Development Meeting.
A meeting of the Tillamook Development League was held on Tuesday at the city hall, which was attended by a number of business men. President Botts called the meeting to order and stated that it was called for the purpose of appointing a committee to obtain data for the Board of Engineers at Washington. This was at the request of Congressman Hawley, who had a resolution passed in the house that the engineers plan a new project for the improvement of the bar and for the improvement of the channel from Tillamook City to the bay. It was decided to ask that this channel be made as straight as possible, 150ft. wide and with 12ft. of water at low tide, so that any vessel able to cross the bar would be able to reach Tillamook City. As Mr. Claude Thayer had kindly consented to help prepare the date, he was appointed, with B. C. Lamb and Rollie W. Watson, a committee for that purpose.

A petition, drawn up by the Tillamook Development League and the Bay City Board of Trade, was adopted, which is to petition the county court to appoint an engineer to take charge of the road work and construct them on modern and scientific plans.
