A congregation is like a swarm of bees. They require a definite place that is used for no other purpose.

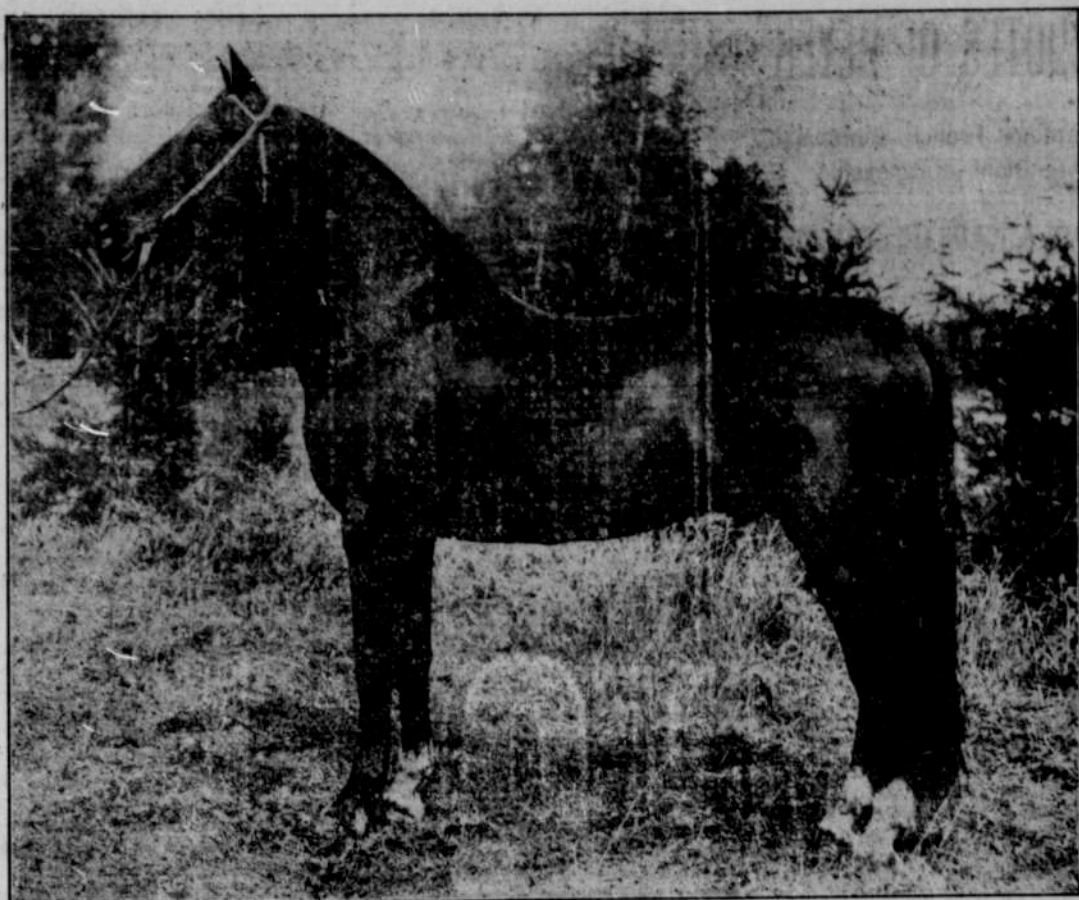
There is a distinction between a competitor and a foe, a competitor who's effort a foe destroys, but a bigot can never be made to see the difference.
