A suit was filed in the circuit court by Andy Nolan against L. A. Le Miller and Agnes L. Fitzpatrick, administratrix of the estate of E. A. Fitzpatrick, deceased, in which plaintiff claims \$1188 is due him from the purchase of the bakery which was sold for \$3,000 to Chester Stuart in January, 1908, and the defendants having given their notes to secure payment, are now sued for the balance.  
To assist the pure milk cause throughout the state Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey has appointed three deputies under an act of the Legislature creating the positions. The three inspectors, as they are to be called, are Paul V. Morris, of Multnomah; M. S. Schroek, of Marion, and E. W. Catterlin, of Tillamook. Each is to receive \$1200 a year salary from the state plus \$800 traveling expenses.  
The trial of James Walton, cashier of First National Bank, who was charged with violating the fishing law, came to a sudden termination on Monday, when Deputy District Attorney W. H. Cooper moved to dismiss the case as the new fish law did not come into effect until last Tuesday. This was a surprise also to the defence, for no one had anticipated that a mistake had been made in the time when the law went into effect.

### MORE BUNCO BUSINESS. Attempt to Deprive a Widow of Her Money and Her Property.

Another instance of the trickery and the dishonesty that is being carried on in Tillamook City came to light on Saturday, which, if it cannot be stopped in no other way, then the people should take the law into their own hands and summarily put a stop to the rascality, for that is what it amounts to, pure and simple. It is not surprising that people's blood begin to boil at the repeated outrages that have been perpetrated, and the public conscience is again shocked at the high handed and bare faced methods used to deprive an aged widowed woman of her property by stealth. That alone is enough to raise the righteous indignation of any community and the present situation calls for men with courage and backbone to deal with the rascals, for there is no telling who will be the next victim or poor widow whom they will attempt to deprive of their property or exact "blood money." Quite a number of persons in this city are very indignant and who look upon the present revelation as the most rotten of the many rotten transactions that have taken place in Tillamook City.  
It came about in this manner. W. E. Catterlin had some property to sale for Mrs. M. J. Durfee, whose husband died recently in Missouri. It seems that A. H. Ruger decided to buy a certain piece of the property some few weeks ago and he had Thos Coates prepare an abstract, which he did, but in doing so he overlooked a deed recorded in 1887 and decided by a person named Blackwell. When the abstract was taken to an attorney to pass upon it, the missing deed threw a cloud upon the property. Then the dirty work was instituted to deprive a widow of her own property, only to be caught red handed in their rascality. It seems that some years ago the property was sold for taxes to Joseph Downs, and as soon as the flaw in the abstract was discovered, then an effort was made to procure a quit claim deed from Downs. He first refused to give a quit claim deed as he knew the property belonged to Mrs. Durfee, but was willing to give her a quit claim deed if she wanted it. After some false representation being made to Downs about the property being sold, he agreed to give W. G. Dwight a quit claim deed, and it is said that he paid \$50 for it. Armed with this, Dwight immediately placed the quit claim deed on record and filed suit in the circuit court against Mrs. Durfee for \$500 and possession of the property. Dwight bought the defective abstract from Coates, paying him \$28 for it, and told Ruger that the property belonged to him and he would spend a thousand dollars to defend it.  
This was the method by which a widow woman was to be uncoined out of her property, Dwight taking chances as to whether the missing deed could be produced.  
The tables were turned on Saturday. Mrs. Durfee and her daughter, Mrs. Geo. Warlick, of Chicago, Ill., unexpectedly arrived in the city, and as luck would have it, she had the original missing deed in her trunk which had been recorded in 1887 and it was taken to Coates' office and upon the cloud being removed Ruger bought the property.  
With nothing whatever to justify them in dragging Mrs. Durfee into court and suing her for \$500 and possession of her property, Oak Nolan, attorney for Dwight, filed a motion to have the case dismissed, but it is more than likely that the matter will not end here, for the rascality should be called to the attention of Judge Burnett in allowing a court of justice to be used in that manner to rob a widow woman of her money and her property and in swearing to a complaint that is absolutely false in every particular, making a clear case of perjury.  
A suit was filed in the circuit court on Saturday in which W. G. Dwight, plaintiff, vs. M. J. Durfee, is defendant. The cause of complaint set out by Dwight was that he is the owner in fee simple of lots 1 and 2, block 3, in W. D. Stillwell's addition to the town of Lincoln, now within the corporate bounds of Tillamook City, in Tillamook County, Oregon, and is entitled to the possession thereof. That defendant is in possession thereof and wrongfully withholds the possession thereof from the plaintiff to plaintiff's damage in the sum of \$500. Wherefore plaintiff prays for a judgment herein against the defendant for the sum of \$500 damages and for the possession of the said premises, and for costs of this action.  
The suit is signed by Oak Nolan, attorney for plaintiff, and plaintiff W. G. Dwight makes this affidavit:  
"I, W. G. Dwight, being first duly sworn, say that I am the plaintiff above named and that the foregoing complaint is true."  
On Monday plaintiff filed a motion to have the case dismissed.  
The quit claim deed reads as follows:  
"Know all men by these presents, that Joseph Downs and Minnie Downs his

wife, in consideration of \$10 to me paid by W. G. Dwight do hereby remise, release and forever quit claim unto the said W. G. Dwight and unto his heirs and assigns all my right, title and interest in and to the following described parcel of real estate in Tillamook County, State of Oregon, to wit: Lot (1) one and (2) two, in block (3) three, Stillwell's addition to Tillamook City. To have and to hold the same together with all the singular hereditaments and appurtenances thereunto belonging or in anywise appertaining to the said W. G. Dwight and to his heirs and assigns forever.

### Looks Like a Compromise.

Judge Galloway has rendered a decision in the suits which were brought by Tillamook City against Tillamook County for the balance of the road tax collected within the corporate limits of the city, deciding in favor of the city in regard to balance of the road tax for 1908 and against the city for balance of road tax collected in previous years. The county has been in the habit of allowing the city only part of the road tax, and two suits were tried at the last term of the circuit court, one for the balance of the road tax for 1908 and the other suit to recover the balances in other years. The judge says the writ of review must be sustained in the first case, for under the law Tillamook City should have all the road tax collected this year, but in regard to the other suit the city is barred from collecting for past years where the city has voluntarily taken a part and continued to do so for several years.  
Attorney H. Jones, for the city, has filed a motion asking the court to reconsider its decision as to the balance of the road tax collected in previous years.
