As he stepped in between two cows this Friday morning one of them kicked and broke his left leg above the knee. Not having a phone it was decided not to go for Dr. Brown, as Woolford said he could fix it himself, as he had done on similar occasions in the past. The accident is all the more lamentable as Mr. Woolford has already lost one leg in a railroad wreck. But this time it is his wooden leg that is broken.

W. Langworthy was tried on Friday before Justice Sappington on a charge of violating the local option. He was one of the parties caught in the recent round up of bootleggers by Sheriff Crenshaw, in which A. D. Oliver was the complaining witness. He was found guilty and the justice deferred passing sentence until the 10th March. Langworthy had been arrested and tried before for bootlegging, but Sappington dismissed the case. The night before the Olsen building burned down, Langworthy had two barrels of beer delivered at the back of the building after dark, and it is supposed that by a drunken orgy there that night the building was caught on fire. Two other charges have been filed against him.

Clarence Parmele, merchant of Selitz Bay, and Chas. Dean, of Astoria, spent Tuesday night at the Cloverdale hotel on their way from Newport to Astoria. They have been soliciting stock among the merchants and business men at all water points from Alsea Bay to Astoria for the purpose of building a boat that will play between those points. The boat will be 100ft. long, 24ft. beam, 7ft. hold, draft load 7ft., will have a 200 h p gasoline engine, and twin screw. It will have 150 ton capacity with shallow draft. This boat will carry passengers and they expect to have it running by the first of July.—Courier.

The steamer Argo came in on Friday, and the next morning she grounded on the mud at the dolphin near Bay City dock and remained there until Monday morning before she was able to get off, when she came to this city. She was heavily loaded with machinery, brick and other freight. G. S. Dexter, formerly first officer of the Alliance, is now the first officer on the Argo. She left here on Monday, and there is more freight now in Portland than she can carry on her next trip, when she will carry passengers. While she was trying to get off the mud near Bay City one of the steamer's boats came in contact with one of the propellers and was chewed up into kindling wood.

The last two items were for professional services in connection with the water system, and was ordered drawn on the water fund. C. W. Clements and W. J. Resolved, That the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, created by the Act of June 13, 1902, be requested to re-examine the surveys of Tillamook Bay and Harbor to Tillamook City, Oregon, authorized in the River and Harbor Acts of 1902 and 1907 respectively, with a view to determining whether conditions have not changed since the reports upon the surveys referred to.

Another Traveesty of Justice.

The case against W. J. Stephens for violating the local option law was tried before a jury composed of John Erick, son, D. E. Goodspeed, H. Kunze, H. Booth, Peter Heisel and Gus Wicklund. The evidence in this case was simply this: A. D. Oliver swore that he bought one quart bottle of whiskey from Stephens on January 18th, 1909, at his place of business, on the white corner, no one present when he bought liquor. He paid \$1.50 for the liquor. Oliver took the liquor home and three or four days after came back to town and turned the bottle of whiskey over to Sheriff Crenshaw. The bottle of whiskey was then produced and the witness asked if this was the same

bottle that he bought from Stephens, which witness identified as the same one. He was then asked if since the purchase of the liquor he had ever had any conversation with Stephens concerning this matter. He answered "Yes; that on the afternoon of the day of Stephens' arrest, he came out to his home to see him, and asked what he could give him some of the same dose, and that a man that would buy whiskey from a man and then squeal on him was a—"

This interview was not denied by Stephens, except as to some parts of the conversation.

Upon cross-examination of the witness it was brought out that just previous to the 18th of January Stephens had refused to sell whiskey to the witness, because witness was accompanied by another party, and as Stephens afterwards explained to witness at the interview at or near witness's home that it was because he had "That Damn Kid with him." Sheriff Crenshaw was next called, who identified the bottle of whiskey that was given him by witness as the same bottle, and that it had not passed out of his hands since coming into his possession, that he had labeled the bottle at the time and the name on the label was written by witness.

The only evidence on the part of the

defence was that of the defendant, who denied the sale of the liquor.

Yet in the face of such strong evidence against Stephens the jury brought in a verdict for the defendant.

State Can't Get a Square Deal.

The case against Howard Edmunds, who was charged with violating the local option law was dismissed by Deputy District Attorney Cooper because G. W. Sappington, the justice of the peace, would not give the State a square deal in refusing to dismiss two jurymen after they had disqualified themselves by showing they were prejudiced.

One of the jurymen admitted that it would take more evidence to induce him to convict a man under the local option law than if a person had violated some other part of the criminal code and that he did not like the local option law because he believed it was unconstitutional. The other went out of his way when asked as to his competency to sit as a juror in the case to say that if the State could not produce better evidence in this case than in the former case he would not convict.

Both of the jurymen were challenged by the State for cause, but Justice Sappington refused to discharge them.
