William McKay, a shipbuilder, of Bandon, Ore., has secured the contract to build a gasoline boat to ply among Oregon ports, such as Tillamook, Coos Bay and Bandon. The new boat will be 95 feet over all and have a 24-foot beam. It will be equipped with two 100-horse power engines and will have a large carrying capacity.

Work was commenced on Wednesday on the new two-story concrete building, which is the beginning of more modern, commodious buildings being erected in Tillamook City, and which will afford better fire protection. The building will be a great improvement to the city, and the change from frame to concrete buildings makes the outlook bright for the city to be built up with more substantial structures.

The new saw mill of the Tillamook Lumber Manufacturing Company will be completed by the first of next month, and it will be one of the best constructed saw mills of its size, with all new machinery, in Oregon. It will have a capacity of between 40 and 50 thousand a day, and at a comparatively small outlay the mill could be made to cut 100 thousand. The planer shed on the north side is partly up and plans are being prepared for a dry kiln.

Engineer Geo. L. Davis, of the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co., Attorney Wallace McCamaat, of Portland, and C. E. Lytle came in last week. Mr. Davis informs us that the line will be completed between Tillamook City and Miami river by the 1st of June so that cars can run and that the contract will be let on the 29th of this month for the remainder of the road. When he left Portland five bids were in and three others were expected, one of which from a contractor who built part of the North Bank road, and who has a large equipment ready to commence work.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Nordstrom to Be Tried for Murder on Friday.

The April term of the Circuit Court convened on Monday with Judge W. Galloway on the bench and a log docket to be disposed of. The first business was to call the jury, when James Murphy, J. A. Dawson and William Hartsell were excused from jury duty, as they were out of the county. The judge ordered a grand jury drawn with the following persons chosen: Clarence Tilden, Frank Hobson, A. A. Imlah, D. Fitzpatrick, W. A. Elliott, N. G. Boquist and D. T. Werschkul. After charging the grand jury the judge appointed D. Fitzpatrick foreman.

The first indictment returned by the grand jury was that against Adolf N. Nordstrom charged with the murder of John Peterson. The court appointed T. H. Goyne attorney for the prisoner. When Nordstrom was arraigned on Tuesday he refused to plead and the court entered a plea of not guilty and set the case for trial on Friday morning at nine o'clock.

In the case of W. Langworthy, a local option case appealed from the justice court, the defendant was tried and found guilty. The judge fined him \$100 and 15 days in jail which was remitted on good behavior. This was simply a formal trial as the case is to be appealed and taken to the Supreme court as to whether the local option law is constitutional.

Vincent Jacob was another local option case appealed from the justice court and was tried on its merits. Jacob had two trials in the justice court, the first jury failing to agree and the next brought in a verdict of guilty. This being appealed, the case was tried on Tuesday and the next day when the case went to the jury it brought in a verdict of guilty. Later in the day an application for a new trial was made, which will be argued on Monday.

The grand jury brought in "No bills" against Sam Tomlinson, Roy Ozden and Clarence Atterbury.

Indictments having been returned against Velcho Lreff, Iran Nordauff, Tom Schulfur and John Ramino, they pleaded guilty, who were charged with the crime of endeavoring by force and threats to prevent certain persons from working on the railroad, causing riot. The judge dealt leniently with them because they were foreigners and did not realize the nature of the crime they were committing, inflicting a fine of \$50 upon Schulfur and \$65 each upon the others.

The grand jury brought in two more indictments today, against Howard Edmunds and W. Laugworthy, for violating the local option law.

State of Oregon, plaintiff, vs Jesse Davis, defendant. Assault and battery. This case was tried on Wednesday in which the defendant is charged with assault and battery upon M. J. Cone, of Netarts, the complaining witness testifying that defendant bit his nose in an altercation. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty.
