

Editorial Snap Shots.

Conspiracy? Kats! Who are the real conspirators in this city? Who was it that entered into a conspiracy to spirit away the witness in the Wolfe case.

Wanted, a snap shot man for our contemporary. One who will guarantee to spoil a dozen films and fail to get one snap shot. Perhaps the camera needed some wireless. Bro.

The remark is made quite frequently since the Johnson fracas, that attorneys who have insulted the court and witnesses at the recent term of the circuit court, don't dare adopt the same tactics when Judge Burnett is on the bench.

Sheriff Crenshaw, who made a quick run to Salem with Nordstrom, the murderer, is deserving of a great deal of credit for the promptness in which he ferreted out the murderer, in having the murderer arrested, in obtaining a confession and in taking the prisoner to the place of execution.

We are wondering, Bro. Holmes, how Bootlegger Langworthy is getting along since he promised to reform. Wouldn't it be funny to hear that the converted bootlegger was occupying the pulpit of one of our churches giving his experience in the bootleg business. What a crowd he would draw.

It is remarkably strange that previous to Langworthy being sentenced for bootlegging a pitiful plea was made for him that he had no money with which to pay a fine. Poor fellow. But see how soon he dug up \$300 and got out of jail as soon as part of the fine was remitted. But it might be asked, was Langworthy fined for bootlegging for himself or some body else?

Another attorney, Oak Nolan, had to apologize to the Court and a witness for the insulting manner in which he was conducting a case in the circuit court in this city last week before Judge Galloway. With the Johnson fracas still fresh in the minds of the people, it gives some idea how certain attorneys attempt to bulldoze the court and witnesses. They evidently thought Judge Galloway was "easy," hence their bluff and bluster and insolence.

The justice court in this city is not a very profitable institution as far as the taxpayers are concerned, for the county court has to foot costs bills most every time it meets. But what's the use of complaining? The taxpayers seem to like it and are not complaining of the leakages in county funds. But we do think this, that a justice court ought to be self supporting from the fines inflicted and not a source of expense to the taxpayers.

Councilman Talbot, who was fined \$5 for fighting on the street, wants to know what right we had to criticize him. All we need say is, that kind of disgraceful conduct, especially in a councilman, whose duty it is to look after the peace and dignity of the city, is deserving of more criticism than if a private citizen had committed such an offense. If city officials get into a street fight and disgrace the city in that manner they not only court newspaper criticism, but they should be kicked out of office.

If you ask for a Democratic ballot at the polls today, they will hand you a piece of paper handsomely ruled, but with the names of no candidates thereon. There's the state to which the once Democratic party has come. No candidates, no principles, no organization, hardly a name—just a blank—Oregonian.

This is plain proof that in the last State and now in the Portland City elections the Democrats have no use for the primary election law. Now see how active they will become hobnobbing with defeated and disgruntled republicans who will carry on a guerilla fight on the republican party because they failed to lead the nomination.

As the snap shot man view the situation, Tillamook City is wasting a lot of valuable time in not concentrating its energies on the improvement of Hoquart slough and the water front. Some day the citizens will wake up to the fact that they missed it when they see industries being located on the bay instead of this city because of lack of deep water to this city. As far as Tillamook City is concerned good roads and the advent of a railroad into the county falls into insignificance compared with the improvement of the slough and the water front. If this city expects industries to locate here and make no effort to improve the conditions, it is going to be badly left, while other places go ahead. We simply mention this to show how important it is that these improvements must be carried out before inducements can be offered to those who want water frontage for manufactures.

