The rain will bring the hay crop up to the usual average, and as soon as the weather becomes fine the hay harvest will be in full blast.

Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Bowles were in the city the first of the week from Cloverdale. Mrs. Bowles was at Rufus, Ore., when her son Walter was fatally injured, and she was unable to get back home until the day of the funeral. The age of their son was 26 years and 7 months. They wish to express their sincere thanks to their many friends for their kindness and sympathy in their bereavement, for they feel keenly the loss of their beloved son.

The case of the State vs. A. J. Hembree, charged with murder in the first degree, is set for the 22nd in the Supreme Court, which is an appeal from Polk County. The prisoner is wanting a new trial on the grounds that the change of venue should have been to Yamhill and not Polk County, and at the trial certain evidence was admitted which was not admissible. Should the Supreme Court decide in favor of the prisoner, he will have to be tried again.

Tillamook people who want beach property on Garibaldi beach, which will become the largest and most popular summer resort in the county, have an opportunity to get on the ground floor at Lake Lytle. ## FIRST RAILROAD EXCURSION

Hundreds of People Take The First Ride in Tillamook County.

Notwithstanding that a good soaking Tillamook mist fell most of the day on Monday, which marred the arrangements made for the celebration on that day, a large crowd availed themselves of the opportunity to take their first ride on the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company's railroad. Eight flat cars had been fitted up with seats and gaily decorated with bunting, and with the Tillamook Concert Band and about 500 persons on the cars, the first excursion train pulled out from the depot in the morning, the band playing lively music and the crowd of excursionists cheering. The railroad runs through a pretty stretch of country after it leaves the depot, which gave the excursionists a better view of the beautiful dairy farms and the amount of valuable land to be cleared up for that purpose, and then striking Tillamook bay, another pretty picture unfolded itself, for the railroad gives a fine view of the bay from different points of view. As the train approached Bay City the band played lively airs and the excursionists cheered. The train was taken on to Hobsonville and then returned to this city. In the afternoon another trip was made to Hobsonville, and although it was raining with more persistency than in the morning, a larger crowd packed the cars than on the first trip. Everybody was well pleased with their first trip on the railroad on Monday, but it will be a source of far greater pleasure to the people of Tillamook county when they can take their first trip to Portland on the cars. The railroad company is deserving of thanks for allowing the free excursion on Monday, which was much appreciated by those who availed themselves of the opportunity to take their first ride on the railroad in this county. The train was in charge of C. E. Lytle, who is the superintendent of the road and Engineer Wilkinson manipulated the throttle of the engine.
