As it was, the heavy rain beat down the grass in places, but on the whole it was a benefit to the county and for the time being there is no danger of forest fires.
Rev. G. M. Beiler, the newly appointed pastor to the United Brethren church, has arrived in the city, and will preach in that church every Sunday at 11 a.m. and 8 p.m. He comes very high recommended as a very successful minister. All are cordially invited to attend these services.

August 24 is the date set by the county court for holding another election to create a Port of Tillamook under the law passed by the last State legislature. The territory embraced in the Port will comprise Tillamook, Houghton, Fairview and South Prairie Precincts, and it will be a majority vote of all four precincts combined to determine the point. Should the proposition carry, it will devolve upon Governor Benson to appoint the members, so in that way the personal of the Port will cut no figure in the election. The first election for members to serve on the Port will not take place until the general election in November 1910.

Several of the business men on Saturday formed a delegation for the purpose of laying before the county court their ideas in regard to the question of the appointment of an engineer to look after the road and bridge work in the county. Two petitions were presented favoring this, and another petition from Bay City asked the court to appoint C. M. Thomas to the position. The matter was discussed along lines previously pointed out by the Headlight, with but few objections raised thereto, and although the members of the court seemed to coincide with some features of the plan, the court took the matter under advisement.
The Tillamook Lumber Manufacturing Company is figuring upon furnishing the business houses on the principal streets with steam heat and electric lights. The county court has agreed to have the mill company furnish the court house with steam, and in all probability the concrete building company and school directors will enter into a similar agreement. It is thought that most of the business men would be glad to dispense with their stoves, as there is considerable danger of fire from them, and install steam radiators, giving heat night and day. This will be done to utilize the saw dust and shavings at the saw mill and will be an improvement as well as a saving over expensive wood for stoves, to say nothing of the cleanliness and the trouble of storing and handling wood.