The primary election in Portland resulted in ex-Senator Joseph Simon being nominated for mayor on the Republican ticket and ex Judge M. G. Munly on the

Democratic ticket. The lack of interest and the small vote cast seems to indicate in this neck of the woods that republicans were not very enthusiastic in Mr. Simon's behalf, and that he has a hard fight in the coming election. For already it is beginning to be seen that Mr. Simon will be the focus of another republican factional fight, and, in consequence, will be badly knifed on the day of election. Whether the disgruntled republicans flop to a "dark horse" with flip up ear marks or will support Judge Munly, remains to be seen. Under those conditions those on the outside cannot think that Mr. Simon has a walk over. Had Mr. Simon's nomination been instrumental in bringing party unity it would have accomplished a great deal, but, alas, the old, bitter factional fight is to be fought over again, and is liable to bring the party nominee to defeat.

One cannot hunt or fish without first taking out a license, and the lines are being drawn so tightly that one hardly knows where this licensing and taxing business is going to end. We want to raise our protest against having to take out a license to fish for trout, for several reasons: First, because we think it was at the instigation of the city sports that the license was imposed, who want to keep people from fishing; second, because we hardly think it is right to impose a license upon people living in a county like Tillamook and hundreds of families who come here every year for a few weeks' vacation, making it necessary for every member of a family above a certain age to have a license; third, because trout is doing more to destroy the salmon industry than all the salmon fishermen, seines and traps on the Columbia river or elsewhere. This is a broad statement to make, but one has only to watch trout depleting millions of eggs in the spawning grounds and millions of young fry to prove this. Under these circumstances we fail to see any logic imposing a tax to protect trout. Probably the average State legislator does not know how foolish it is to appropriate State money for salmon hatcheries and then pass a law to protect trout, the greatest enemy to the salmon industry. Ask any of the State legislators the reason, and they will frankly admit that it was at the instigation of the city sports that trout is protected and a license is imposed.

The best bit of news, as far as Tillamook County is concerned, that we have heard for a long time is the announcement that the last contract is let to complete the railroad, which is to give this county railroad connections with Portland and in about twelve months. The advent of the railroad into Tillamook will bring about wonderful improvements in the county, and present conditions will change so suddenly that a few years will revolutionize things which we have been accustomed to for so many years in this bottled up section of country. New towns will spring up, new industries will be started, new settlers will flock into the county, and droves of pleasure seekers come into the county every summer to enjoy the cool weather, the beautiful beaches and the mountain scenery. But apart from this, the industrial growth of Tillamook county will be phenomenal. We have repeatedly made the statement that this county will become a second Gray's Harbor for the manufacture of lumber, and this will come about at a much earlier date than most people are inclined to think. The old mossback, monopoly, selfish, pull down, lawless spirit, which have been characteristics in a great many of our citizen will have to give way to a class who are more progressive, broad gaged and law abiding. There is a great future for Tillamook County, especially the Nehalem country and Tillamook Bay. And the same can be said of Tillamook City whenever the citizens realize how imperative it is to the future growth of the city that Hoquart slough should be straightened and the water front deepened. This is, however, only a matter of detail. Tillamook County is going to have a wonderful development, and although the dairymen have made it famous for its splendid cheese products, this and the lumbering, fishing, cranberry and other industries will make this county quite a large industrial and commercial center.

Where is the road roller? Where is our gasoline road roller, that was to be delivered in April. The note given in payment for this roller has already drawn \$95 interest. Will the whole \$2775 be paid by the county court next week before the roller gets here?—Herald.

It is well known that one of the stipulations when the agreement was entered into last fall, and is a part of the records, that the county was not to pay any money for the road roller until after it had been shipped and tried. The lie is nailed in a letter sent by Beall & Co., of Portland, to County Judge Goodspeed, as follows: "In reference to the notice that appeared in one of your papers, headed 'Where is the Road Roller?' will say that this roller has been in our warehouse here for four or five months ready for shipment to your county at any time, and we were simply holding it back waiting until your roads were in such condition that you could use it, and when we shipped down the roller would send an operator with it, and make one trip do the work, and we now wish to say that the roller will come on the next trip of the Argo. We don't see how this paper could consistently state that the roller has already drawn \$95.00 interest, for as yet we have received no settlement from your county for the roller, and don't expect any until the roller is thoroughly tried and accepted."
