-day stated that Astoria won the contest.
