For the month of May the milk taken to the Elwood creamery was 43,182 pounds from 40 cows, which made 1,620 pounds of butter fat at 38 2c per pound, bringing \$618.85 or \$1.43 per hundred pounds, making \$15.47 per cow for the month of May. Red Clover, 26,686 pounds of milk from 26 cows, which made 1001 pounds of butter fat at 34 7c per pound, or \$1.31 per

hundred pounds of milk and \$13.36 per cow for May.
