DISCUSSES ROAD WORK & BAR IMPROVEMENT.

Wants an Engineer to Take Charge of Work Instead of Road Supervisors.

The Board of Trade of Bay City sent invitations to the officers of the Tillamook Development League and several of the business men to meet that body in Bay City on Friday evening, and a delegation from this city attended the meeting, which was largely attended by the members of the Board of Trade and a delegation from Hobsonville.

Dr. W. C. Hawk, president of the Bay City Board of Trade, presided, who briefly stated the object of the meeting, which was to bring the two towns and organizations in closer touch and to work for the interest and building up of Tillamook County as a whole.

H. T. Botts, president of the Tillamook Development League, was the first to be called upon, and with Mayor T. Coates and others, good roads and the proper expenditure of road money first engaged the attention of the meeting. All the speakers appeared satisfied that, under the present system large sums of money were expended upon roads, but the taxpayers were not getting results. It was pointed out that Tillamook County was raising \$90,000 by taxation this year for road improvement, and owing to the fact that the present road supervisor system was not giving satisfaction in obtaining good roads, it was unanimously thought that the County Court should employ an engineer to take charge of the road work and construct roads according to modern and scientific ideas. There were no objections raised to paying a large levy for better roads as long as the road money was economically expended and the county was getting results, and the two organizations appeared to be unanimous in their opinion that it was better roads were to be obtained and the road money properly expended, a competent engineer and road builder should be placed at the head of the road work instead of inexperienced road supervisors, some of whom obtained their positions, not on account of experience or knowledge of road building, but because of some political "pull." Letting road work by contract was strongly urged.

It was decided to appoint a committee to take up the matter with the County Court, and in the meantime the committee will communicate with Judge J. H. Scott, head of the good roads movement, to ascertain what it would cost to obtain the services of an engineer.

The improvement of Tillamook bar, which is a subject of much importance to the county, was taken up by C. U. Mandis and J. W. Sharp, of the Miami Lumber Company, who pointed out that owing to several shipping accidents on the Coast in the vicinity of Tillamook, the underwriters of San Francisco gave this port a black eye, making the rate of interest so high that it was almost prohibitive, and on that account it was difficult to obtain vessels to carry lumber to market, although there were many idle vessels in San Francisco. Both gentlemen contended that the bar was in as good condition as any of the small bars along the Coast, and it was not right to charge the accident to the steamer Bandon or the wrecks of the Ida Schnaufer and Emily Reed to the bar, which the underwriters were doing, for it was the captains of those vessels who were to blame for those accidents. Considering the enormous timber resources of the country, all the speakers advocated the improvement of Tillamook bar, and recommended the building of jetties as outlined in Major Langfitt's report.

The meeting was brought to a close by appropriate remarks dealing with road work and bar improvements by John O. Bozorth.

After the discussion, those present were invited to a banquet at the Bay City hotel, which proved to be one of the best banquets served in this county. The tables were arranged in the shape of a cross, nicely decorated and with a splendid repast, with jestoons of green from the ceiling, and it reflected great credit upon the hotel.

On motion, whether the ordinance should pass to its final passage, Councilmen Talbot and Wilt voted no and Councilmen W. E. Catterlin, B. C. Lamb and Geo. Bennett voted yes.
