The steamer Argo was unfortunate in being detained 24 hours by running on the mud flats on Thursday night. Her cargo consisted of 1030 cases of cheese and her passenger list included Fannie Choffee, J. C. McQuaid, Roy S. Wagner, H. C. Zerung, Geo. Edner, M. J. Reagan, F. W. Talbot, Ed. Howard, W. M. Hamilton, F. D. Arrington and J. C. Peggmore.

Judge Galloway handed down a decision in the case of M. H. Larsen, plaintiff, vs. Marston Bush, Joe Bush et al, plaintiffs, in which plaintiffs prayed for a decree that the deed from Mary Larsen, reconveying the Larsen house to plaintiff, be restored, and that plaintiff be decreed to be the owner thereof, and that the deed stand as a deed for the same. The judge dismissed the case, and Larsen failed in his efforts to have a deed to the premises restored to him.

A meeting was held on Wednesday evening to consider the advisability of celebrating the 4th of July in this city, and C. E. Reynolds was appointed chairman, D. L. Shrode secretary, and W. P. Baker treasurer, who will ascertain whether sufficient funds can be raised for that purpose. The celebration will be on the 5th, as the 4th falls on Sunday this year. The chairman, secretary and treasurer were authorized to appoint the committees necessary for carrying out the celebration.

County Clerk Holden will forward fishing licenses to those who will send a description of themselves, viz., their name, age, weight and color of eyes. As it is necessary to have a license before anyone can fish, a large number of boys applied at the clerk's office for licenses, which, as will be seen by Attorney-General Crawford's construction of the law, are issued free to all persons under 15 years of age. Males over that age have to pay for licenses and females over 15 years of age are not allowed to fish because the law does not provide a way for them to secure licenses.

In the injunction case, in which S. V. Anderson enjoined the Miami Lumber Company from removing timber from his land was argued before Judge Galloway to have the injunction dissolved on the motion of the lumber company. This the judge refused to do, and Anderson wins in the first suit. The contract that Anderson gave was a time contract, in which no timber, standing or felled, could be removed after the 10th May last. The parties had several years in which to remove the timber, and shortly before the expiration of the contract the Miami Lumber Company had the timber felled, but failed to remove the logs. The attorneys for the company contended that the logs were personal property, but the judge was bound by the explicit wording of the contract and ruled accordingly.

### THAT FISH LAW.

#### As Construed by Attorney-General Crawford.

Salem, Oregon, Mar 27, 1909.

Miss Kathleen Mills, Deputy County Clerk, Tillamook, Oregon.

DEAR MADAM: In reply of your favor of the 25th instant, whether you can issue a fishing license to males under fifteen years of age and to females, and if not, whether they are prohibited from fishing, I would call your attention to the first part of section 53 of chapter 232, page 424, laws of 1909, making it unlawful for any person to hunt or fish without a license therefor, also, to the paragraph of said section headed "manner of procuring license," requiring that a license shall be issued upon the application of any person, supported by his affidavit stating the facts therein required. Further, I would call your attention to the paragraph of said section, found at page 425, reading as follows:

"Second. For the purpose of taking or catching trout, salmon trout, salmon or bass by hook or line commonly called angling, within the State of Oregon, during the open season when it is lawful to take or catch the same, and if said applicant is a male person of the age of fifteen years or more and a resident of the state, he shall pay said county clerk the sum of \$1, and if a non resident, the sum of \$5."

You will notice by this last paragraph that licenses are not prohibited to issue to females and males under 15 years of age, but they are not required to pay for the same. Therefore, construing the section as a whole, that persons who hunt or fish must have and carry with them licenses, and that only males above fifteen years of age are required to pay for fishing licenses, it is my conclusion that males under fifteen years of age and females are required to have licenses, and that county clerks are required to issue them upon proper application and affidavit, without fee.
