**UNITED RAILWAYS PUSHING WORK AHEAD.**

**To Beat P. R. & N. in Tillamook—Surveying Crews Are at Work in Wilson River District.**  
 Washington County News.  
 There is more than prospective locations to the work now done by the United Railways people who have a force of men in the field to push the construction work on their line with vigor. The officials of the company say they will have cars running into Tillamook before the P. R. & N. line is completed to the same terminal.

Surveying crews are stationed at various points on the Wilson river district and the route from Forest Grove to Tillamook will be about 55 miles and the railway people say they will have cars running into Forest Grove by September.

Relative to the operations of the United Railways last evening's Portland Journal says:  
 "The United Railways will be running to Forest Grove next September, according to Chief Engineer Wickersham, who is in charge of the construction work into Forest Grove, as well as of the surveying parties working between that point and the coast. The track is now laid several miles beyond Burlington, the company's town near Linnton, and which is a little over half the distance between Portland and Forest Grove."

"The road is practically done from Portland to Washington County line, except for the bridges," said Mr. Wickersham, "and has been graded some distance beyond there. There are four bridges yet to be constructed between Burlington and Summit. From Summit on, the work is nearly all team work and the steam shovels and cars are now being collected and will be sent back to Montana, where Wrenn & Greenough have another contract on hand. We expect to have cars running into Forest Grove by next September if the weather is good and there are no unlooked for delays."

"Mr. Wickersham said he had no statement to make about the work being done between Forest Grove and Tillamook at present, though there might be something later."

**WILL PLAT BEACH PROPERTY**  
**Portland Investors Purchase Property in Tillamook County.**

One of the prettiest tracts of beach property on the Nehalem Beach was acquired last week by Frank S. Fields, James McCord and W. E. Hartman, through the Queen Investment Company. The property lies about midway between Tillamook and Nehalem Bays, opposite the beautiful Twin Rocks that rise out of the Pacific about one half mile from the shore at this point. Several little lakes are on the ground, and besides being a beautiful beach resort it has the advantage of mountain springs and creeks. The back part of the tract has considerable elevation and commands a magnificent view of the ocean and the entire beach.

The purchasers have formed a realty company, known as the Tillamook Beach Realty Company, for the purpose of plating the land and placing it on the market. This will be done under the direction of the Queen Investment Company, which will also have charge of the sale of lots. It is expected that this property will be placed on the market in the near future. There are about 50 acres in the tract, and the price paid for the property was in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

**NEW STATE LAW CONCERNING MINORS.**

**Lot Allowed to Play Games of Chance.**

A new State law is now in effect prohibiting owners, lessees or proprietors of cigar stores, pool rooms, card rooms, etc., to allow minors to play games of chance in their establishments. The law and its penalties are as follows:

Sec. 1—If any person, being the owner, lessee, proprietor or employe of any cigar store, public card room, saloon, barroom, public billiard room, soft drink establishment, or other public place of amusement, shall suffer or permit any minor to engage in any game of cards, billiards, pool, bagatelle, dice throwing or other games of chance in such cigar store, etc., etc., either for amusement or otherwise, such person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$100.

Sec. 2—If any minor shall represent or pretend to the owner, lessee, proprietor or employe of any place enumerated in Section 1 of this act that such minor is 21 years of age or upward for the purpose of inducing such person to suffer or permit said minor to engage in any of the things enumerated in said section, such minor upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100.

**TILLAMOOKIAN SPENDS DAY IN ASTORIA.**

**Claude Thayer Talks Interestingly Of His Home Ci. y.**

(The Astorian.)  
 Claude Thayer, of Tillamook City, a banker, and one of the leading citizens of that country, arrived here yesterday morning on the steamer Sue H. Elmore, en route to Portland and the Willamette Valley. Mr. Thayer spent the day at the Occident and took the evening express for the metropolis.

In the course of a pleasant conversation Mr. Thayer had a good many cheerful things to say about his country and section, among them the following facts. He said that Tillamook city and county were very lively at this time, and that building was going forward steadily, and in all directions. A notable instance being in the erection of a three-story cement business block in the heart of town, 100 feet square in dimension; while lesser structures, homes and the like, were rearing themselves all over, in town and out of it. The railroad work was going ahead slowly, but steadily, and that the assurance was out that the Portland line would be finished into Tillamook City by next June, but Mr. Thayer is inclined to pass the date on to the fall of next year. He says he expects the road to be within 15 miles of the city some time during the winter, with a staging gap intervening.

Asked as to the progress Tillamook is making to meet Clatsop county in the matter of the two inter-county highways, Mr. Thayer said that his people were working as rapidly as possible to Necanicum Mountain and would do all possible to meet Clatsop there; that the "summer road," the Necanicum route, had but 13 miles yet to be "brushed out" and that this would be completed late this summer. Tillamook intends to send her rock crusher into the northern part of the county at once to aid in the work on the coast road.

He said the railway will be finished, from Necanicum Beach into Garibaldi by the Fourth of July, and though it would not be all ballasted, it would be useable under certain conditions. He also mentioned the fact that the Tillamook Lumber Manufacturing Company, a new concern had all but completed its new mill in Tillamook City and would soon be cutting 40,000 per day, a brand new industry in that neck of the woods.

Mr. Thayer said that Tillamook cheese is selling on the dock there at 14 cents per pound, and that the supply was greater and better than ever in the history of the industry, and many a farmer down that way was clearing up from \$1000 and \$1500 per month in this single fine product. That the Sand Lake people were starting up a very pronounced and profitable industry in cranberries this year; and that the Slab Creek district was following suit very successfully. That the Hoquarnton Slough dredging proposition was about untangled and would soon be in progress, with the \$60,000 appropriated for it by the Government.

W. W. Ridehalgh, formerly of this city, is over in that country, and busy just now, laying out a townsite adjoining Garibaldi, which he had not yet named or filed, but which was expected to be on the market before many weeks.

There can be no sort of doubt of Mr. Thayer's very practical and loyal interest in the Tillamook County and industries, and that he has a friendly and solicitous eye on all things down that way. He left up for Portland last evening, after a pleasant day spent with old time friends in this city.
