To the Tax Payers of Tillamook County.

Notice is hereby given that the 1908 tax roll is now in my hands and taxes may be paid at any time after Monday, Feb. 7th.

Those paying all of their taxes prior to March 15th will be given a rebate of 3 per cent, and those paying half of their taxes prior to April 5th, can let the remainder go until Oct. 4th without having to pay extra penalty.

Unless a half payment is made prior to April 5th a penalty of 10 per cent will be added, together with interest at the rate of 1 per cent per month until paid.

Christian Church Notes.

The revival meetings at the Christian church closed last Lord's day evening, after having continued three weeks. The intention was to continue longer, but on account of the prevailing sickness in the community and the stormy weather, it was thought best to close.

A systematic Bible-study class will be started in about two weeks. The purpose of it will be to get a simple outline of the whole Bible into the mind and heart of those who attend.

City Council Meeting.

A meeting of the city council was held on Monday evening with Mayor Thos. Coates and Councilmen F. W. Talbot, F. W. Talbot, G. P. Wilt, B. C. Lamb, W. E. Catterlin and Geo. Bennett were present.

The first business taken up was an ordinance to regulate the sale of malt liquors, not otherwise provided, with the emergency clause, and which calls for \$200 license.

"It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, directly or indirectly either in person or by another, to sell or barter or knowingly permit to be sold or bartered, any malt liquors, the selling of which is not prohibited within the limits of Tillamook City, Oregon, under the provisions of the laws of Oregon without first obtaining a license therefor as hereinafter provided, and no license shall be issued for a less period of time than one year and provided that any person violating the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$100, and default of payment thereof shall be committed to the city jail for such period of time as will liquidate such fine at the rate of \$2 per day."

Clyde Clements asked to have the time of closing placed at 1 a.m. instead of 12 o'clock, and this being agreed to, the ordinance passed, which is to license and control places selling what is known as unintoxicating malt liquors.

A petition, signed by a number of business men, that Marshal Kimball be kept on night duty, was read, but as it was thought to be to the interest of the city to take him off night duty and make him street commissioner, Mayor Coates appointed him to that position, which was confirmed. The councilmen expressed themselves as knowing nothing as to the gossip about their wanting to get rid of Kimball by reducing his salary to \$1 per month, but what they did insist upon was that he do his duty and take charge of the street work.

Earl Ford being recommended by the committee, he was elected to the position of night watchman and policeman.

Claude Thayer demanded the payment of a bill of \$200, being the balance due for professional services performed by Handley & Thayer in connection with the suit against the city over the water system.

Another bill was presented by Claude Thayer for \$150 for professional services by Handley & Thayer for defending the city in the same case in the circuit court. Both bills were turned over to the proper committee, but it appeared to be the opinion of the councilmen that the water commission should pay them.
