**THE NEW FISH LAW.**

**Females Not Allowed to Fish for Trout, nor can they Obtain a License.**

**SECTION 5.**  
**Unlawful to Hunt or Angle without license.** It is hereby prohibited and hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person within the State of Oregon to hunt for, pursue or take, or catch trout, salmon trout, salmon or bass, by hook or line, commonly called angling; take, catch or kill any of the game animals, fowls or birds protected by the laws of the State of Oregon, during the open season when it is lawful to kill or take the same, without such person having in his personal possession and carrying with him at the time of said hunting, pursuing, taking, catching or killing or angling, a license therefor duly issued to him by the county clerk of one of the counties of the state, provided, however that no license shall be required of a man or members of his own family for permission to hunt or angle upon his own land, and the county clerk of every county of the State of Oregon is hereby authorized to issue such license under the provisions of this act. Such license shall be numbered and dated, and shall contain a brief description of the person to whom the same is issued, together with the name and place of residence of each such person. Any license issued to any person according to the provisions of this act shall be at all times subject to the inspection of any officer of the State of Oregon charged with the enforcement of the game laws or any sheriff or deputy sheriffs or constable within the State, or the owner or his agent or representative of the real property upon which the holder of such license may be hunting or angling.

**Manner of procuring license.** All licenses provided for in this act shall be issued, as follows: Upon application therefor by any person, either resident or nonresident of this state, who shall file an affidavit with the county clerk setting forth his age, residence, occupation, etc., an annual license shall be issued to such person by the county clerk to whom such application shall be made and shall be as follows:

1st. For the purpose of hunting for, taking, catching or killing any of the wild fowl, game birds or animal protected by the State of Oregon, and which said license shall entitle the party to whom such license is issued to hunt for, pursue, to catch or kill any of the said game animals or birds within the State of Oregon during the open season when it is lawful to kill the same, and every person who is a citizen of the State of Oregon, upon the issuing of said license shall pay to the county clerk the sum of \$1, and every nonresident of the State of Oregon shall pay for such license the sum of \$10.

2nd. For the purpose of taking or catching trout, salmon trout or bass by hook or line, commonly called angling, within the state of Oregon, during the open season when it is lawful to take or catch the same, and if said person is a male person of the age of fifteen years or more and a resident of the state, he shall pay said county clerk the sum of \$1, and if a non resident, the sum of \$5. No license shall be granted for a period longer than one year, and all licenses shall expire on the thirty-first day of December next after their issuance and the same shall not be transferable. All moneys so collected by the county clerk shall at least once in every three months be forwarded to and deposited with the State Treasurer and be placed to the credit of a fund which is hereby created to be known as the game protection fund, and which fund shall be used exclusively for the protection and propagation of game and fish within the State of Oregon under the direction of the State Game and Forestry Warden, or such other officer or officers as may be vested with authority to enforce the laws of this state for the protection of game or game fish; and the moneys so turned into said game protective fund shall be used for no other purpose than for the protection and propagation of game and game fish within the State. All fines collected under the provisions of this act shall be paid to the State Treasurer, and shall by him be placed to the credit of said game protective fund.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be deemed

guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$150, or by imprisonment in the county jail of the county wherein such unlawful act was committed for not less than ten days nor more than ninety days or by both such fines and imprisonment.

**A FUNNY LAW.**

**Closed Season for Clams on Ocean Beach but Not in the Bays.**

An Act to provide for the protection of crabs, razor clams and crawfish.  
Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation, or any person whatsoever, to take, or fish from any of the waters of the State of Oregon, or have in their possession after the same has been taken, for the purpose of canning or shipping out of the county in which they are taken any crabs during the months of July, August and September of any year.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation, to take or have in their possession, for the purpose of selling or canning, where it is lawful to sell and can same, any male or female crab measuring less than six inches across the back.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons firm or corporation, or any person whatsoever to take or dig clams from the sands on the ocean beach of the Pacific Ocean in the State of Oregon, or to have in their possession after the same have been taken for the purpose of canning or shipping out of the county in which they are taken, between the first day of June and the 31st day of August, of any year.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, except residents of Clatsop County, to take, fish for, or have in their possession any crawfish, taken from the waters of the State of Oregon, during the months of November, December, January or February of any year.

Section 6. Any person violating any of the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$100 and the costs of the action. Said fine to be paid to the Master Fish Warden and by him deposited with the State Treasurer to the credit of the hatchery fund for the district in which the fine was imposed.

**Fish Hatchery Dedicated.**

The salmon hatchery on the Trask river, about nine miles southeast of Tillamook City, and belonging to the State of Oregon, was dedicated on Sunday last. The weather was beautifully fine and a number of business men and their wives and those living in that neighborhood spent a most pleasant day at this most picturesque location. The hatchery is situated on the north bank of the river, and is a large, commodious building with a capacity of turning out over six million young salmon annually. It is within this building where the process of hatching and caring for the young fry is carried on for several months, after which the young salmon are turned into a retaining pond near the hatchery and kept there until they are large enough to take care of themselves, when they are turned into the river. A little above the hatchery is the rack across the river and the trap to catch the salmon, and it is here where the eggs are taken and fertilized.

Mr. A. Chester Keel is the new superintendent of the Tillamook hatchery, and he took a great deal of pleasure in showing the visitors on Sunday every detail about the hatchery, who became greatly interested as they watched thousands of young royal chinooks and silversides in the troughs and retaining ponds. Another feature of the day's pleasure was the excellent dinner furnished by Mrs. W. Himes and other, and to which Mr. Keel invited a number of the business men and others to partake of, and this hospitality was greatly appreciated, the dinner reflecting great credit upon the ladies.

In the afternoon the visitors gathered opposite the hatchery, when Mr. Keel called the meeting to order, and in doing so expressed his pleasure in meeting with so many of the people of Tillamook. He had expected Master Fish Warden H. C. McAllister to be with them that day, and although he regretted his absence, he read the following letter to explain his absence:

Portland, Ore., May 20, 1909.

Mr. A. Chester Keel, Tillamook, Ore.  
MY DEAR SIR,—I have your favor of May 16th, and note therefrom that you have arranged to dedicate the Trask River Hatchery on Sunday, May 23rd. I regret exceedingly my inability to be present on the above mentioned date. The exhibit that I am preparing for the Seattle Fair prevents my leaving Portland at this time. However, I feel satisfied that you can look after the interests of this department with credit—not only to the department but also to yourself.

Would be pleased to have you convey to the assembled guests, on that date, my best respects, and thank them in my name for the many acts of kindness the citizens of Tillamook and vicinity have extended in making it possible for me to construct the present hatchery and carry on the work so successfully. I want the citizens of Tillamook County to feel that I appreciate their many courtesies, and stand ready at all times to meet them half way in any proposition that may arise in the future. I also want to thank the fishermen for their hearty co-operation last season in the enforcement of the fishing laws on Tillamook bay. Want them to realize that I am their friend and will do all in my power, whilst at the head of this department, to further their interests.

Brief speeches were made by the business men and Miss Maggie Himes raised the flag, which brought forth a round of applause. With three cheers for the new hatchery and a "tiger" for Mr. Keel and the singing of "America" by the ladies, the proceedings came to a close. Altogether, it was a most enjoyable day, and as the hatchery is a splendid place for picnic parties, no doubt a large number of persons will visit it this summer.
