The Judge Created a Surprise.

Judge Galloway created quite a surprise on Monday morning after he had taken his seat on the bench by stating that his life had been threatened. He had been informed by a respectable citizen that it would not be safe for him to be out after dark as a threat had been made that he would not live to pass sentence upon those who had been found guilty at this term of the circuit court. He said that this was the first time that his life had been threatened, either in public or private life, and that the party who had imparted the information to him gave the judge permission to use his name if he so desired.

This caused quite a surprise, and as the only criminal cases to be dealt with, with the exception of the murder case, were local option cases, it was thought that some of the bootleggers had made the threats.

On Tuesday Mayor Coates, in behalf of the citizens, appeared in court and asked the judge the name of the party who had given him the information. This he refused to divulge, stating that upon further investigation he found that the report had been exaggerated.

ANOTHER CRAZY SPELL.

Attorney Johnson Insults the Court—Uses Profane Language about the Judge.

Attorney S. S. Johnson created another disgraceful affair in this city last Saturday, which, for senseless behavior, profanity, abuse and a most unpardonable offence to the court and vile abuse of a county judge, outdistanced all his previous escapades in this city, which have brought disgrace upon himself, and which also disgraced the city. Johnson had another of his tantrums on Saturday, brought on as usual on account of imbibing too much of Old John Barley corn, for it tangled up his senses so badly that he acted like a crazy man.

After the jury in the murder case had retired, the case of W. Langworthy was called, who was charged with violating the local option law. Talmage & Johnson were attorneys for the notorious bootlegger, and Webster Holmes had been asked to assist them. The accused, who claimed to be sick, was not in court, neither was Johnson when a jury was drawn. He came into court and raised objections to the case proceeding, and demanding to know what had been done. The stenographer read this, when he told the court that he withdrew from the case and that they could try the case just as they pleased, and inviting the other attorneys to leave the court room, he took his departure. Johnson then called Sheriff Crenshaw up on the telephone and told him to serve the papers for contempt of court, and at the same time denounced Judge Galloway, calling him vile names and using epithets too disgusting to publish, telling the sheriff to tell the judge. Johnson also called Dr. Henry Morris on the phone and repeated most of the disgusting language told the sheriff. At first it was the intention of Judge Galloway to have Johnson arrested and brought into court, but as the sheriff was out at the time he cited Johnson to appear on Monday for contempt of court.

Monday morning Johnson appeared in court, and addressing the judge, said he wished to apologise for his conduct on Saturday, telling the court that he had a hasty, ungovernable temper which he had striven to curb. He expressed sorrow for his conduct and placed himself in the hands of the court, and Judge Galloway fined him \$20.

As the language used about the judge was of such a shocking and disgusting nature, it is thought that disbarment proceedings will be instituted against Johnson.

Bootleggers Get Heavy Fines

Wednesday afternoon Judge Galloway passed sentence upon those who had been found guilty of violating the local option law.

Vincent Jacob, who was not in court, but was represented by Attorney Holmes, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$300 and 20 days in the county jail. The judge remitted the jail sentence curing good behavior. Jacob was tried in the justice court, found guilty and was fined \$100. He appealed the case to the circuit court, and being found guilty again the judge made the fine three times what it was in the justice court.

W. Langworthy, the notorious bootlegger, was the next defendant to be dealt with. Attorney Holmes said the case would not be appealed and as Langworthy was sick and wanted to reform, he asked the judge to remit what sentence he might impose on him as he had no money to pay. The judge did not look at the matter in that light, for he imposed a sentence upon him of \$500 and 30 days in the county jail, but remitted the jail sentence on good behavior. As Langworthy claimed that he did not have the money to pay the fine he was locked up in the county jail, and will have to serve 250 days.

Howard Edmunds was the next bootlegger to have a heavy sentence passed upon him. The judge told the defendant that he had been before the courts several times and he could not overlook that, and imposed a fine of \$500 and 20 days in jail, the jail sentence to be remitted pending good behavior. Attorney Holmes gave notice of appeal to the supreme court, and his bail was placed at \$1000.

As there was considerable false swearing on the witness stand in the local option cases it is more than likely that the judge will notify the District Attorney to bring proceedings against the guilty parties. Judge Galloway was instrumental in sending a man to the penitentiary for perjury in Marion County who swore falsely in a case that was before him in that county.

RAY TUTTLE KILLED.

At Twisp, Wash., in Runaway Accident.

News reached this city of the death of Ray Tuttle, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Tuttle, of Twist, Wash., who previously resided in this city.

Ray Tuttle, aged 17 years, son of J. E. and Mrs. Tuttle, was fatally injured last Saturday forenoon at about 11 o'clock, in a runaway accident, being dragged by the heels, his head on the ground, until he was unconscious, his head being badly lacerated, and several bones in his body broken.

The Tuttle team was tied to the hitching rack in the street, and from some unknown cause were frightened, when they broke loose and started to run. The boy was sitting in the buggy and when the horses started in their mad rush, he gathered up the lines and tried to get them stopped, but to no avail. Crossing the walk between the drug store and photograph gallery, which is ten inches off the ground, the driver was thrown from his seat, but he did not clear the buggy, his foot catching in the brake, and thus he was dragged, head downward, until the team broke loose from the rig.

He was pulled out of the rig as speedily as possible, and carried into the drug store, where medical skill was administered, but his injuries were of such a serious nature that he never regained consciousness, and at 11 o'clock Sunday forenoon he died at the home of Frank Fulton, where he had been taken as soon as his wounds were attended.

The funeral occurred Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock from the Christian church, Elder J. L. Fulton officiating, and burial was made in the Beaver creek cemetery. A quartet composed of L. Mullin, G. W. Sprouse, and Missdames Sprouse and Derby, furnished vocal music both at the church and cemetery.

Ray Tuttle was born in Portland, Oregon, December 12, 1891. He came to this valley three years ago with his parents. He was an exemplary young man, and though he has been afflicted since birth by the loss of hearing and speech, he has been an especial help to his mother, and instead of being a charge of his parents, as might be supposed, his help with the daily work, and his considerate thoughtfulness for the comfort of those around him, will make his

demise sorely felt by his parents, and by his younger brother Harry, aged 14 years. A large concourse of sympathizers for the family and the unfortunate boy, followed to the cemetery to perform the last sad rites.

The bereaved parents expressed themselves as very grateful to the people of the community for the many kindnesses shown them in their hour of sad distress, especially Mrs. Frank Fulton, who gave up her home to the injured boy.—Mellow Valley News.
