The last of the fittings and pipings for the new saw mill were received this morning from Portland, and it is expected that the mill will be ready to run by next Wednesday. There is considerable business in sight for the new enterprise, both for home trade and outside trade.

N. J. Myers has returned to the county from Portland and will engage in the cranberry business. He will prepare several acres of bog at Sandlake this spring, and the Argo brought in about a third of a mile of small railroad rails and a truck so as to prevent hauling over the land with teams.

Joseph Effenberg, the Nehalem saw mill man, was in the city on Wednesday. He became greatly interested in the new saw mill, and as he carefully inspected every part of that plant, he came to the conclusion that it was substantially built and one of the best saw mills of its size in Oregon.

The steamer Argo came in on Wednesday, her passengers being T. B. Turney, Mrs. Watt, Miss Prentice, Mrs. Moran, Mrs. M. Walling, W. E. McKinster, A. B. McClellan, F. L. Booth, L. F. Hughes, G. W. Lewis and wife, F. J. Mueller, C. N. Oleser, B. Crist, Miss Alice Perry, J. J. Perry and wife, J. B. Silver and C. H. Dean.

Dr. W. P. Hansen, a veterinary surgeon and specialist on cattle, will associate with Dr. J. E. Reedy in veterinary science, and he will be here about the end of this week, with his offices opposite Easter's barn. Dr. Reedy is prepared to make examinations for tuberculous in cattle and glanders in horses, having the drugs to diagnose cases of that character.

The Tillamook Development League will hold its annual meeting for the election of officers next Thursday. It will be a favorable opportunity to start a business men's or commercial club, for this is something which is needed, especially as Tillamook City will put on metropolitan style the next few years. A club is a good place where business men can get together and talk over what is best for the city's development.

A letter has been received by Mr. Russell Hawkins from Congressman Hawley which states: "I have transmitted the papers sent by you relative to the improvement of Tillamook bar and harbor, and Hoquartion Slough, to the Chief of Engineers, War Department, with the earnest request for favorable consideration. I believe the situation fully warrants a favorable report on an adequate project." In another letter the Congressman states that the data sent him contains several important statements.

The steamer Argo came in on Wednesday with a full cargo of freight and a full passenger list. Her outgoing freight for cheese from now on will increase every week, as the co-operative associations are shipping mostly on the Argo and the individual concerns ship on the Sue H. Elmore. The Argo will have 1000 cases of cheese to take out this trip and the Elmore 115 cases, which is a pretty good indication that the shipment of cheese from Tillamook has commenced for the season.

After many years of waiting, Tillamook "is coming out of darkness, is coming into light," and the railroad will be something more than a vision of the future. The Harriman interests have proceeded so far in construction of the road that bios have been called for completion of the remaining section on which work has not been done. As this last piece of road is less than thirty miles in length, it is clear that railroad connection with the rich Tillamook country will not be delayed beyond the present season.—Oregonian.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Nordstrom Placed on Trial Again To-Day.

Monday morning Judge W. Galloway ordered Sheriff Crenshaw to draw a special venire of 36 names, to make their appearance today (Thursday). This was done to try the murder case, for as soon as the Judge was convinced that the jury would not agree he decided to have the case tried again at this term of the circuit court, and set the date for Thursday. The names of those who have been summoned to appear are W. N. Bays, W. J. Carver, F. L. Buell, A. Chopard, A. M. Commons, Dave Curtis-Fred Zaddach, Henry Tohl, D. Perrigo, W. D. Gladwell, Charles Johnson, D. J. Bailey, Frank Worthington, E. K. Gilbert, N. P. Hansen, Richard Ailen, Andrew Anderson, Arthur Hunt, Charles Jensen, O. A. Lommen, Alfred Crawford, Oscar Bergman, John W. Weiss, Herman Tohl, A. S. Tilden, F. L. Owens, Georg Loerpabel, Andrew Klein, Fred Kabbee Fred C. Skomp, T. J. Bibby, S. V. Anderson, G. R. McKimens, Ike Moore, John W. Hellenbrand and Wm. Tubbesing.

The second trial of Adolf N. Nordstrom, who is charged with the murder of John Peterson, was commenced this morning. Attorney Webster Holmes is assisting Deputy District Attorney W. H. Cooper, in the place of District Attorney J. H. McNary, and the prisoner is again defended by Attorney A. W. Severance and T. H. Goyne, who so ably defended Nordstrom in the first trial, and it was by request of the Court that they are acting in that capacity again.

At noon today nine jurymen had been accepted, viz., Frank Worthington, O. A. Lommen, Wm. Tubbesing, Andrew Anderson, Chas. Jensen, W. D. Gladwell, W. N. Bay, N. P. Hansen and D. A. Bailey.

Howard Edmunds, who was indicted by the grand jury, charged with violating the local option, was tried on Tuesday, and the jury brought in a verdict of guilty. The jury was out only a few minutes, the verdict being unanimous on the first ballot, without even discussing the case in the jury room. Defendant was allowed until Saturday to file a motion for a new trial.

Another local option case, in which W. Langworthy was indicted by the grand jury, the defendant claimed that he was sick and a doctor's certificate was handed in, but Judge Galloway decided that the defendant would have to come into court and set the trial for Saturday.

In the case of Jesse Davis, who was tried and found guilty on a charge of assault and battery upon M. J. Cone at Netarts, Judge Galloway sentenced him six months in jail, but upon promising to behave himself in future, the judge paroled him, at the same time gave the young man some excellent advice. He will have to pay the costs in the case, which amounts about \$30.

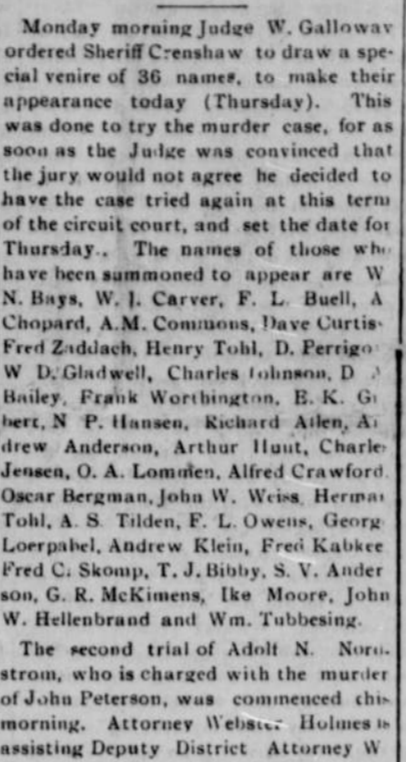
