Do Your Best to Prevent Fires.

Would you set fire to any man's house in your town?
If you saw his house afire, would you pass by without doing anything?

Do you realize that timber is quite as valuable to the owner and much more so to the community and to you? He can build a new house but not a new forest. As for your own interest, think over the following facts:

Oregon has three hundred and fifty billion feet of standing timber, even now worth \$475,000,000 as a resource.

If manufactured and sold, even at present lumber prices, it will bring \$5,000,000,000 into the State for labor and supplies.

Oregon now sells \$20,000,000 worth of lumber a year. Of this \$14,000,000 is received by employes who put it in local circulation.

In other words, you, whatever your business, share it.

About a billion feet is destroyed by fire in Oregon annually, which, if manufactured, would bring in \$13,000,000.

On every thousand feet burned, the stumpage owner may lose \$2, but the community loses \$8 in wages.

Timber means pay checks, to support all industries, but burned timber pays no wages.

Timber pays taxes in your county; if it burns up, your property has to pay the difference.

Help keep down forest fires and you'll make more money. So will your children.

Care with small fires is the best way to prevent big ones.

Therefore, you are urged to observe the following simple rules:

Don't toss away burning matches or tobacco!

Don't make a camp fire in leaves, rotten wood, or against logs, where it may spread or you can't be sure it is put out!

Always clear all inflammable matter away from around your fire!

Never leave a fire until it is out!

Don't burn your slashing in the close season without a permit from a Fire Warden!

Don't operate an engine without spark arrester in the close season!

Put out any fire you find if you can. If you can't, notify a Fire Warden or other public officer, or the land owner. Remember that any little fire may become a big one if left alone.

All these rules, but the first and last are law, and violation is punishable.

Next to water, earth is the best thing to put out fire with. The best tools for fire-fighting are the shovel, ax and mattock.

A feud in the Democratic party has broken out in a new spot. Speaking of a recent division in the Senate, Mr. Bryan, in his paper, the Commoner, indicts certain members of his party. "The Democrats," he says, "who voted against free lumber have voted to repudiate the national platform of the Democratic party," and have done several other bad things, which he cites, and he declares that "to cast such a vote a Democrat must have arguments that have not yet been given to the public, and must be prepared to present these arguments to his constituents." He adds "The Commoner will give space, up to 2000 words, to any Democratic senator or representative who desires to present an argument in favor of a duty on lumber, providing he will, in his article, answer the following questions: Among the questions are: "Is a platform binding?" and "Give the names of the men who have, by letter or in person, urged him to vote for the tariff on lumber."

Democrats who saw this ten years ago are now flailing themselves in much excellent, but late, company. STANDS ON GALLOWS AND POINTS LESSON.

'People, Keep Down Liquor,' Says Adolf Nordstrom, About to Hang.

SALEM, Or., June 18.—After exonerating Sheriff H. Crenshaw, of Tillamook County, the officer who made the arrest and secured his conviction, from all blame and shaking hands with him and bidding farewell to several other whom he had met and were present at the execution, Alol N. Nordstrom stepped back upon the death trap in the execution chamber of the penitentiary at 11:27 and a half minute later had paid the extreme statutory penalty for the murder of Foreman John Peterson of a railroad construction crew in Tillamook County last February. Sixteen minutes later life was pronounced extinct.

"Well, people," said the condemned man, after he had walked boldly upon the scaffold and turned to scan the group of faces upturned to meet his gaze, "do you know why I am standing here? Can any of you answer? I am to be hanged for the murder of a man. Keep away from the booze; keep away from liquor. I am taking my punishment and don't deny the crime. I am just as good as any of you. If any of you have hard feelings against me, forgive me as I have you."

"Sheriff Crenshaw, you may think I have something against you, but I haven't. I forgive you for all that you have done. I know that you only did your duty."

"Thank you," replied Sheriff Crenshaw. "Keep liquor down, people, if you can," he continued. "I am not the first man to be hanged on account of it. I am sorry for what I have done and wish God will save my soul. God bless all of you—goodbye."

Nordstrom then called Sheriff Crenshaw upon the scaffold, shook hands with him and repeated his forgiveness, then shook hands with the minister of the gospel, who had attended to his spiritual wants prior to the execution and stepped back upon the scaffold.

With one exception, it was the quickest execution on record at the penitentiary.

Nordstrom was an athletic young Swede, and was born of good parentage in Sweden. Fifteen years of his life was spent upon the high seas, where he contracted the drink habit. He killed Peterson, a man over 50 years old, in his cabin, a short distance from Tillamook City, by besting his brains out with the butt of a revolver, and then dragged the body some distance into the woods in the effort to cover up his crime.
